The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board adopted the 2024 Master Association Budget with a \$4 per month dues increase. **This will** bring the total monthly dues amount to \$68 for residential, \$56 for apartments and \$52 per acre for commercial properties, effective Jan. 1, 2024. If you set up your own automatic bill payments through your bank or SmartStreet, you must update the payment amount. If you have ACH automatic payments through our system, your dues payment will automatically update. Holiday Trash Delays and 2024 Recycling Update

Holiday Trash Delays

Just a friendly reminder from the Ken-Caryl Ranch trash service provider, Waste Connections, that both Christmas and New Year's Day are observed holidays. All trash and recycling service the weeks of Christmas and New Year's will be delayed one day.



2024 Recycling Update

Waste Connections will continue to provide trash and recycling collection services to Ken-Caryl residents in 2024. At its Oct. 24 meeting, the MA Board approved a motion for Waste Connections to continue to provide weekly trash service collection but to change from the current weekly recycling service to biweekly recycling starting on May 1, 2024.

Beginning May 1, 2024, Waste Connections services will include weekly collection of up to 6 cans or bags of household trash AND up to 6 bags or bundles of household yard debris. Recycling will transition to a bi-weekly schedule and must be placed in a Waste Connections provided receptacle. Additional recycling receptacles will be available to residents who require more than one receptacle for a \$6/month per additional receptacle service fee.

The Master Association is also looking into alternative recycling tote and receptacle sizes to accommodate resident garage room and sizing.

Stay tuned for additional information on the changes in upcoming communications from the Master Association!

Residents can expect weekly trash and recycling services pick-ups to continue on their regularly scheduled pick-up days until May 1, 2024, when bi-weekly recycling will officially begin. If you have any questions, please contact MA General Manager Brian Yowell at briany@kcranch.org.



Be Sure to Update Your 2024 Dues **Payments**

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board adopted an HOA dues increase in 2024 at their Nov. 14 meeting. There will be a \$4 per month dues increase for all Ken-Caryl residents effective Jan. 1, 2024. This will bring your monthly Master Association dues to \$68 for residential, \$56 for apartments and \$52 per acre for commercial properties. Please make sure to update your bank autopayments to the new dues amount to avoid receiving an outstanding balance letter at the end of January. If you pay your dues through our free ACH program, you will not have to add another thing to your to-do list. Your payment to the new amount will update automatically and January's dues will be pulled on Jan. 5.

If you live in a sub-association, any potential dues increases will be communicated by your subassociation directly.

There will also be fees increases for Equestrian Center boarders, as well as increased advertising costs for the Life at Ken-Carvl.

The Board's decision to increase dues is to help offset increased operational expenses for the MA and continue our focus on fire mitigation efforts, perimeter fence improvements and maintenance of our assets. 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Safely Hazing Wildlife

Rangers receive phone calls from residents throughout the year on what they can do to deter wildlife from visiting their property, or what to do if they encounter an animal on their property or in the open space. Here are a few helpful tips:

- Remember, if approached by a coyote, deer, or bear, do not run or turn your back on it. Be as big and loud as possible.
- Wave arms and yell in an authoritative voice or open jacket and wave in the air.
- Turn on sprinklers or spray with a garden hose.
- Throw rocks, sticks, tennis balls or anything else you can find.
- Bang a pot and pan together for noise.
- Sling a rock using a slingshot at the rear of the animal and avoid the face.
- Turn on flood lights at night.
- Shake or throw a shaker can, which is a soda can filled with pennies or pebbles and sealed with duct tape.
- Make noise with an air horn, whistle or other noise makers. Blow your car horn if available.
- Spray pepper spray if the animal gets too close to you.
- Use a paintball gun to scare them off, but avoid making contact with the animal. Remember, the intent is to scare, not injure them!

The main goal is to make animals that are a nuisance to humans **uncomfortable** and to **instill** a fear of humans and leave the area. Fireworks are prohibited in Jefferson County and cannot be used as a deterrent. Do not harass or injure the animals using BB, pellet, or airsoft guns as this will make the situation worse and can lead to death of the animal and potential fines. Cut-Your-Own-Christmas-Tree Program enjoys a second successful season

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Open Space Department, Open Space Committee and Board of Directors, in accordance with the Ken-Caryl Ranch Forest Stewardship Plan, approved a second season of the Cut-Your-Own-Christmas Tree Program as a nice addition to Ken-Caryl's annual Christmas Tree Sale.

