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#### MD Board Approves the NADG **Inclusion Agreement**

The Metropolitan District Board approved the Agreement for Inclusion of Property with the North American Development Group (NADG) at the Oct. 26, 2021 Board meeting. The implementation of this agreement will ultimately result in all three of the NADG development projects being included in the Metropolitan District boundaries, thus ensuring that all property owners, both current and those of the new



development, pay Metropolitan District property tax at the same rate to sustain the District's operations.

There are several steps that will be occurring in order to implement the Agreement for Inclusion of Property with NADG. At its Dec. 7 meeting, the District Board will be asked to conduct a public hearing regarding inclusion of the development property into the Metropolitan District's boundaries. If the Board approves a Resolution and Certified Order agreeing to include the property following the public hearing, then the Resolution and Certified Order will be filed with the Jefferson County District Court asking the district court to issue an Order of Inclusion. The district court's job is to look at the documentation provided and determine whether the appropriate legal process has been followed. If approved, the District Court's Order of Inclusion becomes effective when it is recorded with the Jefferson County Clerk & Recorder, which will not occur until NADG has met certain obligations under the Agreement for Inclusion of Property. These obligations include working with the District on developing mutually agreeable plans and specifications for the park and recreation improvements. As currently contemplated, the District Court's Order of Inclusion would be recorded, and the property included into the District's boundaries, in early 2023.

While these steps are in progress, NADG continues to work through the planning and zoning process through Jefferson County. The planning and zoning process does not involve the Metropolitan District. Other updates the District expects to receive include

NADG's exploration of options for developing the residential units within Parcel B as rental units, and the future of the original seven-acre site offered to Jefferson County School District. #### Master Association Adopts \$4 Dues Increase for 2022

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board adopted the 2022 Master Association Budget with a \$4 per month dues increase. This year's resident survey showed that 77% of residents would tolerate a dues increase, and residents also requested additional shade at pools and parks, as well as increased special events. The Board took this feedback to heart and incorporated these items into the budget, which is posted at www.kencarylranch.org under the About Us tab, then Financials.



#### **MA Board Summary**

On Nov. 16, 2021, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:

- · The Christmas Tree Sale will be Dec. 4 and Holiday Happenings event with Santa will be Dec. 5.
- The 2022 Master Association Budget was approved. The new budget includes a \$4 monthly dues increase. Some notable budget impacts include increased rates for trash and water, irrigation system repairs, increased insurance rates, increased special events budget, addition of part-time human resources position and increase in facility maintenance expenses. Projects in 2022 will include shade structures at the Ranch House Pool, Ranch House Park, Brannon Gearhart Park and Bradford pool, a Wildfire Fuels Assessment, additional wildlife surveys for Wildcat Ridge, median enhancement and perimeter fence improvements.
- · The motion to approve the proposed realignment of Stove Prairie Trail failed.
- · The following motions passed:
- o Authorize the flying of the American flag with a dark sky compliant light on the Beacon Hill flagpole.
- Adopt the revised Conflict of Interest policy.
- Public comment at the meeting addressed various topics, including the proposed Stove Prairie Trail realignment.



## Holiday Decorations and Wildlife

As the holiday season approaches, please remember to keep wildlife in mind when decorating your property this fall and winter. Fall is the time of year when deer are in the rut (mating season). Males are searching for mates and their antlers



are fully grown for the season, increasing the chance that they will get snagged on something. To showcase how apt these situations are at this time of the year, not more than a week ago, the Park Rangers received multiple calls about a buck that had wrapped its antler in a Halloween decoration. Luckily, this did not impact its ability to feed or move around, but many deer are not so lucky. In years past, Park Rangers have received calls regarding deer entangled in holiday light strands, yard and garden items (vegetable garden cages, fencing), or even netting from sports equipment. The following are some tips from Colorado Parks and Wildlife to mitigate the risk of entangling wildlife on your property:

- **Timing** wait to put up outdoor lights on posts, shrubs, or small trees until after the peak of the deer rut. A good time to start decorating is after the first week of December.
- Trees bucks like to rub their antlers on tree trunks that are two to six inches in diameter. They do this to mark their territory during the rut. Avoid placing lights on trees this size and think about placing string lights on other areas of your property.
- **Lights** use multiple short strands of wire plugged together instead of one long strand, so if an animal becomes entangled, it will have less wire to deal with. Attempt to place lights at least 6 feet off the ground.
- Avoid "Clotheslines" stringing lights "clothesline" style across areas should be avoided. This style of hanging makes it easy for an animal to become entangled. Firmly attach lights to tree limbs, gutters, or fence posts.
- **Flagging** place flagging along wired decorations as a warning sign for animals to avoid the area.

These tips should also apply to year-round yard decorations or items. Here are some additional tips to follow throughout the year:

- **Netting** remove sports netting from their posts when they are not in use. Do not wrap nets around posts as deer may be enticed to rub their antlers on it and entangle themselves.
- **Gardening Items** disconnect and store water hoses, tomato cages and other gardening materials until spring.
- Store Items take down and store hammocks and swings when not in use.

  Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Rangers will investigate a report regarding a deer entangled in lights or netting only if it is impeding the deer's sight, ability to feed, or it's mobility. If the light strand or netting is not causing harm and is just a nuisance, the Rangers will ask the reporting party to observe the animal over the next few weeks to see if the situation worsens. KCRMA Rangers will bring out fresh trees throughout the sale, so each timeslot will have a great selection of recently cut Douglas firs. Unlike the trees found in Christmas tree sale lots, these trees are more "natural" in shape, but they will still fill your home with traditional Christmas spirit – and the delightful scent of pine!

Online registration is open at www. ken-carylranch.org by clicking on the Programs tab and selecting Special Events from the drop-down menu. There will be plenty of time slots available. Reservations are required; we will not be able to accept walk-ins at the event.

Rangers are requesting donations (cash, check or credit card) in exchange for the trees to offset expenses in the Open Space program. Limit one tree per family to ensure many families can enjoy this great tradition.

For the annual tree sale, the rangers harvest small diameter trees in the open space to improve wildlife habitat and overall forest health. The removal of the small trees reduces overcrowding and eliminates ladder fuels that can carry fire into a forest canopy. Trees that don't find a home are chipped and made into mulch.

If you have an ORANGE open space ID bracelet it is no longer valid past Dec. 31, 2021. To obtain a new yellow ID bracelet, which will be good until 2024, please visit the Ranch House or the Community Center during the following hours:

Ranch House (7676 S. Continental Divide Rd.) Monday – Thursday, 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. The Ranch House is closed to the public on Friday.

Community Center (1 Club Dr.) Monday – Thursday, 6 a.m. – 7 p.m. Friday, 6 a.m. – 5 p.m. Saturday, 8 a.m. – 4 p.m.



We have simplified the registration process and it will take just a minute to grab your bracelets and be on your way. Now that we have fully reopened our facilities, all open space bracelet registration will be in-person. We appreciate you stopping by either of the convenient locations listed above.

If you are the homeowner, you will just need a photo ID. If you rent your home, are a brand new resident and haven't updated your license, or are not the owner, you can provide any one of the following as address verification:

- 1. A valid Colorado Driver's License with current KCR address.
- 2. A valid Colorado I.D. with current KCR address.
- 3. A valid property tax statement with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.
- 4. A valid warranty deed with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.
- 5. A valid lease/rental agreement with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.
- 6. A recent utility bill (gas, water, electric, cable) with the applicant's name and current

Most of our trails are on Ken-Caryl Ranch Private Open Space and are accessible only to members and their guests. Open space bracelets help rangers and volunteer patrollers quickly identify residents. It is not mandatory to have an ID bracelet when using Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space, but if you don't have an ID bracelet, please be prepared to stop and answer questions from a KCRMA Park Ranger or Volunteer Patroller.

