The Ken-Caryl Ranch community has recently been engaged in efforts to research and/or provide expertise for several community-focused projects. The individuals involved in both these efforts deserve your praise and admiration for willingly participating in efforts to make their community a better place.

Dog Park Task Force

The Metropolitan District and Master Association engaged a group of residents to develop a feasibility report for a possible future dog park. The Dog Park Task Force was created, and members were appointed in the spring of 2022. They have worked over the course of the summer to complete the feasibility report. The report includes location options, ownership considerations, overall advantages and disadvantages, including neighbor and community support or opposition, and maintenance components, issues and challenges. The Task Force presented its findings at the Sept. 6 Joint Study Session. In this edition of “How Ken-Caryl Turns”, we will be reviewing Driveway Ramps Rules and Regulations, and a simple – yet important – change to the Landscaping Rules and Regulations. Details are:

3.13 Driveway Ramps:

Architectural Committee approval is required.

Any temporary driveway ramp shall have Committee approval prior to installation, and thereafter be carefully maintained and removed if no longer needed.

Driveway Ramps should be:

- Temporary in nature. No permanent driveway ramps will be allowed in Ken-Caryl Ranch. If a permanent solution is desired, the resident should work with Jefferson County Road & Bridge to navigate having a "California Curb" installed at the owner's expense.
- Must be professionally manufactured.
- Allow the free flow of water. Not dam or block debris.
- Solid black or gray in color. No additional colors or variations will be allowed.
- Removed when no longer needed/in use.

Submittal Shall Include:

- Location of driveway ramps
- Product information (including color, dimensions, material, and features)
- Picture of the front of your home

2.30 Landscaping (New, expanded, and altered)

Architectural Committee approval is required.

Any form of landscaping, such as retaining walls, sidewalks, gravel, rock, impervious surface material, structures, grass, trees, and shrubbery shall have Committee approval prior to installation, and thereafter be carefully maintained.

The committee seeks to achieve an aesthetically pleasing balance of planting and hardscape material within the lot. See Landscape Guidebook for landscape planning suggestions.

No plantings that are on the Jefferson County Noxious Weed list will be allowed to be planted on any lot within Ken-Caryl Ranch. Please visit www.jeffco.us for an updated list and classification of noxious weeds.

Submittal Shall Include:

- Plot plan showing the location of work
- List of planting materials and ground cover
- Illustration showing the work to be completed

Several residents have raised concerns about the planned removal of stop signs on Valley Parkway, particularly at the intersection of White Oak Drive. The County has heard your concerns and is now planning to install a pedestrian-actuated flashing sign in conjunction with the raised crosswalk at this intersection. Pedestrian-actuated flashing signs, also known as Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB), result in higher motorist compliance for yielding to pedestrians crossing a roadway. County staff supports this approach because the combination of the new raised crosswalks, new pedestrian-actuated flashing signs, and removal of the unwarranted stop signs will provide the greatest safety improvement, especially for students crossing Valley Parkway to access Bradford Primary School.

The County will host an informational session to provide project details and answer questions on Wednesday, Oct. 5 at 6 p.m. online via Microsoft Teams. Details will be available on the Ken-Caryl Ranch website under the Community Announcements section, in the e-News, and on the County's website.

Peak Fall Migration

Fall is in the air! Nature is cuing billions of birds that it is time for the fall trek south. Every year in North America, more than four billion birds travel south in the fall. More than 80 percent of them fly at night, navigating with the night sky, using the “sunset cue.” After sunset, the birds are left with only “stellar orientation” to guide them. “Stars are a visual stimulus that conveys directional information.”

Lights Out Colorado is a voluntary program to help educate Coloradans about the importance of turning off their outdoor lights in order to save millions of migratory birds. The September migration has already started, but the fall migration will peak in October. Lights Out Colorado asks communities to take this simple step that will have a huge impact on the safety of birds, especially during peak migration season.

Turn off all decorative outdoor lights at sunset

It is particularly important to take this measure early in the evening, as birds begin their nocturnal migration at dusk. This one action will help the birds navigate, by staying on course, preserving their energy for the long flight, and causing them less stress and confusion. In addition to helping the birds, this effort reduces energy use, saves you money, and opens up the wonders of the night sky. Lights Out Colorado!

Rangers Ask Residents
to Secure Garden, Yard
and Sports Equipment!