The program provides the community with an option to register for a permit, limited to 75 permits, one per family, to hike in the open space and cut up to three Christmas trees per permit. The cost of the permits was \$10, and all proceeds went to offsetting Open Space Department expenses.

We are pleased to announce that once again, all available permits were purchased, raising \$750!

The goal of the program was to take areas that are not as accessible to bulk forest operations and allow volunteers to cut their own trees in designated areas where regeneration of Douglas Fir trees were reaching such a height that it begins to act as a ladder fuel for wildfire.

Fuel for the Fire

The first time I visited Ken-Caryl Ranch was in September 1978, when the west wall of the Valley was burning.

The smoke and flames of the Murphy Gulch Fire were plainly visible in downtown Denver, and my employers at 9News dispatched me to film the story. It was a couple of days after the fire had been ignited by children playing with fire or fireworks in a gulch west of the Ranch.

When I arrived in the Valley, fire fighters were climbing a slope north of Massey Draw to extinguish spot fires. I was young and foolish, so I picked up my 16mm film camera and tagged along. Then, of course, the wind shifted, and we all scrambled back down the hill. The breeze at our backs sent sparks and embers over our heads and down to the Valley floor.

At the time, the Valley was still a working cattle ranch with no suburban homes, much as you see in the photo below, from the KCR Historical Committee. The grass had been grazed down to bare dirt at the end of the season. There was no vegetation or structure to catch the burning embers, and I saw no fires below. On the hill behind us, though, the fire burned brush and timber on more than 3,300 acres of what is now our Foothills Open Space.

The Ranch has changed since 1978. The Valley floor today, pictured in this article in color by photographer John Rodell, from a vantage point matching the historic photo. In the community below, there are myriad clusters of pines, spruce trees, and everflammable junipers, ready to catch a burning ember. There are broad decks made of wood or of equally

combustible composite decking. And, of course, there are houses, hundreds of them. Many, like mine, still bear the original wood siding.

Developers began building these houses several years after the Murphy Gulch Fire. I was tracking the construction because I thought the Valley might be a nice place to live if it wasn't burning. So, in 1985, my wife and I bought a house west of the barns, and I began landscaping our yard.

One would think that I would have been fire-conscious, given my history with the KCR Valley. Instead, I wanted to conserve water, so I planted a dozen dryland pines and even more junipers. I also installed a big redwood deck and a wooden swing set for the kids. And I thought our original cedarshake roof was just great.

Later, I awoke to the fact that we were living in "the Red Zone" for wildfire hazard. Firefighters now call it the "WUI," the Wildland Urban Interface.

So, I removed the junipers and all but four of the pine trees, replaced the cedar-shake roof with steel shingles, and improved the deck to Class A fire-resistant planking. Next, I probably should replace the wood siding with fiber-cement.

I have joined the Firewise Committee, and we routinely distribute information advising homeowners to modify their homes. I have heard the naysayers argue that there is no efficient mitigation technique. IF a wildfire comes to your neighborhood, they say, you might as well just bend over and kiss your house goodbye.

But I have visited homes, even entire communities, which conducted fuel mitigation programs that helped them survive wildfire. Even during the ultradestructive Marshall Fire in southern Boulder County, I saw a mitigated home on the west side of Superior go untouched, while an unmitigated home a hundred yards away burned to the ground. The owners of the surviving home had removed evergreens and replaced wooden fencing, siding, and roof. Their home is a survivor.

I would like my home to be a survivor.






Photo of the Ken-Caryl Valley, during its early development.



Being surrounded by nature gives such a feeling of

peace and joy. I cannot imagine living anywhere else."

Professionally, Shannon formerly played the role of attorney. Currently, she shares health and wellness through her business, is a certified health coach, life coach and energy healer. Helping people live their best lives is her passion. She is in the process of writing two children's books and is currently focusing on writing a workshop booklet to coincide with the release of her new book. Shannon also has aspirations of offering a workshop or book club to complement her book.

"Two of my beta readers had suggested to me to offer a workshop or a sort of a book club to go with my book, and they made the suggestion


within 24 hours of each other," said Shannon. "So, I knew it was something that had to be done. Right now, I'm working on a workshop booklet to go along with my book. I