There is no cost for open space bracelets. Bracelets are issued only two per household and can be temporarily transferred to house guests ONLY while they are staying in your home. Other guests must be accompanied by a Ken-Caryl resident.

#### Stove Prairie Current Alignment to Remain

After a lengthy public process to gather feedback, the Stove Prairie Trail reroute will not move forward. Stove Prairie is an existing trail in the North Ranch that runs from Bradford Trail to Manor House Trail.

The proposed realignment was recommended to the Board by the Open Space Committee and was developed by the Volunteer Trail Coordinators. The Board heard extensive feedback from residents on both sides of the issue. Ultimately, the motion to reroute the trail was defeated with a 2-2 vote, which means the motion failed due to lack of majority. Board members Scotty Martin and Dave Seagraves voted against

the reroute, and Board members Tom Bratschun and Chris Schroeder voted in favor of the reroute. Board member Philip Varley was not in attendance at the

#### **Taking Mental Health Matters** to Heart

Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District, in collaboration with resident Dr. Matt Mishkind, will be offering a new series of free one to two-hour educational sessions designed to help community members better understand mental health and the prevalence of mental health concerns, common signs indicating that someone may be struggling, and ways that we can help each other as friends, neighbors and community members.

These sessions are not clinical, but rather designed to give community members tools and information to help other community members.



Sessions offered include three topics; however, other topics may be introduced in later sessions based on interest. The first session focuses on Mental Health 101 and Suicide Awareness. This session will cover statistics, facts, myths and warning signs for common mental health conditions. Dr. Mishkind will discuss the critical need for suicide prevention and changing dialogue about mental health. The training is designed for anyone, including parents, friends, neighbors, teachers, advocates, doctors, nurses, office supervisors, first responders, etc., to recognize and refer someone at risk of suicide.

The second session will focus on Navigating the Mental Health System since this process can be difficult, and many people find themselves asking questions like, "who should I talk to?", "what's the difference between a psychiatrist and psychologist", "will my insurance pay for this?" and "why is there such a long waitlist?". This presentation will help answer these and other questions about engaging with the mental health system, discuss some of the barriers to treatment and provide tips and resources for community members to help other community members navigate the system in times of need.

The final session will be about Burnout and COVID. Most employed adults in the United States report feeling increased levels of burnout, Married and child-rearing adults are most likely to report complete burnout. This session will offer practical tips on how to navigate increased stressors in the workplace due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Over half of U.S. adults report experiencing increased levels of stress, emotional exhaustion, increased anxiety, increased feelings of sadness and increased levels of irritability. This presentation will focus on combating burnout in a "post"-pandemic world.

All sessions are facilitated by Dr. Matt Mishkind, who is also a Ken-Caryl Ranch resident. Dr. Mishkind is a faculty member with the Departments of Psychiatry and Family Medicine at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, Anschutz Medical Campus. He currently serves as the Deputy Director for the University of Colorado Johnson Depression Center, as the Director of Operations for the Steven A. Cohen Military Family Clinic at the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus, and as Director of Strategic Facilitation, Office of Telehealth and Technology Implementation for Behavioral Health Practice and Science (TIPS). Dr. Mishkind is a certified QPR, Working Minds: Suicide Prevention in the Workplace and Mental Health First Aid trainer.

Sessions are held at the Ranch House and pre-registration is required. Go to www.kencarylranch.org and click the "Register" button at the top of the page. Space is limited to 30 spots and it is not required to attend each session. These presentations are intended to be inclusive, open and non-judgmental.

#### Resident Hattie Heasley Enjoys Outdoor Playtime Thanks to New Ramp Installation

Like many four-year-olds, one of Hattie Heasley's favorite activities is playing outside. She and her two-year-old sister, Shiloh, ride up and down the long driveway in front of their Ken-Caryl home in their pink Jeep, chase bubbles and play with chalk. Hattie was born with a rare chromosome disorder called 1q43q44 deletion syndrome. Some of the side effects of this diagnosis are seizures and developmental delays, therefore Hattie uses a wheelchair to get around. Hattie is also non-verbal, but has learned other ways to communicate and express joy.

