Responsible Budgeting

Both Ken-Caryl Ranch governing bodies approved 2023 budgets in November and December after months of public meetings and deliberation.

Your Master Association (funded mainly by HOA dues) listened to the community and is investing in fire mitigation and perimeter fence improvements. And your Metropolitan District (the parks and recreation board, funded by property taxes and program user fees) is investing about \$1.1 million in much-needed parks and facilities improvement projects in our community.

I'm proud of this achievement. It's the second consecutive year the MD has been able to make that kind of investment as part of the District's operating

Responsible budgeting since 2019 – as insisted on by the MD Board, and executed with skill and precision by District staff – is the reason we are in the position to be able to invest in about 20 significant capital improvement projects all across Ken-Caryl Ranch from North Ranch Park, to the Community Center and to Community Park in 2023 alone.

It's also the reason the MD Board, after much discussion, was in the position to eliminate swimming pool pass fees for Ken-Caryl Ranch residents in 2023.

You might recall that just four years ago, the Metro District had such cash flow problems that it had to borrow money from the Master Association just to cover its own expenses. But under new management, the District today forecasts a \$2.1 million unassigned fund balance at the end of the 2023 fiscal year.

We also have staff with the ability and acumen to work with the MD Board and the community to plan for the future. As your MD Board president, I asked my fellow board members to allow me to make it a priority to structure board meetings in the past six months to prioritize high-level discussion and continued re-development of the District's budget and 10-Year Capital Plan. A lot of the projects and improvements in this plan were deferred for much of the past decade – casualties of the District's previous financial position.

It's my intention to structure discussion at board meetings in the coming months to find a way to complete our deferred maintenance plans without asking Ken-Caryl Ranch residents for any effective tax increases. One such option - asking the community to retain the existing four-mill levy from 2014 as an operations mill to fund capital projects – is one such option of which the MD Board has already begun public discussion. The 2021 Community Survey showed considerable support for this approach.

I'm committed to facilitating discussion of this topic by focusing on doing the right thing, the right way, for the right reasons. Please educate yourself and participate in the process.



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Be Sure to Update Your 2023 Dues Payments!

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board adopted the 2023 Master Association Budget with a \$4 per month dues increase, which equates to a total of \$64 each month to cover increased operational expenses, fire mitigation efforts and perimeter fence improvements in 2023. Approximately \$1 of the monthly dues increase will go toward fire mitigation, including interface mowing, home assessments and woody vegetation removal. Approximately \$3 per month will go toward perimeter fence improvements.

The approved budget is posted on our website at www.ken-carylranch. org under the *About Us* tab, then Financials. Dues will increase Jan. 1, 2023. If you set up your own automatic bill payments through your bank or SmartStreet, you must update the payment amount. If you have ACH automatic payments through our system, your dues payment will automatically update. Go to www. ken-carylranch.org and click on Pay My Dues to see payment options or to sign up for ACH payments.



A change in the weather during warmer months can be a minor inconvenience, while being caught off guard in the winter has the potential for severe consequences. Checking the forecast before going out can better prepare you for these conditions. Always let someone know where you will be going and

your estimated time of arrival back home. Hiking, biking, snowshoeing or skiing up steep foothill trails can be exhausting and cause you to work up a sweat, even in frigid conditions. Dressing in layers can prevent overheating and allow you to better adapt to changing conditions.

The heat produced from exertion can be deceiving; if an extended stop is necessary due to an emergency or from exhaustion, the body can quickly become chilled and can lead to medical emergencies like hypothermia. Avoid wearing cotton clothing. Cotton takes a long time to dry and could lead to continual cooling of your core temperature. Synthetic or wool base layers wick moisture away from your body, dry quickly and have the ability to thermo-regulate even when wet. An extra layer like a wind shell can trap extra heat while sedentary, block the wind and can be easily packed away while on the move. The fine balance of exertion and your body's attempt to maintain a certain core temperature can burn a lot of calories. Bring plenty of water and high energy food on your winter outings. As we all know, the sun sets early in the winter months, so if you leave in the afternoon for your outing, give yourself plenty of time to return before dark.

