



KCRMD Fiscal Responsibility

There is a pretty amazing story behind the 2024 Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Budget, formally approved by the District Board on Jan. 8.

Some background. Ken-Caryl has two budgets. Your Metro District (Ken-Caryl's parks and recreation services Board, funded by property taxes and program user fees) is managed separately, but cooperatively with the KCRMA (Ken-Caryl's Master Association Board, funded mainly by HOA dues), which approved its budget in November.

Capturing property taxes locally makes up about 60 percent of the District's revenue. But state Ballot Initiative HH in November – and math spun during the special Colorado legislative session that followed its defeat – meant it was anyone's guess as to how much property tax revenue would stay right here in Ken-Caryl. Potential revenue forecasts for us varied by as much as \$800,000 and wouldn't really be sorted out until late December.

That meant District staff had to essentially prepare multiple budget concepts for our fall budget meetings – and without much time in December to make final adjustments.

And they did it. Congratulations to District Manager Traci Wieland, District Finance Director Lauren Feeney and all of the department heads in parks and recreation. You did an amazing job working not only to put this budget together, but to create a culture in our administration that rolls up their sleeves and solves problems while working with and listening to the community to do so.

The balanced budget we filed:


- Invests \$1.4 million in 2024 in much-needed parks and facilities improvements Ranch-wide. That's the third consecutive year the District has made this level of investment while still maintaining a healthy fund balance and keeping services.
- Improves and focuses on District programs and services for our community while actually decreasing FTEs (full-time equivalents) over the past five years. We've taken measures to retain qualified staff who provide services to the community. Any of you who are in service businesses right now know how difficult it is to find and retain staff in the current labor environment. These services are part of what make Ken-Caryl special and this Board and our administration have been proactive in keeping that a priority.
- Maintains a healthy fund balance, while earmarking \$2.25 million of the fund balance into the re-instituted Capital Reserve fund this year.

The District Board has been discussing for about 18 months how to fund continuation of the District's 10-year capital plan over the coming years without asking Ken-Caryl Ranch residents for any effective tax increase. One such option – asking voters to consider retaining the existing 10-year bond levy from 2014 as an operations mill to fund capital projects – will continue to be fully vetted. The 2021 Community Survey showed considerable support for this approach.

Happy 2024, Ken-Caryl!

I hope you are all settling into the new year! Often as we are hunkered down in our homes to stay warm through the winter, we dream of being outside working on some exterior improvements to get a jump on a project, so we are ready when the weather warms up to enjoy Colorado's beautiful wonders! That being said, I would urge you to get a jump on submittals for your projects early! Once spring break gets here, requests for approvals pour in faster than spring rains! To avoid having to wait for an extended period, get

them in early. During the winter months, we survey the neighborhoods for exterior paint, driveways, fences and roofs. These items are given a timeline of 180 days to cure.

I understand these projects are costly, so I am always happy to work with you. When you are ready to submit your improvements, please provide as much information as you can to avoid delays.

1.Exterior Painting – Please submit a photo of the front elevation of your home, including the roof. Be sure to provide the brand and colors that you want to paint your home and make sure to specify the field, trim and accent colors. If you have a shed in your yard, remember that it must also be painted to match the color of your home if you decide to change your home's existing colors.

2. Driveways and Sidewalks - Please submit a current photo of your driveway and front walk and include a sketch of the area that you want to replace. Just a reminder that if you have a two-car garage, you may only extend it to the edge of either side of your garage. An extra parking pad is not permitted.

3. Fences - Please refer to Ken-Caryl's fencing guidelines for your neighborhood on our website. If you have any questions on fencing, please reach out.

4. Roofing and Solar Panels - For roof replacement, we will need a photo of the front elevation of your home, including any stone or brick on your home. For solar panels, solar companies will prepare the information for you to provide to us.

I hope this helps make the exterior request easier for you. The exterior project portal is easily accessible on our website at ken-carylranch.org, then click on the home improvement icon located in the upper right corner of your screen.

Muddy Trails

Use of muddy trails is a concern of many land management agencies. Extended use of muddy trails can lead to erosion, and users can create additional trail widening by going around muddy sections. Because of this, KCR Rangers follow a trail closure policy for times when trails are muddy enough to cause damage to the trail tread.

Throughout the winter and shoulder seasons, the ranger staff evaluates and closes trails when they are determined to be too muddy for sustainable

use. The area of the open space that is currently monitored for muddy conditions is the lower Cougar/ Bluebird/Colorow Trail area. This area was determined, in conjunction with the Open Space Committee, to be sensitive to erosion, and receives high trail use throughout the year.

