District Board Exploring Mill Levy Continuance

The District is facing a potential revenue shortfall in the future and is exploring options to address the issue while maintaining high-quality park and recreation services without raising taxes. A potential option includes the continuation of an existing mill levy, or a portion of that mill levy. The Board would like input from the community regarding this option.

The District's Board could place a ballot initiative

on the November 2023 ballot asking voters to approve continuing the full amount or a portion of the amount of the bond repayment mill levy (currently 3.984) as a general operating mill levy. I've included a further description of the mill levy, property taxes and this continuance option below.

How Are My Property Taxes Calculated?

Mill levies and property taxes can be confusing, so I'm hoping to provide an overview to help set the stage and start the conversation with residents. When you pay your Jefferson County property taxes, a portion of those taxes goes to the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District if you live in the District's boundaries. The graphic below shows how your property taxes are calculated.



Every odd-numbered year, the Jefferson County Assessor values all property within the County, and that gives homeowners the Actual Value number shown in the graphic. The Colorado Legislature sets the Residential Assessment Rate (RAR), which is 6.765% for tax year 2023, but that rate can change every year, causing funding uncertainty.

The Actual Value is multiplied by the RAR to calculate the Assessed Value. The Assessed Value (less any exempted amount) is next multiplied by the applicable tax rate, known as a mill levy. In Colorado, tax rates are expressed as a decimal fraction of a dollar for every one dollar of Assessed Value. Known as millage or mills, one mill is 1/1,000th of a dollar or \$0.001 (1/10th of a penny).

Your total mill levy includes mill levies from multiple tax districts, including Jefferson County, the school district, West Metro Fire, Urban Drainage, law enforcement, and special districts like the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District. The current mill levy for assessment year 2022 for Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District is made up of a general operating mill levy and a bond repayment mill. The breakout is as follows:

Current General Operating Mill Levy	15.209 Mills
Current Bond Repayment Mill Levy	3.984 Mills
Total Tax Burden for an Individual Taxpayer	19.193 Mills

The District's voters approved the current bond repayment mill levy as part of the issuance of General Obligation Bonds in 2014, and it is set to expire in December 2024. The District is exploring options for continuing to levy the

amount of the current bond repayment mill levy after it expires as a general operating mill levy. There are no bonds associated with this option as the tax would be collected as an operating mill, not a bond repayment mill. In this scenario, the total tax burden experienced by an individual taxpayer does not increase. This option can be indefinite or limited to a fixed number of years by a sunset provision. If the mill levy stays, the tax revenue would potentially fund the continuation of the 10-year capital plan, improvements at Community Park, implementation of ongoing Community Survey priorities, and would offset increased operational costs due to inflation and state mandates. What it Takes to Keep our Community Beautiful!

With the warmer months approaching, I would like to offer some insight into the covenant protection process and how it all works in Ken-Caryl Ranch.

First, please be aware that I am here to assist in your understanding of the covenants as well as their enforcement. Maybe you do not really know for sure why a rule exists, or what it means, or if

your issue is even a violation of anything at all? In my role, each day I spend some time helping residents to achieve a clearer understanding regarding covenant protection and the architectural review process. I enjoy meeting you and discussing the things that matter most to you.

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association enforces its documents both proactively and reactively. We honor homeowner comments made anonymously and those identified. When a problem arises in your neighborhood, it usually works best to speak with the neighbor to reach a solution. I know there are times when this is uncomfortable, and I am here to receive reports of covenant violations. Complaints will be anonymous, but I really appreciate a telephone number being left so that I can follow through with the caller. The identity of the resident making the complaint is not disclosed when notifying the homeowner in violation. After a complaint is received, I confirm the existence of a violation by going to the site. If it is determined that a property is in violation of the documents of Ken-Caryl Ranch, a letter is sent. The Association's deed restrictions affect the owners of property, so if the property is rented, it is the responsibility of the owner to see that their tenants comply with the covenants.

If the complaint is something that cannot be verified by an inspection, such as barking dogs or excessive noise, a Courtesy Notice is sent. This notice informs the homeowner that the Association has received complaints and asks the homeowner to please correct the situation before Jefferson County has to be notified. Noise and animal issues are examples of violations that are not heard by the Covenant Control Committee, but rather are reported by homeowners to the county if the Courtesy Notice does not cause the resident to address and/ or rectify the issue. Should there be no response to the initial Courtesy Notice, a second notice is sent, again giving the homeowner time to remedy the violation. Without response to the second notice, Jefferson County will be notified.

