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Dog Park and Fence Task Forces

Resident involvement is key to managing Ken-Caryl Ranch, and I’m excited about the creation of two task forces this year: Dog Park Task Force and Fence Task Force.

The Dog Park Task Force is a joint initiative between the Master Association and the Metropolitan District. The task force shall work to develop a feasibility report for a dog park in Ken-Caryl Ranch. They will be conducting a great deal of research to present to the Boards to use as part of future planning efforts for existing and new spaces. They will look at location options; ownership considerations; overall advantages and disadvantages, including neighbor and community support or opposition; maintenance components, issues, and challenges; and initial development and ongoing maintenance funding options.



Congratulations to the following residents who were appointed by both Boards to serve on the Dog Park Task Force: Betsy Bellissimo, Jimmy Land, Chris Loring, Wes Morris, Christie Morton, Erinn Philpot, Max Reiner and Joanne Russum. Meetings will start in June and will be open to the public. Check the website calendar for meeting dates and times.

The Fence Task Force is a Master Association initiative, and the application process is now open! The purpose of the task force is to address fencing inconsistencies and appearance in Ken-Caryl Ranch and to develop recommendations for improvements to community perimeter fencing that borders major roads, greenbelts, open space, and other areas as needed. The application deadline is June 13 at 5 p.m., and you can apply at www.ken-carylranh.org under the *About Us* tab, then Committees & Task Forces. Meetings will also be open to the public, and the meetings will likely start in July.

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Grouse Encounters on Open Space Trails

Our favorite, feathered curmudgeon is back! It is that time of year when KCRMA Rangers begin receiving reports of unusual encounters with a small, chicken-like bird, currently on Cougar trail, but he may appear anywhere on the open space trails. The bird is a male, Dusky grouse; it has a small head, large body with brownish plumage and walks along the ground pumping its head as it moves. The grouse approaches people, and if allowed, will peck at their legs or bike and exhibit other aggressive behavior. Dusky grouse are common in our open space and are usually secretive, but during the breeding season, males become very protective of their territory and in some cases will engage people. Reports of this type of behavior have been recorded over the last few years throughout our open space. Trail users should be on the lookout and heed the following steps to protect yourself and the grouse:

- When hiking in the open space, always keep your dog on a leash. Consider leaving your dog at home. Grouse spend a lot of their time on the ground, nests are usually found on the ground too. Grouse are very vulnerable to disturbance by off trail use and curious pets.
- If a grouse approaches you, do not panic. They weigh about two pounds, and you are much larger than them. Carry a trekking pole and use it if needed to shield yourself. You can also use a backpack. Do not swing or kick at the bird. Wear long pants, as the grouse may lightly peck at your legs, or flap its wings rapidly striking your leg. Staff experienced light blows that were not harmful.
- Move along! Do not give the grouse a chance to get close to you. He may chase you, but if you keep moving, he will stop and turn around.
- If riding a bike, be especially watchful and control speeds. If the grouse is on the trail, dismount and walk your bike, keeping it between you and the grouse as a shield. Trying to ride around the grouse might result in a fatal collision.
- Equestrians should be alert and anticipate how to respond if their horse is spooked by the grouse.
- These encounters are more likely to occur in the spring and summer months. Staff believe that this situation is not dangerous to trail users, but can be an unnerving experience. Please be cautious, aware and respectful of these animals.

Fire Danger Signs Explained

The Ken-Caryl Park Rangers regularly update the marquee sign at the entrance to Ken-Caryl Valley to keep the community informed of the current wildfire risk. Due to the current construction at the entrance to the Valley, the marquee will be temporarily removed and will be returned to the entrance when construction is completed.

The fire danger levels are based on the information available at West Metro Fire Station 13, which serves Ken-Caryl Ranch and the Jefferson County Sheriff’s Office. The rangers post the “Fire Danger High” sign when the West Metro Fire Danger sign reads “High” or higher. This designation is used to make residents aware of high fire danger, but it doesn’t signal any added restrictions besides those already in place in the community, such as our newly updated Rule #29, which prohibits smoking in open space at any time.

“Fire Restriction in Effect” and “Fire Ban No Burning” postings are based on a declaration from the Jefferson County Sheriff’s Office. These designations are associated with increased restrictions beyond the current rules. Rule specifics and exemptions can be obtained from the Sheriff’s Office website, or on Ken-Caryl media outlets. 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Ken-Caryl Redistricting

According to Ballotpedia.com, Redistricting is the process by which new congressional and state legislative district boundaries are drawn. Each of Colorado’s seven United States Representatives and 100 state legislators are elected from political divisions called districts. United States Senators are not elected by districts, but by the states at large. District lines are redrawn every 10 years following completion of the United States census. The federal government stipulates that districts must have nearly equal populations and must not discriminate on the basis of race or ethnicity.