Trail Closure Site Details:

- Cougar Trail entrance from Valley Parkway the gate entrance to the Cougar Trail is locked and a temporary sign is posted notifying users that the trail is closed for muddy conditions.
- Cougar Trail/Bluebird Trail intersection a chain gate blocks either the Cougar Trail or Bluebird Trail (depending on which area is closed) and a sign notifies users that the trail is closed.
- Colorow Trail/Massey Draw Trail intersection a chain gate and sign are located approximately 30 feet from the Massey Draw intersection. The sign notifies users that the trail is closed.
- Golden Banner Trail/Cougar Trail A permanent post and sign cautions trail users that access to lower trails may be cut off during muddy trail closures. The Rangers use the following trail closure protocol when evaluating the area:
- 1. Staff check the area between 12-3 p.m. every day. During this time, maximum thawing will occur, and muddy conditions are at their peak.
- 3. Staff determine whether the trail tread can be navigated without damage to the trail. Trail traffic signs and slide marks from other users, and boot marks from the ranger walking the trail are some signs that are analyzed.
- 4. To close the trail area, the above indicators must represent over 50% of the designated area.
- 5. If the area is to be closed, staff update the Ken-Caryl Ranch website and Facebook page accordingly.


Evaluations of the closed trail area occur daily to determine if the area can be reopened. If the trail adequately dries out and the closure is lifted, the rangers remove all barricades and signs so trail use in the area can resume, and the Ken-Caryl Ranch website and Facebook page are updated.

Ranger staff regularly patrol the closed areas to make sure users are not recreating in these areas during the closure. If a user is found recreating in a closed section, they can be issued a contact notice for violating Rule #3 in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space and Park Use Rules ("...use or occupancy of parks and open space during such lands are administratively closed to use is prohibited.")

While the lower Cougar/Bluebird/ Colorow Trail area is currently the only part of the open space that has muddy trail closures, please follow these winter trail use tips on all open space trails to minimize your impact:

- Avoid muddy trails: Ruts and hoof prints damage the trail and must be repaired.
- If you leave tracks, turn back: If you're leaving tracks, then the trail is too wet. Please turn around and come back when conditions are drier. Horses are particularly damaging to wet trails.
- Wait 48: It is good practice to wait 48 hours after any significant rainfall, or after snow has melted.
- If you find yourself in mud unexpectedly, go through it: Do not go off-trail to avoid the mud. This widens the trail, kills vegetation and increases erosion.

Winter is a great time to get out and recreate in the open space, but before you do, please make sure you check the Ken-Caryl Ranch website and Facebook page for up-to-date information on closures, and always follow signs and postings when out on the trails! 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transitions to bi-weekly recycling collection services on May 1. Until then, all recycling, including broken down boxes, smaller totes and neatly piled/broken down recycling items placed outside of bins will still be collected. We have contacted Waste Connections to ensure that drivers are aware that they should be collecting all recycling items, each week, until the transition to bi-weekly services begins on May. 1. Once the new contract goes into effect, only recycling in approved Waste Connections totes will be collected. We are also working on extensive communications regarding the change, including information on tote sizes/dimensions, so please stay tuned to this publication and all of Ken-Caryl's communications channels for more information. Community Service

The first scholarship focus is on community service. To be eligible to receive this scholarship, the applicant must include a one-page, self-written essay on community service that describes: 1. what the applicant thinks is meant by community service, and 2. his/her own contributions in the way of community service.

Civil Discourse

The second scholarship focus is on civil discourse. To be eligible to receive this scholarship, the applicant must include a one-page, self-written essay on any controversial subject showing how to compromise and solve a problem. In summary, how vigorous disagreements, expressed with civility and respect can strengthen our pluralistic nation.

Colorado Squeezing Water from Urban Landscapes

Pace of transition has accelerated, deepened and broadened

Like weekly haircuts for men, a regularly mowed lawn of Kentucky bluegrass was long a prerequisite for civic respectability in Colorado's towns and cities. That expectation has begun shifting. A growing cultural norm blesses a broader range of respectable landscapes, which require not much more water than what occurs naturally across most of Colorado. Denver, for example, averages 15.6 inches annually.

Native grasses, most prominently buffalo and blue grama, need half to one-third as much of the supplemental water a year required to keep Kentucky bluegrass — a species native to Europe — bright green. In metro Denver, for example, Westminster and Broomfield estimate that these cool-season grasses require 24 to 29 inches of supplemental water annually in addition to the 15 to 16 inches of average precipitation. Other water-wise landscape choices can also ratchet down water requirements by at least half.

Many homeowners have the additional goal of installing shrubs, flowers and other plants that attract pollinators.

The shift can be traced back to at least 1981, when Denver Water coined the term "xeriscape" to reflect landscaping choices that use less water The drive to cut excessive water use for landscapes picked up significantly during and after the searing drought of 2002. When that drought ended, many consumers retained their new, more judicious habits of irrigation. Now, say water providers and others, the pace of transition has accelerated, deepened and broadened. If still far from universal, Coloradans have started developing a new aesthetic around urban landscapes. What is required to be a responsible homeowner and property manager is being redefined. With Colorado River water woes still unresolved and depletion of aquifers in the Denver Basin and elsewhere continuing, Big Pivots in collaboration with Aspen Journalism set out to understand water devoted to urban landscapes in Colorado. This is the

first of five stories about this giant and probably long-term shift in how we use water in urban landscapes.

Nobody argues that this shift alone will solve Colorado's water challenges. Water devoted to lawns and other urban landscapes constitutes just 3% to 4% of Colorado's total water consumption. Nonetheless, that use is being questioned as never before.