During the winter months, we do inspections monthly, and bi-weekly from late spring through the fall. If we observe a violation of our covenants on your property you will receive a courtesy violation letter. If cured within the time stated on your letter, the violation will be closed. If the covenant violation is not cured, it can escalate to an official violation, which can result in fines of up to \$50 every other day.

Gratefully, compliance with the covenants is very high in our community, and it is clear to me that the existence of our documents is a major factor in upholding property values in Ken-Caryl Ranch. Please keep in mind that rules and regulations are dynamic in nature. New issues surface, new regulations are added, irrelevant ones are deleted and others simply are amended or updated. Five residents submitted applications for three open seats on the Metropolitan District Board. This year, the seats are four-year terms. The candidates are:



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

In May 2022, the Master Association Board directed the ranger staff to mow a 10-foot swath in the open space adjacent to private property as part of a fuel mitigation project. This decision was to assist with wildfire mitigation in Ken-Caryl. As part of a bigger picture educating the community on Firewise activities, this project would cut the open space



grasses to a height of four to six inches and would assist knocking down flames if a grass or creeping fire were to start in the open space and move toward homes. The 10-foot interface would also allow firefighters a safe way to access the open space with equipment and trucks, if needed. A staff of four rangers completed this project in eight weeks and spent approximately 460 hours mowing and hand trimming the interface. Mowing the interface will again take place in 2023, but with the use of an outside contractor that will allow staff to return to a few job duties that were suspended or reduced in 2022.

However, an unintended consequences of this mowing has resulted in many residents using these swaths as shortcuts or pathways when recreating in open space, as opposed to using designated trails. This can be frustrating to homeowners as some yards are smaller than others and residents can be in very close proximity to a house and disturb homeowners. While there is no open space rule against walking off trail in the open space, social trails can develop and grasses may be damaged by repeated use. Please try and be considerate of your fellow neighbors and use the trails or streets to go on your walk or hike!

Last Call! Ken-Caryl Ranch Foundation Offers Two Scholarships

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Foundation is soliciting scholarship applications from Ken-Caryl residents in their senior year of high school. This year, two scholarships will be awarded for \$1,000 to help defray the costs of higher education. Applications must be turned into the Ranch House by Friday, March 17 at 5 p.m. (Applications that are received in the Ranch House mailbox by Friday, March 17 at 5 p.m. will be accepted. Please note, the Ranch House is closed to the public on Fridays.) For eligibility requirements or to download a scholarship form, visit www.kencarylranchfoundation.org.

Community Service

The first scholarship focus is community service. To be eligible to receive this scholarship, the applicant must include a one-page, self-written essay on community service, which describes: 1. what the applicant thinks is meant by community service, and 2. his/her own contributions in the way of community service.

Civil Discourse

The second scholarship focus is on civil discourse. To be eligible to receive this scholarship, the applicant must include a one-page, selfwritten essay on any controversial subject showing how to compromise and solve a problem. In summary, vigorous disagreements, expressed with civility and respect, strengthen our pluralistic nation.

About the Foundation

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Foundation, created in October of 1990, was originally conceived as an organization to accept deductible donations of money and other items of value to be used to benefit the community. The Foundation quickly found itself involved in the acquisition from the developer of the Ranch of 537 acres in the South Valley area of the Ken-Caryl Ranch to be preserved as open space. The early years of the foundation were devoted to ensuring that the purchase of the South Valley was completed.

The Foundation since that time has engaged in numerous activities, including art shows and golf tournaments, to raise funds to benefit cultural, recreational and educational opportunities on the Ranch. The benefits have included: scholarship awards given to area high school students; programs in area elementary and middle schools to support music, the arts, and educational programs; the Make-a-Wish Foundation; Ken-Caryl open space, the Alive-at-25 teen driving program; disability renovations at the Ken-Caryl Ranch House, including a lift, ramps and swimming pool access; for historical preservation of the Bradford-Perley House in the Valley; and support for The Miracle Field, a solid surface ball field at the Schaefer Athletic Complex of the Foothills Park and Recreation District in Jefferson County.



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POOL CUES

Have Wings, Will Travel

The first American Robin that I observed perched on my wrought-iron patio fence instructed me in song, that the spring bird migration is afoot, or should I say awing! Prepare yourself for the joyous return of hundreds of millions of our feathered friends migrating through the Central Flyway. The aerial show will include Baltimore Orioles, wrens, red-winged blackbirds, sparrows, yellow goldfinches, indigo buntings, Blue Grosbeaks, ruddy robins, raucous crows, chirpy warblers, melodic meadowlarks, sweet hummingbirds, and many more species. If you are lucky, you may spot a Bohemian Waxwing, new to the area!

