

Funding Our Future

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board has been discussing conceptual strategies for future funding of long-term capital needs for nearly two years. The Board has directed use of excess revenues over expenditures and fund balance to complete these projects in the short term. However, financial forecasting of the Capital Reserve Fund has revealed that revenues may not be enough to continue with the full maintenance of the District's capital infrastructure in the long term.



In analyzing the financial forecasting, the District will likely be able to maintain daily operational functions funded through the General Fund, including recreation programs, events, facility rentals, park maintenance, etc., through 2034. However, without additional funding sources, the Capital Reserve Fund experiences a revenue shortfall in 2028, resulting in the inability to complete critical infrastructure and capital improvement and maintenance projects.

The District's voters approved the current bond repayment mill levy as part of the issuance of General Obligation Bonds in 2014. This mill levy and repayment are set to expire in December 2024. The District could seek voter approval to convert a portion of the expiring bond mill levy into a general operating mill levy to fund long-term capital needs.



A Cleaner, Greener Summer!

Hello, Ken-Caryl Ranch! Let's have a cleaner, greener community this summer!

After the crazy rain we had last summer and the unbelievable number of weeds, and before the start of planting season, I urge you to start getting ahead of leaves that were left behind after the first snowfall as well as the dried-up weeds, pinecones and pine needles that are lurking under bushes, rock beds,



- 1. **Remove Debris:** Use a rake to gently remove dead leaves, sticks, twigs and other debris that have accumulated over the winter months. Clearing away this debris helps to prevent it from smothering new growth and allows air and sunlight to reach the soil and plants.
- 2. **Be Gentle Around Sprouting Plants:** Take care when raking around emerging plants to avoid damaging them or accidentally pulling them out of the ground. Work carefully and slowly, using a lighter touch in areas where you see new growth.
- 3. **Inspect For Weeds:** While raking, keep an eye out for any early signs of weeds starting to emerge. Pulling them out now can help prevent them from establishing themselves and competing with your desired plants later in the season.
- 4. **Consider Mulching:** Once you've cleared away debris, consider adding a fresh layer of mulch to your garden beds. Mulch helps to retain moisture, suppress weeds and regulate soil temperature, all of which support healthy plant growth. Please be sure to follow Firewise guidelines when putting down mulch.
- 5. **Tend To Your Lawn:** Raking your lawn in the spring can help to remove dead grass, thatch and debris, allowing new grass blades to emerge more easily. This process also helps to aerate the soil and promote better water and nutrient absorption.

Overall, spring raking is an important part of maintaining a healthy and vibrant outdoor space. By taking the time to clear away debris and care for your plants and lawn, you'll set the stage for a successful growing season ahead.

I hope you all have a great start to spring! In the spirit of "spring" cleaning, be sure to mark your calendars for this year's Annual Recycling Event on Saturday May 4 at the Ranch House! Keep an eye out for more details to come.




Promoting Compliance with Educational Signs

The KCRMA Rangers are always creating and installing educational signs in the community.

Signage can be viewed at trailheads, intersections and inside the kiosk display cases.

These signs are intended to help inform residents, protect open space and educate users on trail use guidelines. Rangers constantly rotate and post signage throughout the year to provide updates on issues that are important to open space.



- Avoid Muddy Trails: Ruts and hoof-prints damage the trail and must be repaired by trail crews.
- Wait 48: It's a good rule of thumb to wait 48 hours after any significant rainfall or after snow has melted.
- If you Leave Tracks, Turn Back: If you're leaving tracks, then the trail is too wet. Please turn around and come back when conditions are drier. Horses are particularly damaging to wet trails.
- If You Find Yourself in Mud Unexpectedly, Just go Through it: Do not go off trail to avoid the mud. This widens the trail, kills plants and increases erosion.
- In Winter: Trails are generally more solid in the morning and get sloppier in the afternoon.
- Flowing water: If water is actively flowing down the trail, it's best to avoid that section.
- Hardpacked Trails: Opt for hardpacked trails with good drainage.
 Remember, responsible trail use benefits everyone. Use of muddy trails can lead to erosion, damage and loss of our favorite trail spots. So, let's tread lightly and enjoy the trails while preserving them.

Colorado River **Crisis Looms Over** State's Landscape **Decisions**

Do we really need thirsty non-native grasses in road medians? Colorado will consider curbs on water use for imported turf species.

The deepening troubles of the Colorado River, a significant source of water for most of Colorado's 5.9 million residents, has implications for the types of grasses we grow in our yards and in street medians.

Speaking in Las Vegas recently, former Arizona Gov. and former U.S. Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt recalled warnings of worsening drought and imbalances between supplies and demand. "There's going to be a day of reckoning," Babbitt, 85, told Politico's E&E News, referring to the warnings of scientists during past decades. "Here we are. The crisis has arrived."