Western Slope residents have long objected to de-watering of rivers and streams for lawns along the Front Range. Now, water utilities on both sides of the Continental Divide see more-judicious use of water as being the most cost-effective strategy in serving larger populations in a hotter and possibly drier climate. And many homeowners have decided that by replacing imported varieties of turf with native plants, they can be part of the solution to declining populations of pollinating insects.

Colorado legislators have passed several laws in recent years to curb standard turf-growing practices. In January [2024], they will be asked to approve a bill that would require local governments and homeowners' associations to ban the installation, the planting or the placement of new nonfunctional turf, artificial turf or invasive plant species in commercial, institutional or industrial properties. The bill takes aim at purely aesthetic non-functional turf along roads and in medians. Residential homes would be exempted from the prohibition. Non-functional turf generally means grass intended to be seen but rarely, if ever, touched by human feet. "This is the first year that we have seen more than 10,000 people participating in our various waterconservation programs, which tells us that this is rapidly becoming the new norm in Colorado," said Resource Central CEO Neal Lurie, referring to lower-water landscapes. "What happens is one person makes a change in their yard and their neighbors come over and ask, 'What are you doing?"

Growing awareness of water scarcity also drives these altered sensibilities as well as new government regulations limiting outdoor water use. Declined flows in the Colorado River figure prominently in the thinking of many individuals but also public officials.

Colorado gets 83% of its water from rivers, streams and other surface sources, while the other 17% comes from groundwater, according to the 2023 Colorado Water Plan. Agriculture uses about 90% of Colorado's water, towns and cities 7%, and industry 3%. Within urban areas, outdoor irrigation consumes roughly 50% of water.

Lessened demand from landscaping means less need for costly new infrastructure. It also makes water utilities more resilient in the face of drought. Landscapes can sparkle with little water. Actually, they can be even brighter at times. After all, the "perfect" lawn is a monotone, unblemished by yellow dandelions or anything else.

Still other water providers have been motivated simply by a desire to leave water in streams and rivers. That's the case in Vail, which is landlocked with no expectations of significant expansion. There, the town has been replacing waterconsumptive Kentucky bluegrass in town parks since 2019 with lessthirsty native species. This year's projects also include removal of grass from an on-ramp to Interstate 70. Denver Water in 1981 coined the term "xeriscape," combining the Greek prefix "xero," which means dry, with landscape. Water conservation advocates now rarely use it. They say too many people take it to mean zerolandscape, and for many, that means rocks and cactus. Yards of gravel are anathema to landscape architects. Not only are gravel yards boring, but they contribute to the heat-island effect of urban areas. As the word "xeriscape" falls out of favor, it is being replaced with new words: water-wise, water-efficient and Coloradoscape. "There is no agreement yet" on which should be the commonly accepted phrase, said Lindsay Rogers of Western Resource Advocates, a

group that has devoted substantial resources to the shift.

"We want climate-appropriate landscapes in Colorado that are verdant and beautiful and use native plants but also use less water than Kentucky bluegrass," she said.





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

Dear Editor

Editor's note: The following is Part 2 of a continued letter to the editor, authored by resident Kathy Webster, that ran in the Jan. 3 issue of Life at Ken-Caryl. With the author's consent, this letter is the second part of a continuation that will be published over the next several issues to ensure that it is printed in its entirety as the author intended.

... The pine forests of the Ken-Caryl foothills provide favored habitat for the threatened flammulated owl (Psiloscops flammeolus). This tiny, reddish owl is scarcely larger than a small juice can. It is a cavity nester and is sensitive to habitat disruption. According to Owl Search Institute, "Flammulated owls are very particular when it comes to picking a nest site and habitat. This makes this species extremely vulnerable to small habitat and ecosystem changes." It eats few vertebrates, spending its time foraging for insects, especially, crickets, moths and beetles. Following the food source, most flammulated owls migrate to Mexico in the winter.

There are 117 plants on the CPW list of "Listed Endangered" and "Listed Threatened." A few of the listed endemic plants include Wild Buckwheat, Penland Penstemon, and Pagosa Skyrocket. Please visit CPW's website for a complete list of endangered and threatened animals and plants in Colorado.

Ken-Caryl has the Bell's Twinpod (Physaria bellii) that is endangered. It is native to the Front Range Foothills and is found in only three counties of Colorado, one being Jefferson. It is a perennial forb related to the mustard family. "This plant forms a halo around the grayish-green rosette of leaves, which describes the inflated fruits that appear..." It grows in very specific habitat, which is provided in the loose rocky shale and limestone soils where the Mountains meets the Plains. Denver Botanic Gardens has been banking seeds of the Twinpod for a decade.

The rocky, sandy soils of the foothills of Ken-Caryl is also home to a threatened native grass, the Purple Threeawn (Aristida purpurea) that helps prevent soil erosion. It provides food, habitat and protection for many wildlife users, such as, grassland birds, shrubland birds, pollinators, invertebrates and small mammals.

Nationally, and five decades later, the ESA boasts a stunning record of success. It has prevented the extinction of approximately 300 species. More than 99% of the species under its care have been saved or are under a recovery plan.