With this massive migration starting in March, peaking in April, and falling off in May, we must be sensitive to the needs of the birds and not contribute to the many hardships the birds face during this grueling seasonal journey to reach warmer weather, tasty bugs and conditions suitable to raising their young.

Birds are telling us that climate change is threatening the places they need to survive. Extreme weather events are wreaking havoc on our natural world and severe storms are grounding migratory birds, prolonging an already perilous and epic journey. We cannot control certain aspects of the weather that can make the journey difficult, such as barometric pressure, harsh fluctuating temperatures, wind speed and direction. We can help by reducing nighttime light pollution. Light pollution poses a serious threat to migratory birds. Eighty percent of migratory birds answer the "sunset cue" and begin their migration into the night skies. The stars, the moon and the earth's magnetic field aid night-flying birds as a time independent compass. At sundown and moonset, the birds are left with only the stars for "stellar orientation." James Foster, Swedish Biologist, stated that "stars are a visual stimulus that conveys the directional information."

You may think that turning off your outdoor lights won't matter; I am just one. The truth is "small acts when multiplied by millions of people can transform the night sky." According to Audubon," since 1970, North America has lost more than 2.5 billion migratory birds." The Master Association is proud to be a member of the International Dark Sky Association and also supports the Colorado Lights Out Program that focuses mainly on protecting birds by reducing light pollution. As such, may I suggest joining together and make a difference in our community. Let's be proud that we did our part to help save our serenading birds.

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A Historian's Legacy, Dolores A. Ebner 1928 - 2023

Many of you will remember Dolores Ebner's articles that ran in Life at Ken-Caryl for many years, entitled "Did You Know?" about archaeology and the history of Ken-Caryl Ranch. Delores dedicated many years to preserving and

promoting the history of the Ranch. She was instrumental in saving the Bradford-Perley House from destruction. She spearheaded raising funds for the preservation projects and attended all meetings with state representatives, architects and engineers. You may have witnessed some of the historical archaeological excavations that took place at the house for many years. She was the person who found the college professors who headed up the digs. The excavations allowed many students hands-on experience. She wrote two books about the history of Ken-Caryl Ranch, entitled, "The Bradford Years 1859-1876" and "John C. Shaffer". If you





are interested in reading her books, they are available at the front desk in the Ranch House. Much of what she wrote is included on Ken-Caryl Ranch's website under the History of Ken-Caryl Ranch webpage.

Not only was Dolores interested in history, but she was also interested in community development. She was president, secretary and publicist of the Ken-Caryl Senior Women's Club, was instrumental in setting up the senior exercise program and chaired the Fab 50's senior group.

Dolores was inducted into the Jefferson County Commission Hall of Fame, which honored her for her contributions to the history of Jefferson County and her many years of volunteerism. She was also awarded the National Historic Preservation Medal from the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Historical Society's Hall of Fame award, and was honored by the Historical Society with the title, Member Emerita.

A bench located in the historical apple orchard is dedicated to Dolores and her husband, Don. There was never a project or an organization that Dolores wasn't willing to help with or lead and her enthusiasm made everyone around want to help. Her contributions and dedication to the Ken-Caryl community and Jefferson County will be remembered for many years.

DMV Looks to Help Coloradans Pump the Brakes on Fraud

Coloradans now have more tools in the fight against motor vehicle and identity fraud.

The Colorado Division of Motor Vehicles launched the Pump the Brakes on Fraud, Colorado awareness campaign in February.

The campaign features an online hub, DMV.Colorado.gov/Fraud, where Coloradans can find a variety of tools to help stop fraud in its tracks. There visitors will find information on personal identity theft fraud and how to guard against it as well as how to avoid getting swindled in a privateparty vehicle purchase - and more!

The campaign will also feature fraud-fighting tips and information on DMV social media accounts as well as new handouts at DMV offices.

Despite best efforts, fraud will persist as long as unscrupulous people move to take advantage of others, so the DMV encourages Coloradans to use the following tips so they can help pump the brakes on fraud.

Identity Theft Fraud

One of the most common types of fraud the DMV sees is identity theft. Fake websites claiming to provide DMV services then asking for personal information or Coloradans giving personal information at a traffic accident are a few examples where residents can become a victim of identity theft.

In those instances, the DMV urges residents to contact their local police department and file a complaint with StopFraudColorado.gov.

Other tips include:

- Take steps to block unwanted calls and to filter unwanted text messages.
- Don't give personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect. Legitimate organizations won't call, email, or text to ask for personal information like Social Security, bank account, or

credit card numbers.

