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Understanding the Master Association and Metropolitan District

I often get asked, "What's the difference between the Master Association and the Metropolitan District?" Ken-Caryl Ranch is governed by these two distinct entities, and I'm hoping to educate residents on some key points about both organizations. My column will start with a basic overview, and we are planning to have



some more in-depth articles with graphics in upcoming issues to further explain.

What is the Master Association?

- · Homeowners' association for Ken-Caryl Ranch.
- Managed by an elected five-member volunteer Board of Directors and a paid professional staff.
- Revenues come primarily from residential and commercial dues, advertising, cell tower leases and Equestrian Center revenue.

Here are some of the main services and amenities the Master Association provides:

- · Covenant enforcement and architectural control
- · Trash removal and recycling
- Equestrian Center operations
- Life at Ken-Caryl newspaper
- · Private open space and trails
- · Asset replacement through the Reserve Fund
- Historical preservation
- Special events (Recycling event, Barn BrewHa, etc.)

What is the Metropolitan District?

- Government entity known as a Special District.
- Managed by an elected five-member volunteer Board of Directors and paid professional staff.
- Revenues are derived from property taxes, grants and user fees.
 And the Metropolitan District offers these services and programs:
- The Community Center, tennis courts, parks, pools and fields
- · Hard-surface greenbelts
- Public open space on the South Hogback
- Recreation programming and community events, including preschool, Before & After Care, summer camps, fitness programs, tennis programs and more
- Most landscape maintenance and snow removal for facilities and greenbelts

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News Flash! News Flash! Read All About It!

I didn't say it was terribly exciting news, but news none the less.

KCRMA continues to look at our Rules and Regulations and updates them due to changes in technology, the needs of the community, or a need to provide alternatives to outdated materials and methods. Initially, the Architectural Committee reviews, and comes to an agreement on, the proposed

changes before we share those updates with the community, which is what I'm doing now.

In addition to the above reasons for rule changes, Firewise methodology and best practices are continually taken into consideration and appropriate updates made.

With that said, we have created Rules and Regulations surrounding the accumulation and storage of firewood on lots within Ken-Caryl Ranch. The proposed Rules and Regulations follows:

Firewood Storage - Rules and Regulations - DRAFT

2.21 Firewood Storage

No more than one cord of wood (stacked wood measuring 4 feet tall, 8 feet wide, and 4 feet deep) shall be stored on any residential lot at any given time.

Stored wood shall be neatly stacked and placed as unobtrusively as possible at a minimal distance of 15 feet - when possible - from any combustible structure or accessory building.

Temporary coverings, such as tarps, are not allowed to cover stored firewood. Architectural Committee approval is required for any covering or storage solution for firewood.

A structure may be built to store the firewood but must meet the following criteria:

- If covered, the roof must match that of the house.
- May not be larger than 100' square feet in size.
- May not exceed 8' in height.
- For sided applications, it must match the colors of the house.
- Shall not alter historical drainage into neighboring properties.

Any temporary storage solution or housing must also be approved by the Architectural Committee and will be reviewed on an individual basis. All temporary storage solutions and housings must be kept in good condition or will be deemed 'unsightly'.

No more than 5 cubic feet of firewood may be stored near the residence and must be kept neatly stacked and placed as unobtrusively as possible.

Not only do we want to ensure your yard is nice to look at, but as safe as possible. Our next proposed Rule and Regulation update is surrounding mailboxes and mailbox posts. These guidelines were historically found in the neighborhood fencing guidelines, but were original to the creation of Ken-Caryl Ranch and are in need of an update.

Mailbox and Post Rules, Regulations, and Procedures – DRAFT

2.33 Mailboxes and Mailbox Posts: Architectural Committee approval is required. Boxes must have a black finish. Boxes on a shared post must match in size.

Wood posts may be natural cedar and may be sealed with a transparent product to protect color of wood. Additionally, wood posts may be painted to match the home in which it services.

Professional numbers on the side(s) are allowed, however may not exceed 4" in height and may not be a reflective material.