Colorado's mounting efforts to limit new expanses of thirsty turf won't solve the Colorado River problems. Colorado is just one of seven states in the basin. And even within Colorado, agriculture consumes roughly 90% of Colorado's water and cities about 7%. Exterior use, such as for watering thirsty Kentucky bluegrass yards, consumes 40% to 60% of municipal water.

But if this water use is on the margins, it's one that many water managers believe must be addressed. A bill that originated in the state's Water Resources and Agriculture Review Committee in October has the support of two of the state's largest cities and has sponsors from both political parties from across Colorado.

This proposal would preclude the installation of nonfunctional turf as well as artificial turf in commercial, institutional or industrial properties or in transportation corridors, such as along streets or in road medians. Nonfunctional turf is defined as grasses that are predominantly ornamental — and that few will ever walk on unless to mow, yet still require heavy watering. Think, for example, of those giant carpets of green grass that commonly surround business parks such as the Denver Tech Center or Broomfield's Inverness business park.

The bill, however, does not address residential water use.

Many urban landscapes in Colorado are planted in Kentucky bluegrass and other thirsty species that require close to double what the semiarid climate delivers. Native grasses such as blue gramma and even some imported species can survive with far less or even no supplemental water.

Continued population growth

also adds pressure to city water utilities. The Colorado Water Plan projects growth of the state's current population to at least 7.7 million by 2050, mostly along the Front Range.

Legislators have been advised by the state's Colorado River Drought Task Force to bump funding to \$5 million per year for turf removal. In 2022, they allocated \$2 million, which has now been exhausted in grants to local jurisdictions.

Also informing Colorado's path forward will be recommendations from another task force, appointed by Gov. Jared Polis last January, to investigate opportunities for an accelerated transformation in use of water in urban landscapes. The 21 committee members were drawn from the ranks of local governments, academia, environmental advocacy groups and developers.

At their eight meetings, committee members wrestled with what should be the proper mix of incentives and mandates and ultimately just how far the state should push into matters of local land use. One member suggested that banning new turf in road medians was a no-brainer. Another member urged flexibility for local jurisdictions to achieve state goals. "We're going to be on this journey for a long time," said Catherine Moravec of Colorado Springs Utilities. "Less controversy will help keep us together."

In final meetings, now concluded, members agreed on the need to support state legislation. The Colorado Water Conservation Board, which oversaw the process, emphasizes that the task force's report will have no direct connection to legislation. The task force's pending report "may be used by decision-makers at state, local or even neighborhood scales," said Jenna Battson, the agency's outdoor water conservation coordinator. "It's a

Changing the status quo

Water scarcity underlies all these discussions. Specific circumstances vary. Some jurisdictions, most notably those between Denver and Colorado Springs, depend upon receding underground aquifers for most of their water. They get very little or no Colorado River water.

Most other jurisdictions do rely upon the Colorado River. Ambiguity has long dogged the Colorado River Compact, the agreement reached by delegates from the seven basin states in 1922. What if runoff declined substantially? The river since 2000 has delivered an average 12.3 million acre-feet per year, far short of the 20 million acre-feet that delegates had assumed.

Must Colorado and the three other upper-basin states — New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming — leave more water to flow downstream if runoff declines even more? That would cause curtailment of diversions with water rights after 1922. A study commissioned by the Glenwood Springs-based Colorado River Water Conservation District found that 96% of Front Range water use could be subject to curtailment.

That includes diversions by Denver Water. "It is possible that Denver Water's deliveries of Colorado River basin supplies could be curtailed for a period of time," advised a statement from Denver Water issued in August 2022 when the utility was issuing new water bonds.

That statement was issued the same month that Denver Water and 30 other utilities from Colorado to California that rely upon Colorado River Basin water committed to removing urban turf, with a goal of 75 million square feet in the case of Denver Water. That's an area roughly equivalent in size to 1,800 football fields. At the current rate, that will be achieved in 100 years, according to Denver Water.

Even so, that was a sharp reversal for Denver Water, a utility that delivers water to 1.5 million people in Denver and 17 other municipalities in the metro area. Even after severe drought 20 years before, Denver made no move to remove turf. If drought got bad enough, the agency reasoned, it could ask customers to stop watering their yards. The utility now plans a pilot program in 2024 in conjunction with Resource Central to cost-share lawn removal with customers.

Greg Fisher, Denver Water's manager of demand planning and efficiency, told legislators in October that spending money to help remove turf makes no sense if thirsty nonnative turf species are simultaneously being planted elsewhere.

"Ultimately, success for us is changing the status quo, creating a new cultural landscape that will benefit Colorado's environment and save water at the same time," he said. Fisher cited the ancillary benefit of providing habitat for pollinators, which is not provided by imported grasses. Denver supports the bill.