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Rangers frequently receive calls about young mule deer bucks with ribbon and/or small netting entangled and hanging from their antlers. If these deer can still see, feed and are mobile, the rangers treat these situations as “watch out” situations that can be deadly for a deer. Mule deer can become entangled in hammocks, sports equipment nets and porch swings, etc., this time of year. They may expend extra energy trying to remove the item and can even become more entangled!

What Residents can do:

- Remove sports equipment from the yard when not in use.
- Relocate sport nets or any structure up against the house or place in garage.
- Secure garden wire, cages, etc., or put away if not in use.
- Secure any swings on play sets at night by wrapping or moving the seats into the structure.
- Holiday decorations: do not spread wire, netting or decorations in yard, try to keep smaller, smooth items in yard that will fall off or bounce off antlers.

Members of the KCRMD Parks Department will be at the Equestrian Center to collect and chip SLASH, which are tree debris, loose pine needles, pinecones and tree bark that can easily ignite and fuel wildfires. The KCRMA Ranger staff will be offering resident SLASH collection and curbside pickup as a courtesy to residents. Residents who wish to participate in curbside collection must sign up prior to the event on the Firewise Resources page on our website at www.ken-carylranh.org, under the *Resident Resources* tab. Residents who schedule their SLASH curbside pickup are requested to place all SLASH out by their curb by 8 a.m. on Sept. 29 and Sept. 30, depending on their collection date. Registration is open and slots are limited, so be sure to secure your spot online!

Sign-up is not required for our drop-off event on Oct. 1. SLASH will be accepted at the Equestrian Center any time between 9 a.m. – 1 p.m.

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Local Sculptor Carol Grape Designs Inventive Messages on Civility

Long-time Ken-Caryl resident and talented artist Carol Grape has just returned home after premiering her new art exhibit, "Reverent Boundaries". Dr. Rebecca Bilbo, Chair of Thomas More University's Department of Creative Media, invited Carol to launch her art exhibit in their Eva Farris Art Gallery in Crestview Hills, Kentucky.

The artist received her MFA in sculpture from Kent State University in 1982, and after several years working and honing her craft in New York City, she and her husband, Mike D'Innocente, relocated to Northern Kentucky. Carol also worked as an arts administrator and instructor at the Art Academy of Cincinnati. Additionally, she served as the gallery director and adjunct instructor at Thomas More University. Starting her own jewelry business and authoring her own step-by-step jewelry making book further reflects her artistic abilities.

These achievements and many more were all before moving to our community in 2004. In 2005, Carol became president and owner of Grape Imaging, Ltd., where she did real estate photography until her retirement in 2021. Carol's energy and enthusiasm continues. She unselfishly dedicates hundreds of hours of her time sewing for nonprofit organizations. She takes an active role in various organizations. Carol is active in our Stratford Farms/Shaffer Hills neighborhood. She is the first to welcome new residents. If we need a neighbor's email address, she has it or will get it! She is our unofficial neighborhood communications director, creating flyers, making calls, sending emails, and organizing and hosting block parties.

Art is still Carol's primary means of expression. "Reverent Boundaries" stems from her observations before and during the pandemic where Carol states, "Since COVID, we have been setting up boundaries like social distancing, masks and hugging people less." She senses a lack of manners in society. This sentiment led her to utilize antique handkerchiefs in a very creative way. Over the years, she collected hundreds of handkerchiefs of various sizes and shapes. She sewed each hankie into a mask and beautifully embroidered 461 of them with messages of civility: Be Polite, Thank you, Please, Have Compassion, Pardon me, Excuse me, Be Kind. These

masks were then hung on clotheslines, attached with clothes pins and crisscrossed across the gallery. Her exhibit received rave reviews.

Congratulations Carol Grape! Hopefully, "Reverent Boundaries" will find its way to a gallery in our community soon. Meanwhile, we are so grateful to have you as a friend and neighbor.

"Reverent Boundaries" ran from Aug. 15 to Sept. 8 at Thomas More University in Northern Kentucky.

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Adam Scott Campbell's New Book Reminds Us that Angels Are Among Us

Two-time brain tumor survivor channels his pain into an inspiring new book of poetry

Adam Scott Campbell reminds us that there are angels among us in his new book, "Walking with My Angel," where the author channels his past struggles with loss and his own health to offer readers a message of hope and perseverance.