Vinyl or plastic posts or mailboxes are not allowed.

Mailbox may not have any moving parts (such as wings of a duck).

Metal Mailbox posts may be approved if conservatively designed and compliment the home and neighborhood.

On April 19, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:

- The Board discussed a potential pilot project using goats in the open space for weed maintenance. The Board requested more information and will review the request at a future meeting.
- The Board approved a pilot project for fire mitigation in the open space interface on Mountain Laurel Drive.
 The pilot project will incorporate staff direction and prioritization, Trail Club volunteers and a contractor for slash removal. The project was supported 4:1 with Philip Varley opposed.
- The Board reviewed a developer agreement with NADG for architectural process. Staff will work with NADG to identify materials being considered for siding and fencing to be reviewed for fire resistance in a future draft.
- The Board reviewed a Fence Task Force draft job description. The job description, with proposed changes, will be reviewed again at a future board meeting.
- The Board approved the following motions:
- Appoint Anna Martinez to the Open Space Committee. The motion passed with a 3:2 vote with Gerry Bauer and Philip Varley opposed.
- Adopt the updated Open Space & Parks Rules document to include a no smoking rule in Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space.
- Adopt the Dog Park Task Force job description.
- Write off \$9,413.58 for equestrian account #37206.

- Add Board Treasurer Philip Varley as a signer on all Master Association bank accounts.
- A motion to allocate funds from the Special Project Fund for sidewalk connections along Valley Parkway was tabled until more information is available.
- Public comment at the meeting addressed various topics, including committee term limits and sizes, the Open Space Committee appointment, the Dutch Creek fire mitigation project conducted by the Trail Club, goats as weed management in the open space and the public pickleball courts in the new housing development.

Noxious Weed Management in the Open Space

Springtime has arrived in Ken-Caryl, bringing longer days and warmer temperatures. But with this change in seasons, noxious weeds are starting to pop up in the open spaces, lawns and parks. Noxious weeds are non-native, invasive plants that displace native vegetation and can have impacts on economies and the environment. In Colorado and in Jefferson County, property owners are required by law to manage certain species of noxious weeds. The level of management generally depends on how common the species is within the county. Species that are not very common require eradication (total elimination) from the property. Species that are common are required or encouraged (depending on the species) to be controlled (e.g., attempt to stop their

The Natural Resource team has begun their noxious weed management, including herbicide application, hand removal, mowing and biological control, in the open space. We take an integrative approach, meaning we use a variety of methods to combat the spread of these plants in the open space. Herbicide application normally begins at the end of April (weather dependent) and continues into July, with follow up spraying in the fall (September-October). Mowing operations are scattered throughout the growing season to prevent certain

plant species from flowering and producing seed. Hand removal is used on smaller weed patches and days when herbicide application is not possible (rain, snow, high wind etc.). Biological control involves releasing the natural enemies of specific noxious weed species at various times throughout the growing season. This year, we are planning to release a biological control for Canada thistle in the fall (Canada thistle rust).

In addition to the Natural Resource Team, a contract herbicide applicator will also be conducting work in the open space starting at the beginning of May and continuing through to the fall. Please see the attached management area map for more information about where herbicide applications will be taking place in the open space. The contractor has already started spraying bare-ground areas like picnic pads, crusher-fine trails and kiosk pads. These areas are treated with a pre-emergent herbicide to prevent weeds from coming up throughout the growing season.

Both the contractor and in-house staff use post-emergence broadleaf, selective herbicides that are approved by the EPA and registered for use in the state of Colorado to control noxious weeds that have already emerged. Broadleaf selective herbicides do not impact grass species; they target broadleaf plants, which make up a majority of the noxious weed species found on the ranch. The major herbicide brands that are used are Escort XP, Milestone, Transline and Telar XP. Herbicide application is a very effective and efficient method to control noxious weed species and is an

important tool in land management, but again, it is only one of several methods that we employ on the ranch to control and eradicate noxious weed species.