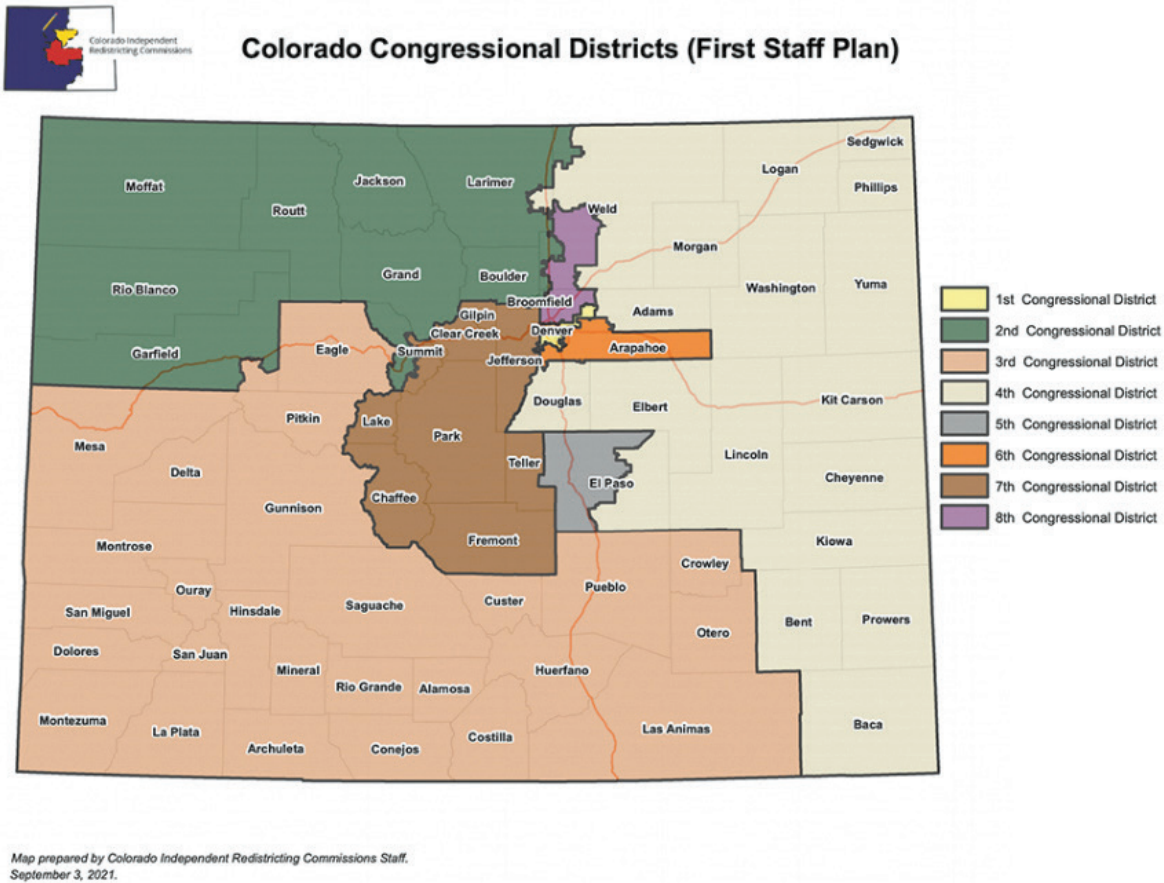
The 12 members of Colorado’s Independent Congressional Redistricting Commission agreed on an overhaul of the state’s U.S. House districts on Sept. 28. Under the plan, the western sections of Arapahoe County, including Littleton, Englewood and Centennial, would be in the 6th District along with adjacent areas of Jefferson County, including Ken-Caryl.

The redistricting affects our community’s Congressional District and who represents Ken-Caryl in both the Senate and House of Representatives. Under the current plan, Ken-Caryl’s boundary areas changed with a split along C-470 and the new areas renumbered. The newly labeled Senate District (SD) 4 is on the west side, and the new SD16 is on the east side. The Ken-Caryl foothills area moved to SD4. SD20 was redrawn to include less suburbs and more mountain areas, with Ken-Caryl removed.