- If you get an email or text message from a company you do business with and you think it's real, it's still best not to click on any links. Instead, contact them using a website that is trustworthy. Or look up their phone number. Don't call a number they give or use the number from caller ID.
- Resist the pressure to act immediately. Legitimate businesses will give time to make a decision. Anyone who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is a scammer.
- Know how scammers tell you to pay. Never pay someone who insists on being paid in gift cards or using a

money transfer service. And never deposit a check and send money back to someone.

 Stop and talk to someone you trust. Before doing anything else, tell someone — a friend, a family member, a neighbor — what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.

Motor Vehicle Fraud

Another common type of fraud the Division cautions Coloradans to watch for is vehicle fraud, especially when shopping for that new ride. In those instances, the DMV encourages Coloradans to keep these tips in mind:

 Understand the process and beware of salvage vehicles, which require additional steps and can cost more to make the vehicle roadworthy.

- Ask a mechanic to check the vehicle.
- Have a certified VIN inspector verify the VIN.
- Check the title for smudges or inconsistencies that could be fraudulent.
- Check the National Motor Vehicle Title Information System's (NMVTIS) website to research vehicle history and view NMVTIS-approved vehicle data providers.

If the deal is too good to be true, it probably is. Do some research to figure out the fair market value of a vehicle before purchasing it.

Commute by bike, it's a zero emissions way to travel. The Audubon encourages bird watching, recreation and grocery shopping by bike. The Sierra Club supports and advocates responsible on and off-road cycling. The Nature Conservancy also loves bikes. Most conservation organizations will tell you bike riding is the best thing to do. Many conservationists only travel by bike.

Protect the environment with the National Fire Protection Association Firewise program, as we are lucky to have an exceptionally talented and dedicated Firewise Committee. Most of the committee members are very experienced firefighters and first responders - they are the nicest, kindest, and most caring people you will ever meet and all they ask if you follow the guidelines. In addition to this excellent committee, residents like me have completed the NFPA **Certified Wildfire Mitigation Specialist** program, which gives us the ability to do home assessments and help our neighbors.

Become an Audubon Habitat Hero. Replace vegetation we might have removed for fire mitigation with native, low risk, low water plants, shrubs and trees. Habitat Hero is the best answer to declining bee, bird and



animal populations. I am more than happy to share information and help you and make plans to accomplish these things. I have talked to our two great leaders Brian and Traci and discussed water savings, habitat enhancement and beautification, those topics align with goals the MA and MD both have. Let's combine our interests, energy and talent and make something amazing. The Audubon reports that habitat loss, water supply shortages and drought are direct causes of animal, bird, and insect decline - the best way to address this is by being a Habitat Hero.

Conservation means caring for trees, bees and seas and we need you to come and help us. The decline in animals, birds and insects is 80-90% in many cases – it's up to you to come out and help make a difference.

Dear Editor:

This letter is due March 6, which is prior to the MA Board election results. Who will be the new MA Board Members? Regardless, a community problem needs to be addressed. It has been over a year since the 2021 Survey and there has been four years of golden eagle nest failure. Furthermore, the elk herd stopped migrating throughout the KCR Foothills Open Space. Continuing to do the same thing and expecting a different result makes no sense. A majority of survey respondents have expressed a desire for a Conservation Area. Now it is in the hands of the MA Board.

- * A resident, who once described himself as a " *real* mountain biker ", offered his thoughts.
- * In the past he used, what I feel, were hurtful words directed at some resident conservationists.
- * Ouch, imagine the pain?
- * In the Life at Ken-Caryl, Feb. 15, 2023, edition, he suggests or references a Conservation Area.
- * Good, respectful discourse delivers results.

The problem is he references the area between Massey Draw and Lost Canyon, which is a rather desolate place with steep elevations unacceptable for equestrian and hiker use. Besides, the Potential Conservation Area (PCA) mentioned in two biological surveys lies south of Massey Draw and not north of it. South of Massey Draw is where the eagles' nesting place is located along with known raptor foraging areas. It is where the elk once migrated from the South Docmann Corridor into the Docmann Gulch before the Docmann Trail opened to mountain bike traffic. Hikers had been shown to use the Docmann Trail 7.4% to bikers 92.6% and averaged 1.2 hikers per day over a 291-day study period. What spooked the wildlife? (Obvious cause and effect: Mountain Biking and not hiking.)

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- * Please note: Roxborough State Park excludes mountain biking as do many other areas.
- * This is nothing new, but sensible in certain instances. So, let's address this issue positively before it is too late.
- * The time is now, the place is the south foothills area, and the answer is a Conservation Area for hikers and equestrians exclusively.