From April to June, the plants that we target are mostly biennial species. Biennials are plants that complete their life cycle in two years, with the first year being spent in a non-flowering, vegetative state called a rosette. At this stage, these plants are more vulnerable to herbicide application due to the increased uptake in nutrients and water. In the second year, the plants shoot up a stem and begin flowering and seeding in June/July. Target biennial species in the open space include scotch thistle, musk thistle, houndstongue and common mullein, to name a few.


As spring turns to summer, the target plants shift from biennial species to perennial species. Perennials are plants that live for three or more years. Each year, the plant flowers, seeds and then goes dormant for the winter. Perennials are usually very deeply rooted plants making them extremely difficult to

control. One of the most effective strategies is to mow the plants once a month so they do not flower and go to seed, and then treat them with herbicide in the fall. Mowing them once a month stresses them out as they are constantly trying to regrow all season. Then in the fall, when they are transporting large amounts of nutrients to their roots to prepare for winter, they are highly vulnerable to herbicide. Target perennial species in the open space are Canada thistle and leafy spurge.

The weeds that are managed in the open space are very aggressive invaders that can take over entire plant communities. Priority is given to areas where infestations pose the worst threat to native plant communities and where they are bordering home lots. LookoutAlert, replacing CodeRED, will quickly notify people within a specific geographic area that may be affected

Individuals who were signed up for CodeRED have been automatically enrolled into LookoutAlert. These residents do NOT need to sign up again but are encouraged to set up an account in the new platform to be able to choose what types of alerts they want to receive and to review and update their information when necessary. All landline residential and commercial phone numbers within the three jurisdictions have also automatically been enrolled into LookoutAlert.

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

Fire Safety Living Next to Open Space

The most effective way to reduce wildfire risks at your property is to limit the amount of flammable vegetation around your home, choose ignition resistant building materials and construction techniques, and conduct regular exterior maintenance in the home ignition zones.

For residents living adjacent to open space, you are allowed to maintain a 10' wide buffer zone in open space to reinforce defensible space treatments on your property.

Do:

- Mow grasses to height of no less than 4".
- Remove woody vegetation 4" in diameter or less (measured at the base of the tree or shrub).
- Remove dead branches or logs that are lying on the ground.

Don't:

- Do not mow or remove any vegetation beyond the 10' buffer zone
- Do not remove or prune branches from trees larger than 4" in diameter at the base (if there is a concern about woody vegetation larger than 4" in diameter at the base, contact the Open Space Department Staff and they will evaluate the concern and determine if additional removal/ pruning is necessary).
- Do not dump or store anything including slash, grass clippings, dirt, other landscaping debris.
- Do not alter, build, or install anything including landscaping, play equipment, decks, walls, fences, buried invisible pet fences or bird feeders/houses.

*Note: Failure to follow any of the above rules could lead to a violation notice including possible fines and loss of association privileges.

Be aware that by maintaining the 10' buffer zone in open space and choosing not to address fire hazards on your own property will do very little if nothing to protect your home. The most effective way to protect your property from fire is to implement defensible space recommendations starting at the house and moving out from there.



Trail Club "Paves" the Way with **Emergency Access Road Fire Mitigation Efforts**

In early April, the Ken-Caryl Trail Club donated their time to remove shrubs, small trees and debris along the emergency access road located in the Ken-Caryl Valley that connects North Ranch Road and Willow Springs. Ken-Caryl's Firewise Committee, in partnership with the Ken-Caryl Ranch Rangers, felt these fire mitigation clean-up efforts were necessary, noting the dangerous conditions that existed along the route.

The Ken-Caryl Trail Club then stepped up to the plate, agreeing to donate hours of service to clearing the area along the service road of combustible materials in the hopes of keeping the road accessible for possible area evacuations, which also provided cost-savings to the community for the needed labor. Trail Club members involved in this effort included residents JJ Hamilton, Jonah Hamilton, Jeff Lyslo, Mark Celusniak, Gary Grieshaber and Carl Brackpool. MA Board Director Gerry Bauer also volunteered.

According to Open Space Manager Sean Warren, Dan Hatlestad, Chair of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Firewise Committee, first brought to staff's attention dangerous conditions along the emergency access road connecting North Ranch and Willow Springs.

