


Stunning "Snowbow"

As we bid farewell to 2022 and welcome in 2023, there are few things more exciting than the announcement of the 2023 KCRMA Call for Candidates for the Board of Directors Election! There are two seats open on the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board.

The election opens in mid-February, but we are currently seeking candidate applications. The Master Association Board, along with their counterparts on the Metropolitan District Board, is a decision-making authority that shapes the future of the community. The Board is elected to establish policies and



provide general direction to the Master Association General Manager.

The expectations of a board member are attendance at the monthly board meeting, the Joint Study Sessions and liaison meetings as assigned. Board members are also expected to communicate regularly and proficiently via email. Additional time or meetings may be necessary to fulfill the responsibilities as a board member. Please Remember to Update Dues Payments for 2023

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board adopted the 2023 Master Association Budget with a \$4 monthly increase in dues, which equates to a total of \$64 each month to cover increased operational expenses, fire mitigation efforts and perimeter fence improvements in 2023. Approximately \$1 of the monthly dues increase will go toward fire mitigation, including interface mowing, home assessments and woody vegetation removal. Approximately \$3 per month will go toward perimeter fence improvements.

Dues increased on Jan. 1. If you set up your own automatic bill payments through your bank or SmartStreet, you must update the payment amount. If you have ACH automatic payments through our system, your dues payment will automatically update. 
Recycle Your Christmas Tree!

Wildlife and Window Wells

Park Rangers experience calls every year from residents regarding wildlife falling into open window wells. This may seem like an unusual occurrence, but it happens more than you think. The hard part is trying to remove the wild animal when it is confined to a small area, possibly injured and scared, as their survival instinct makes them unpredictable.

Some window wells at homes may be only a few feet deep, to as much as six feet. This means the average animal that falls


into the well cannot easily remove themselves. The problem is the window well texture itself. The metal that is used in the construction is ribbed, but smooth, and an animal's claws cannot grip the metal. In addition, the angle is so extreme that the animals slip while trying to escape, trapping them inside the window well. If the animal cannot exit the well on its own, it can become exhausted and eventually starve to death. There have also been several examples on the Ranch over the years in which deer have fallen into window wells, thrash around breaking glass trying to escape and injure themselves while running around the basement looking for an exit!

Many of our park rangers, myself included, have removed yearling and adult deer, snakes, rabbits, prairie dogs and raccoons from window wells. A few times, park rangers have had to lower themselves down into the well to capture the animal for release, which can be dangerous for both the animal and the park ranger. One of the easiest methods to assist an animal trapped in a window well is to place a long board inside the well. This allows the animal to gain a grip and climb outside to ground level. Deer, however, need to be physically removed from the well.

A great way to minimize any future concerns regarding wildlife and your open window well is to spend the extra money and install aluminum grate covers. The grate cover allows wildlife to pass safely around your home, and also prevents young children from accidentally falling into the well and injuring themselves. 



Dear Editor:

It continues to disappoint me when I read the same diatribes meant to mislead and divide our community written by the same two or three people. Of course, you know I'm talking about the anti-trail travelers.

I want to highlight their consistent use of logical fallacy and lies to gaslight readers into believing there is a crisis that requires their solution. First, they create a problem that doesn't exist, then agitate for a solution that is more extreme than anyone would ever have agreed to, if not for the re-defining of what was once normal.

Their leader wants to endear himself to you as a fellow mountain biker in each letter. He is not like you, his only aim is to close trails, not enjoy them with neighbors and family.

All their letters use a false narrative. They believe if they keep repeating a lie, you will soon believe it. Mostly about mountain bike racing, pending ecological doom, and danger to hikers. A recent article from them shouted their anecdotal arguments as "Fact."

They appeal to so-called experts that trails must be closed. Your experience, common sense and property rights don't have the right credentials.

They provide a false choice, open trails vs. injured hikers and extinct wildlife. Our trails are no more dangerous than the sidewalk. And does anyone really believe the animals, bugs and birds are constrained by a thin ribbon of dirt?

They claim it's time for a compromise. There is no compromise needed. The trails work fine for all who want to enjoy them. These people will only pocket a concession and continue to pursue their aim of shutting down trails. Their rules are their orthodoxy. They will advocate extreme penalties for riding on a closed trail.

Do you think I'm too harsh? These are the same people who fabricated onesided statements the new Open Space member was supposed to have written in her application. Then shared it as true with their allies. How shameful. I was at the MA Board meeting when this was revealed. Let's insist on good faith arguments and reject everything else. *Nick Hereford. Dear Editor:

There is an amenity so unique and valuable that it is immediately identifiable with KCR. Mention Ken-Caryl, and non-residents think of our Foothills and Hogback Open Space. We residents know this is not just a view, but it is home to wildlife and picturesque vegetation. Historically, it was never meant to be used as a park, playing field, cemetery, or dirt track for any sport. The discussion for over a decade is how much of a human footprint is justifiable and who benefits? Hiking while meditating is quite different from the excitement and concentration of mountain biking. Safety is an issue. Change is overdue. Ken-Caryl needs a quiet place, a 'safe-zone', the Conservation Area, for pedestrians, which would exclude mountain biking.

During the last two election cycles, this is what I had proposed in letters to the editor and my personal paid advertising:

- * The sensitive area south of Massey Draw should be a Conservation Area.
- * The Conservation Area trails would be open to hikers and equestrians.
- * These Conservation Area trails would be closed to bicyclists. (Modeled after a successful 1964 federal conservation law).

The 1,000-acres south of Massey Draw was referred to as a "Potential Conservation Area" by two KCR biological surveys. That would still provide double, or 2,000-acres of Foothills Open Space for mountain biking activities. (1,000 for hiking & 2,000 for multi-use/mountain biking seems reasonable)

Second Topic: This second message has been consistent in all of my

correspondence: Docmann South is located in the far reaches of our open space. It is pristine with no trails. A new trail, "Wildcat", is proposed. This is a 'bad' idea.

- * An elk meadow is west of KCR property.
- Docmann South is an elk migration corridor.
- Science has shown human activity causes stress on the elk herd. This results in all sorts of problems, including calf still-births/death.
- * Jefferson County property borders on the east, thus presenting a trespassing problem.
- Scratch the remote Wildcat Trail and we save around \$80,000.

Think about it, the Conservation Area will become the most valued amenity for families.

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

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