Campbell, who grew up on Elk Head Range Road in Sunset Ridge, attended Bradford Elementary, Deer Creek Middle School and Chatfield Senior High School. He recalls his childhood growing up in the Plains, finding solace and peace on the hiking trails that crisscross the foothills that reside in Ken-Caryl's open space. But tragedy would befall the Campbell family. The author was profoundly affected by the death of his infant brother when he was just five years old. As a nine-year-old, Campbell was diagnosed with his first brain tumor that was inhibiting blood flow to his brain, which required an extensive surgery that destroyed his equilibrium. Recovery was long. He had to relearn how to walk again. As a result of the surgery, he developed double vision and was forced to take medications and self-administered injections to achieve pubescence.

In tenth grade, Campbell's tumor returned. Once again, surgery was performed. Once again, he lost his equilibrium, having to relearn how to walk a second time. An additional brain surgery was required, followed by radiation treatment, six days a week for six weeks. The author's mind and body were exhausted. According to Campbell, he slept twenty hours a day. Recovery was long and extensive. Years later, he would still suffer the debilitating effects of his surgery, including morning

paralysis and bleeding on the brain. But still Campbell persevered. It was then he began channeling his pain to better understand the emotions and pain that came with having a brain tumor as a child. Writing became a means for survival, a method of working through his past experiences. His works mainly included poetry and became a compilation of poetic creation that culminated in the publishing of his first book, "Embattled We: A Poet's War." The book, published in 2017, served as a survival tool for others battling the same feelings of low self-worth, confusion, and depression.

However, in his darkest hour, in the midst of his health struggles, and on his hardest day, Campbell says his Angel appeared to him, and saved his life. According to the author, it was then a new condition emerged. Hope. That was the day he walked with his Angel, away from the darkness of his past struggles and into the light.

"When my Angel first came to me, it was February 2010," recalls Campbell. "I was nine months into a series of heavy, increasing, psychological breakdowns. This was the result of being on lowering medication, and for the last number of months, completely without medication. I was unable to communicate verbally. My mind was a war-swept battlefield. I had resigned myself, by this point, to the idea that my brain was going to shut down completely, and then I would die."

According to Campbell, his Angel appeared to him, just when he felt his life was slipping away, but She pulled him into the light.

"I heard the words, 'It's time,' spoken quietly into my mind," recalls Campbell. "In that moment, I felt and saw, an eternally powerful person, filled with light, rushing from God's presence, in heaven, straight to me. I felt and saw her for about two seconds. And then She engulfed me. That's the word I use to describe an eternal embrace. And the things I felt in that embrace, words don't adequately describe them. But I can say that I know what undying, pure love is. Most of my life I have not loved myself much, if at all. Being given that certain, personal proof that I am loved beyond what I can comprehend is so powerful. It was enough that I struggled afterward for a number of years to 'come down' from that experience. But I've come to accept that I have worth, and that I'm worthy of being loved. The struggle has not ceased, though it has eased, over time."

His experience moved him. Campbell began penning the poems that would

become "Walking With My Angel" in July of 2020. The first of those poems is "When An Angel Walks Beside You".

According to Campbell, he did not start with the intention to publish his works. He began writing because he felt that having an Angel was the greatest blessing, knowing there was someone who truly loved him.

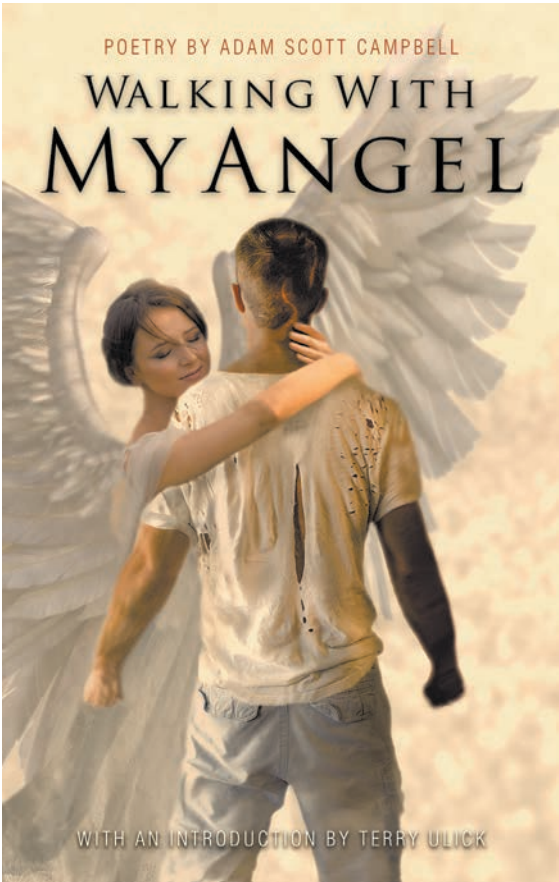
"My Angel, for me, is the embodiment of love," explains Campbell. "She is the reason I am able to hold onto hope. Every person has an angel or angels helping and striving to help them. They do not lose hope in us, even when we do. So yes, my Angel is very much a metaphor for hope."