Hattie's parents, Abby and David, have learned a lot since Hattie's diagnosis. They moved into a one-story home that makes it easier to navigate Hattie's wheelchair, enrolled her in preschool at Fletcher Miller School (a Jeffco public school for children with special needs), purchased adaptive movement and speech assistance devices, engaged therapists, learned how to administer a myriad of medications and adjust diets and even found hippotherapy (equine therapy) sessions for Hattie. As Hattie grew, the big challenge they faced daily was carrying both her and her 45-pound hot pink wheelchair down the steps in the garage. The steps had to be navigated each time they set out for preschool, doctor's appointments, activities, or even a trip to the grocery store. Hattie's mom began to dread the daily outside play time that Hattie and Shiloh enjoyed so much because it meant another trip down those stairs.

During one of Hattie's speech therapy sessions. Abby mentioned her ongoing struggle with the stairs to speech therapist Jill Tullman. Tullman, who works with many individuals with physical disabilities, suggested she contact the nonprofit Home Builders Foundation (HBF), which provides home modifications to those with disabilities at no charge. Abby immediately completed HBF's intake evaluation and was thrilled when she was notified that her request for a garage ramp had been approved and would take place in August.

The morning that the ramp was to be installed, Abby and her two daughters made

a trip to their favorite bakery to pick up cookies for the team. Then, they excitedly watched throughout the day as HBF Project Captain Bill Wood and a group of volunteers from 3 Trees Design & Drafting and Urban Lights built and installed the ramp. Abby says it was an incredibly happy day for all of them. "Everyone who worked on the project was incredibly kind, generous and positive," enthused Abby. "They made us feel like this was their most important project and took time to get to know the airls."

After waiting impatiently for the final touches to be completed. Hattie and Shiloh got to take their first trip down the ramp. As Hattie was wheeled easily from the house to the yard, she waved her arms excitedly and grinned. Shiloh giggled while she skipped along beside her sister. And, Abby felt a huge weight lift from her shoulders knowing that she would no longer have to face the physical challenge of lifting her daughter and her wheelchair every time they left the house.

With the barrier of the stairs removed, Hattie and Shiloh have enjoyed more outdoor playtime and routine trips to schools, appointments and the store have become much more manageable for all. "This ramp has greatly increased Hattie's freedom and independence," Abby said, adding, "We are so grateful to everyone involved!"

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## Ken-Caryl Ranch Honors Those Who Served at the Veterans Day Ceremony, Nov. 11

Thank you to all Ken-Caryl Ranch veterans, active military, their families, residents, guests and friends, who attended a ceremony in honor of Veterans Day, Nov. 11. This event, hosted at the Veterans Memorial by Shaffer Elementary School in the Plains, honored all those who have served for their sacrifice and service to our country. Joe Levy, MD Board Secretary, who served as the event's MC, opened the ceremony with remarks about the holiday's origin, stating that Veterans Day honors "the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 – the armistice that effectively ended combat in World War I – the War to End All Wars – went into effect."

One year later, in November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..."

"The words behind me on this Monument – a great symbol envisioned and erected by the citizens of the Ken-Caryl Community – are part of our way of recognizing all our veterans for their patriotism, their service and their sacrifice for our country," remarked Joe, during his speech.

A special thank you to MD Board Director John Ostrom, resident and veteran, for serving as the event's keynote speaker, commenting on his military service in nine different US military units as a fighter pilot – six in the United States Marines and three in the United States Navy. John fondly acknowledged and thanked his son and daughter, who are active military, and his wife, Sharon, for her support.

Shaffer Elementary school student, Taven Blazek, 9, performed "God Bless America", to cheers from the crowd to close out the ceremony.

Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I, but in 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history, and after American forces had again fought aggression in Korea, Armistice Day became Veterans Day – a day to honor American Veterans of all wars.

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

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