"Dan felt the area was pretty overgrown and if the woody vegetation did ignite, the amount of smoke and fire would essentially shut down the road as an evacuation route," remarked Sean. He also noted that work along the route will continue, with the help of a contractor to remove larger limbs and prune taller trees.



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

Objectives:

- The Task Force will meet for approximately three months and present information back to the Boards at the September 2022 Joint Study Session.
- The Task Force will be disbanded upon presentation of the information to the Boards.

On April 23, 20 eager and enthusiastic homeowners in the Stratford Farms and Shaffer Hill neighborhoods gathered to work on fire mitigation efforts. They were participating in this year's Annual Project Day, an event the neighbors have participated in for many years to honor Earth Day.

The Marshall Fire shocked all of us and raised awareness about being firewise and about implementing fire mitigation measures to reduce fire risk. 

Dear Editor:

Our trails are a unique asset to our community and a key factor why many of us moved here. This trail system is not a State Park, a National Park, nor is it a wildlife refuge. Therefore, it does not need to be governed in the same way. State and National parks have the public at large to deal with, significant liabilities to match with staffing, and a labyrinth of government rules to follow. We enjoy self-rule over our little slice of heaven.

The best use for the trail system is to use it. What about responsible use and conservation? Of course. We have established use rules, we close trails when necessary, and our Trail Club maintains them with sweat and toil as required, saving the community over \$50K annually in expenses. Most of the land outside your window is far from any trail, leaving great habitat for our other neighbors.

Past letters to the editor warn about events I checked into and found lacking in clarity. One is mountain bike racing. The last "race" was part of a neighborhood-wide celebration some 10 years ago. It sounded like fun, with lots to do for

the kids. Another is mountain bike race training. This is a youth group run by a Ken-Caryl resident granted a permit from the MA Board. A separate youth group lost access because of inappropriate behavior. Then there are the eagles that trail users are allegedly endangering. In one nest, fledglings didn't survive last year. Predators were determined as the cause, not human activity.

I'll be on the trails often this summer and hope to see you out there. By the way, please consider attending a MA Board meeting and let them know how much you appreciate using the trails.

Dear Editor:

Several recent letters have argued for a ban on trail use at night. Since I both enjoy this and lack the leisure to hike exclusively during the day, I object. Hiking, biking, and other simple enjoyments of our KC open space sustain health and well-being of many many KC residents. No wonder 97% of KC survey respondents indicated they are satisfied with life in KC. "Ban it" advocates discount KC community well-being. They fixate on a fantasy of animal fragility and hope you will too.

The "ban it" position rests on two fallacies: that simple creatures "stress" and need to "de-stress" like humans; and that human animals necessarily stress neighboring wildlife. Animal and human brains are different. The bulging cerebral cortices of humans generate imagination and worry. We humans need and benefit from some de-stressing-e.g. hiking or riding in nature. Our simple-brained furry and feathered friends do not. Evolution has blessed them with basic stimulus-response behaviors and learning. When they sense unfamiliar stimuli, night or day, they experience momentary arousal, assess a possible threat, and flee or hide if necessary. Within seconds the "danger" passes and they return to their daily survival rituals, unharmed, and certainly not distressed. In employing adaptive instincts to respond to momentary uncertainty, local critters escape the prolonged worry and distress of humans.

The human animal is not especially threatening or stress-inducing to our local creatures. Consider your immediate neighborhood. Deer, birds, squirrels, rabbits, and more thrive and multiply. People, dogs, loud cars, bright lights at night, and music have no significant impact on them. They quickly adapt to us, our footsteps, our cars and lawn mowers. So we coexist with ease. If critters can survive and thrive in populated, noisy neighborhoods, they survive and thrive in the open space near our trails. They need no additional protection.

"Ban-it" advocates need you to swallow the fantasy that animals and human animals do not coexist harmoniously in KC. Decades of resident experience suggest otherwise. The liberty of all residents to enjoy their trails, day or night, should be respected.