After redistricting, Ken-Caryl, on both sides of C-470, is now completely in House District (HD) 25 with some of Littleton between Bowles and Coal Mine included. Some of the Ken-Caryl areas on the east side of C-470 that were in HD22, along with some of Littleton, were move into HD28.

Ken-Caryl is currently split between Congressional Districts (CD) 1, 2 and 7. Following redistricting, Ken-Caryl will now split at C-470, between CD6 and CD7.

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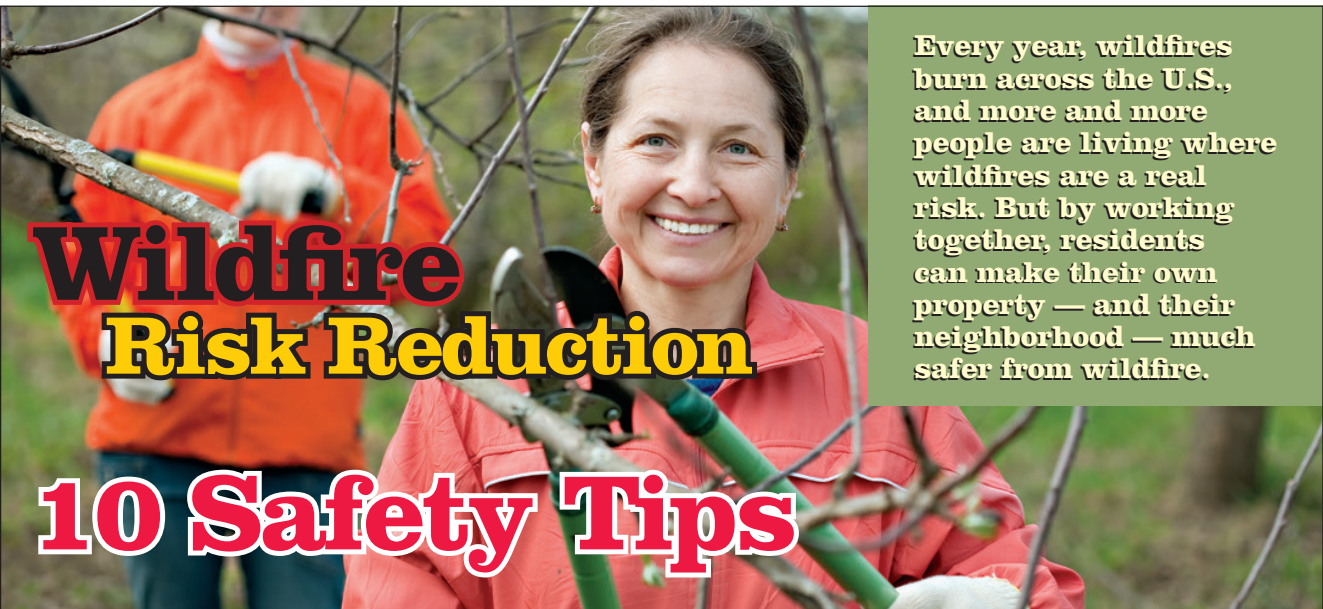

MA Board Summary

- On May 17, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:
- Resident Jamie Siebrase gave a presentation on composting opportunities for the community. The Board requested a survey to gauge community interest.
 - The Board reviewed updates on Brannon Gearhart Park. They expressed support for trail widening in one section of the park and increasing the RFP budget for the Brannon Gearhart Park playground to \$150,000, with Gerry Bauer and Philip Varley opposed to both.
 - The Board discussed committee sizes and term limits. They will gather information from the committees and will resume the conversation at the July meeting.
 - The Board reviewed previous and upcoming SLASH disposal opportunities for residents. They asked staff to prioritize the 8,000 remaining linear feet of woody interface along private homes and open space, and include areas in the Plains and develop plans to address the most pressing areas.
 - The Board reviewed cost estimates for mowing the 10-foot interface between private homes and open space. They requested staff divert resources from other open space projects to provide this service in-house.
 - The Board decided to postpone the asphalt to concrete conversion project along Ken Caryl Ave. due to the current high prices. They directed staff to monitor pricing for the next one to two years.
 - The Board approved the following motions:
 - o Approve Hitt Enterprises in the amount of \$33,311 for new footing and kickboards in the Equestrian Center jump arena.
 - o Create a Fence Task Force and approve the task force job description.
 - o Approve contingency funds of \$4,035 for Firehouse Farms for a pilot project using goats in Ken-Caryl Open Space for weed management. The motion passed 4:1 with Tom Bratschun opposed.
 - o Appoint members to the Dog Park Task Force, contingent on approval from the Metropolitan District Board. Members are Betsy Bellissimo, Jimmy Land, Chris Loring, Wes Morris, Christie Morton, Erinn Philpot, Max Reiner and Joanne Russum.
 - o Appoint Gerry Bauer to serve as the Board representative for the Dog Park Task Force.
 - o Approve Van Matre Construction at a cost of \$62,613 plus a 20% contingency for a total of \$75,135 to perform structural repairs on the Shaffer Barn.
 - Public comment at the meeting addressed assorted topics, including appreciation for the Trail Club and community fire mitigation efforts, community composting, the Brannon Gearhart Park project and committee term limits.