Winter essentials:

- Dress in layers. Light weight thermoregulating base layers made of wool or synthetic fibers. Include a hat and gloves.
- · Wind and water-resistant shell,
- Plenty of high-calorie food and water.
- Survival kit with a fire starter, space blanket, whistle, compass, first aid supplies and a source of light to navigate if you find yourself out in the dark.
- Don't count on a cell phone for help.
 You could be out of service, or your
 battery could run out.

Be aware of trail closures for muddy conditions

Pets should be leashed and under the owner's control at all times

Even though it's hard to keep your pet leashed while using poles or when you decide to go to the local sledding area, Open Space Use Rule #4 regarding leash regulations still applies. Coyotes and other predators may be more likely to approach pets that are loose and away from their owners when their normal food supplies are scarce. A dog off leash may be inclined to chase deer and other wildlife. Wildlife can use up scarce energy reserves trying to flee from a loose pet. Harassment of wildlife is also a fineable offence under Colorado state law and can lead to an expensive citation. Other trail users will appreciate an undercontrol pet while they are navigating snowy terrain.



Cut-Your-Own-Christmas-Tree Pilot Program a Big Success!

This year, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Open Space Department, Open Space Committee and Board of Directors, in accordance with the Ken-Caryl Ranch Forest Stewardship Plan, approved a Cut-Your-Own-Christmas Tree Pilot Project as a nice addition to Ken-Caryl's annual Christmas Tree Sale.

The pilot project provided the community with an option to register for a permit, limited to 75 permits, one per family, to hike in the open space and cut up to three Christmas trees per permit. The cost of the permits was \$10, and

all proceeds went to offsetting Open Space Department expenses.

We are pleased to announce that this year, all available permits were purchased, raising \$750!

The goal of the program was to take areas that are not as accessible to bulk forest operations and allow volunteers to cut their own trees in designated areas where regeneration of Douglas Fir trees were reaching such a height that it begins to act as a ladder fuel for wildfire.

Thank you to all of our residents for participating in this year's pilot program and contributing to its success!

Valley Parkway Improvements Update

Jefferson County completed construction of the raised crosswalks located on Valley Parkway at White Oak Drive and Mountain Laurel Drive earlier this month, making the intersections fully operational. Crews removed two stop signs at the intersection, however the stop signs located on White Oak and Mountain Laurel remain and will not be removed as part of this project. Each intersection has been modified from a four-way stop to a two-way stop with raised crossings. Jeffco also implemented the rectangular rapid flashing beacons (RRFB) at White Oak, as a result of resident feedback, which are now fully operational.

There is so much to be done. The KCRMA Board election is coming soon. For those residents who are unsure if they are eligible to vote, you may contact the Master Association.

- * A record of 51% responded to the 2021 KCR Survey.
- * Conservationists are hoping for an even larger voter turnout.
- * It's time for balance on our Board of Directors. After a decade, it is time for change.
- * It's time for compromise with how we manage our unique and most valued resource and the dollars associated with it.
- * The future of our Foothills and Hogback Open Space is at stake.

The operating budget for Open Space management is about \$700,000. Then there are customary additional expenses tacked on such as the cost of new looped trails. Over the last decade, the Stacked Loop Trail System has been extended in our North Foothills and continued, almost enclosing the entire South. The only land left is an elk migration corridor located far from our residences. Enough, please! There is only one 'direct' beneficiary of the Stacked Loop Trail System.

- * It is preferred for mountain biking.
 - * Included are switchbacks with extended curves not desirable for

hikers.

- * It adds unnecessary miles and increases the dollar costs.
- * Stacked Loop Trail Systems do not benefit nature. It fragments and is harmful to nature.
- * There are better alternatives to reach points of interest.
- * The trails south of Massey Draw can be modified to be hiker efficient, less exerting, safer and more habitat/ environmentally friendly.

The sport of mountain biking is challenging and requires agility and speed. Speeding mountain biker activity disturbs other trail users and wildlife.

I hope everyone, including Trail Club Members, will understand the value that a Conservation Area (safe area) would add to the community and will support it. Leave the bicycle at home and enjoy a peaceful walk. The area south of Massey Draw is ideal for the hiker/equestrian tranquility experience. I will either run or support candidates who will endorse this desperately needed conservation/wildlife preservation initiative.