Campbell adds that writing has become the backbone to his stability, progress, and happiness. It has been an integral part of his survival, and at times, his most viable outlet. He authors poems to let out inner stress and to help others through theirs, similar to a pressure release valve.

"To those who are struggling – you are here on earth, at this time, because of the power inside you," said Campbell. "This world needs you. When you are struggling, remember that others are watching, and that probably you're not aware of them for much of the time. They see you struggle. It is eternally better than if you quit struggling, trying, overcoming. So, keep struggling. Your impact for good is tremendous. Thank you for being willing to struggle."

"Walking with My Angel" is available for purchase on Amazon.com. You can also connect with Campbell via his website at adamscottcampbell.com. His current book endeavor is a fantasy novel called "The Dreamer". He also has plans to republish his original work, "Embattled We: A Poet's War".

"I hope and want readers to know that they never need to feel alone, that they have endless worth and tremendous power," says Campbell. "That they have angels in their lives, seen or unseen. That they can and will overcome their struggle. That they will capture their dreams. That they are the makers of their own success. Fight for your dreams. Through it all."

Remembering Charles "Chuck" Danford

Charles "Chuck" Danford of Littleton, Colorado, died peacefully at home on Aug. 19. He was 81 years old.

Chuck was a Colorado native. He was an Englewood High School graduate and the Colorado Institute of Art's inaugural Hall of Fame inductee.

He was well recognized and celebrated as a leader in the community through his professional career in graphic design as co-founder of Unit 1, Inc., and in his personal endeavors in fine art as a watercolorist, a wildlife photographer, mentor and teacher.

Chuck taught watercolor classes for many years at the Ken-Caryl Ranch House. Often students would take his class consecutively, session upon session. Chuck would say it often became more of a "social hour" than a traditional "art class" and everyone was perfectly fine with that. As a long-time member of The Colorado Watercolor Society, Chuck was honored when the "Chuck Danford Celebration Award" was established, to be given annually in his name. Just over a year ago, our Architectural Committee updated our “Lighting Rules and Regulations” to be more in line with the “Five Principles for Responsible Outdoor lighting” that are recommended by IDA and Lights Out Colorado. The main purpose of the new regulations is to reduce nighttime

light pollution, including glare, that results in light trespass. According to IDA, “Light pollution is considered the inappropriate, or excessive use of artificial light...a sensory pollutant, much like noise... causing a reduction in the physical quality of the environment through the senses.”

To show their commitment to educating residents about the importance of restraint in excessive outdoor lighting and ways to be healthy, stay safe, save energy, help nocturnal wildlife and generally be dark-sky friendly, our community is hosting a “Good Neighbor Presentation” alongside a nocturnal, “Creatures of the Night” program with live animals.

You may think of yourself as a “good neighbor,” however, you may be just a fair-weather day time good neighbor. Are you a good nighttime neighbor as well? Now, you can find out!

Mark your calendars for Friday, Oct. 14 at 6 p.m. at the Dakota Lodge in the Ken-Caryl Valley. Children over age 5 are welcome. Touching or petting the ambassadors is prohibited. There is no charge to attend.

Ryan Parker with the Colorado Chapter of the International Dark Sky Association will present the Good Neighbor portion of the program. Andrew Barron and Shauni Schermerhorn with Nature’s Educators, a non-profit organization that

connects people to the environment by teaching about other creatures that share our space, will lead the “Creatures of the Night” portion of the program.” By connecting with our ambassadors and learning their personal stories, audience members will understand the importance of conservation,” and the importance of being good nighttime neighbors to all life, human and wild.

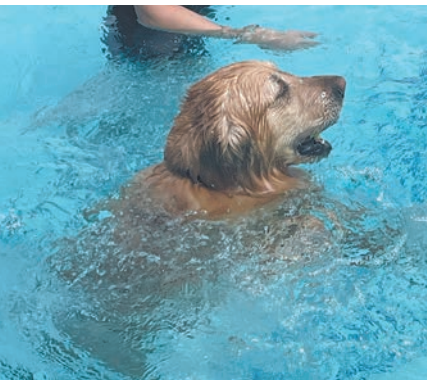