Wildfire Risk Reduction

10 Safety Tips

Action Items to Improve Your Home's Survivability:

- **REMOVE** leaves, pine needles, and other flammable material from the roof, gutters, and on and under the deck to help prevent embers from igniting your home.
- **SCREEN** areas below decks and porches with 1/8" wire mesh to help prevent material from accumulating underneath.
- **COVER** exterior attic and soffit vents with 1/8" wire mesh to help prevent sparks from entering your home.
- **ENCLOSE** eaves to help prevent ember entry.
- **INSPECT** shingles or roof tiles. **REPLACE** missing shingles or tiles. **COVER** ends of tiles with bird stops or cement to help prevent ember penetration during a wildfire.

Tips for Landscaping Around Your Home

- **REMOVE** dead vegetation and other flammable materials, especially within the first 5 feet of the home.
- **KEEP** your lawn hydrated and maintained. If it is brown, cut it down to help reduce fire intensity.
- **PRUNE** tree limbs so the lowest branches are 6 to 10 feet above the ground to help reduce the chance of fire getting into the crowns of the trees.
- **MOVE** construction material, trash, and woodpiles at least 30 feet away from the home and other outbuildings.
- **DISPOSE** of branches, weeds, leaves, pine needles, and grass clippings that you have cut to reduce fuel for fire.

Tasks

- Review the current fencing ownership and maintenance status, including staining, for all fencing that borders Ken Caryl Ave., Continental Divide Rd., Chatfield Ave., Simms

- St., and Valley Parkway, as well as greenbelts, open space, and other areas as needed.
- Draft a proposal with recommendations.
- Solicit community input and consider the feedback as part of the proposal recommendations.
- The proposal should address inconsistencies with respect to the maintenance and replacement responsibilities.
- Explore additional fence designs and materials, with consideration given to Firewise materials.

Organization

- Comprised of no less than 3 and no more than 7 volunteer residents.
- Members will be appointed by the Master Association Board of Directors.
- Staff representatives from the Master Association and Metropolitan District (as needed).
- Representative from the Master Association Board.
- Representative from the Architectural Committee.
- Task Force has no decision-making authority. They will make recommendations, and decisions will be made by the Master Association Board.

Operations

- Members of the Task Force shall determine the meeting schedule and appoint a Chairperson.
- Submit timely, approved Task Force meeting minutes.
- All meetings will be held in open session, with members of the Association encouraged to attend and participate.
- Submit a proposal to the Master Association Board by September 2022.
- The Task Force will be disbanded upon presentation of the proposal to the Master Association Board.

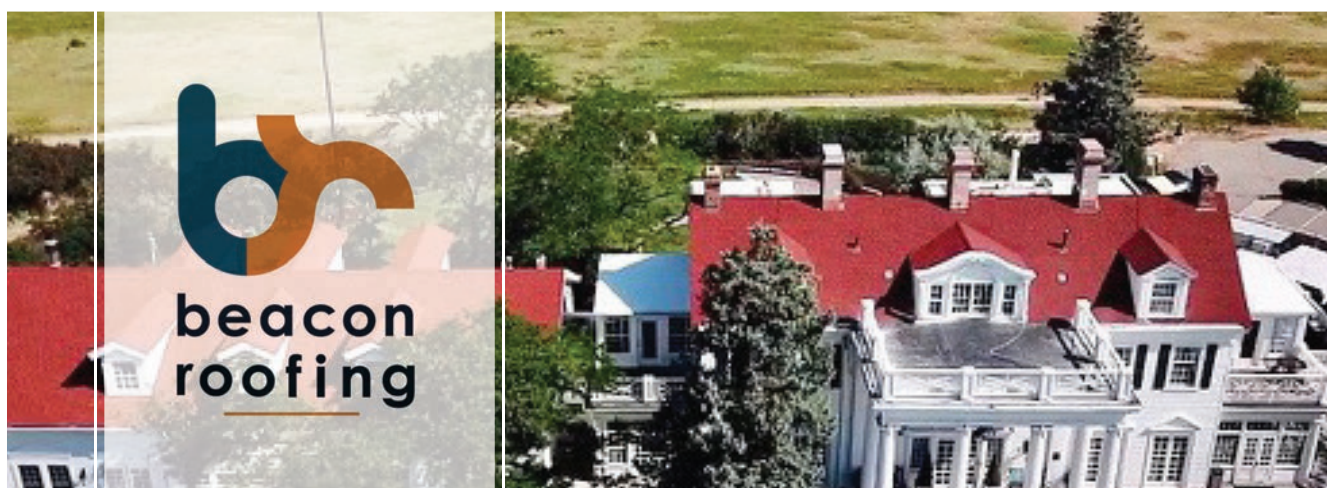
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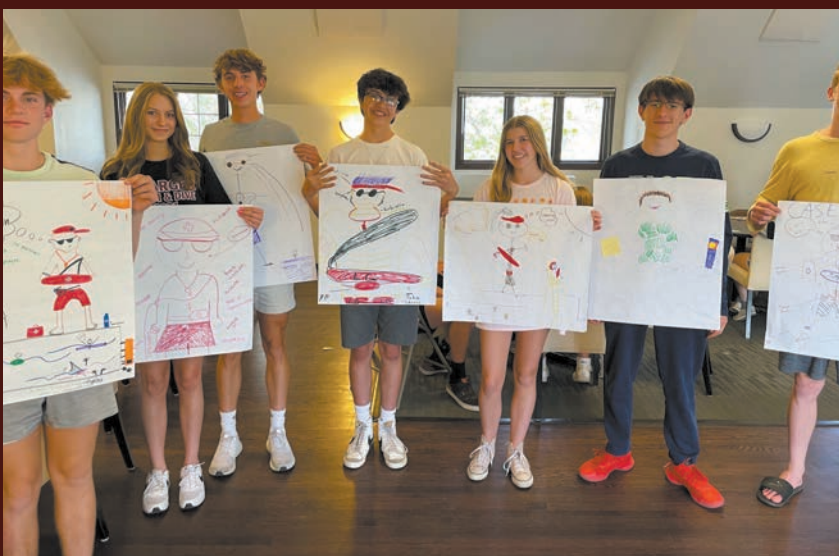

Three Generations of Ken-Caryl Residents: The Hafner Family

One of the neighbors up the street took me shopping to help furnish my college dorm. A handful of the neighbors also held a memorial run every year for eight years after she passed. Everyone is here for each other, in small and sometimes big

ways. When our son Leo was born last November, we had purchased this home, but hadn’t moved in yet, and one of our neighbors put up a sign in our front yard to welcome him to the neighborhood a couple days after he was born. You just don’t find that level of thoughtfulness very often.”

Grant and Kelly are delighted to be part of the Ken-Caryl community and look forward to providing Leo with the same wonderful childhood Grant experienced, in the safe, supportive, and beautiful community that is Ken-Caryl Ranch.

“It truly feels like we are living the American dream by living in Ken-Caryl,” said Kelly. “This is what most people strive for in life. A safe, warm, quiet place to call home for many years to come. I feel very fortunate that we get to live here and get to give Leo the best possible start in life by providing that perfect home base for him... It has been a really awesome experience to see how life can come full circle... my wish for Leo is that he enjoys his childhood in Ken-Caryl Ranch to the fullest, and can look back on it fondly, as his dad has.”

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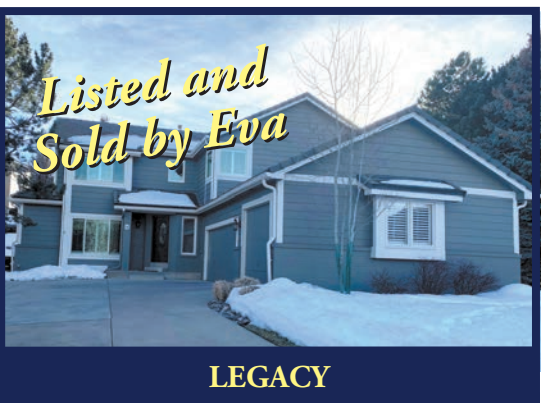