Save your Maple and Ash Trees in March and April

Early spring is the best time to apply lifesaving treatments to your maple and ash trees. Inexpensive treatments at home can save thousands of dollars.

First, several varieties of maple trees and other plants can get iron chlorosis, an iron deficiency that causes the leaves of a tree to turn yellow but the veins remain green. This can limit growth, cause leaf loss and eventually death. Iron is typically abundant in the soil, but a variety of soil conditions can limit how well a plant can access that iron. Iron chlorosis is normally caused by soil pH being too high, the soil having too much clay, compacted or overly wet soil or too much phosphorus in the soil.

Garden centers sell chelated iron, which is easily applied before trees leaf out in the spring. Mix the chelated iron as directed with water and pour around the drip line of the tree. The drip line is the imaginary line on the ground encircling the tree's trunk where its branches extend the farthest. This mirrors how far the tree's roots stretch out under the soil. Apply once per year until your trees show dark green leaves during the growing season. The cost is about \$25 per bottle and mine lasted two years.

Secondly, the emerald ash borer (EAB) beetle has been identified in Littleton as of 2023, so preemptive measures can be taken to protect our ash trees. First, make sure the tree you are targeting is an ash. Next, make sure the tree is healthy enough to save, with no more than a third of the foliage lost or not drought stressed. If you suspect an active infestation, look for D shaped, not O shaped, exit

holes where the EAB has left the trunk or galleries of tunneling in exposed bark. Colorado State University (CSU) is recommending treating trees prior to infestation or trees with minimal infestations but overall good health. I interviewed Will Knowles, the owner of CreekSide Gardens, who gave specifics for how to use a drench on ash trees. Neem Drench or Imidacloprid Drench are both effective.

Apply whichever drench you are using in the mid-March through early May and use 1 oz. of product for every inch of circumference (not diameter) of the tree measured at chest height. Mix the drench with 1 gallon of water per ounce used and pour it 2 feet away from the trunk. Don't water for a while as it takes 1 week to 3 months to be taken up by the roots. You can start this spring and will need to apply for at least 2 years. For example, the cost of Imidacloprid 32 oz. is \$20, and my tree will need 30 oz. next spring. This is cheap compared to the \$1,300 drilling estimate one company gave for treating one tree. It is best to apply at dusk when pollinators are not in flight.

The article Will and I consulted was co-authored by Dr. Whitney Crenshaw at CSU who is the expert on EAB and can be found on CSU's website at www.colostate.edu/, keywords, "Insecticide Options for Protecting Ash Trees from Emerald Ash Borer."

Small efforts now will extend the life span of our landscaping trees for years to come. CSU's overall advice currently is to plant a variety of species for best health and native species, which are more tolerant of Colorado's droughts and native pests. If you remove an EAB infested tree, the tree needs to be mulched, which exposes the insects, larvae and eggs to air/light so they will die. They safely live under the bark even in a dead tree if it isn't chipped. Please note that it is illegal to transport firewood across county and state lines, which is probably how EAB arrived here originally.

Per our current contract with Waste Connections, recycling pick-ups will continue on a weekly basis until Ken-Caryl officially transitions to bi-weekly recycling collection services on May 1. Once the new contract goes into effect, only recycling in approved Waste Connections totes will be collected. Photos and dimensions for each tote are also available on our online form. Residents may also request additional recycling totes using this form for an additional \$6 monthly fee that will be billed to you directly by Waste Connections.

The delivery of the new recycling totes will be prioritized prior to the start of bi-weekly recycling collection services on May 1; however, residents

may also request new trash collection totes in either 64-gallon or 96-gallon sizes via the online form that will be kept on file and delivered at a later date. Residents will receive delivery information once it becomes available.

Please note: If you have a Waste Connections tote with an orange lid, you are not required to place an order to replace your tote. Waste Connections will take your small bins once they drop off your new totes, just mark it with "Trash, please take." Due to room, it may take a few trips to collect all of these bins, so please be patient. They will be collected at no charge. Have a tote from another trash provider? Waste Connections stickers are available at the Ranch House and the Community Center for pick-up to cover your previous provider's logo. Residents are also encouraged to bring any old bins to Ken-Caryl's Annual Recycling & Clean-Up event at the Ranch House on May 4. Stay tuned - event details to come!



OUR COMMUNITY

Tennis season is just around the corner. Players are already scrambling to find a winning USTA League. That means we will be listening for that sweet "popping" sound of a new can of tennis balls. We all love the feel of new tennis balls. They bounce higher and respond better, and as a result, we play our best game with new balls. Tennis players often open a new can of balls each time they hit the court. Every year, this results in more than 125 million used tennis balls consuming space in landfills across America, resulting in 20,000 metric tons of methane gas emitted in rubber waste per year. This creates a huge environmental toll. No other sport uses a ball for four hours and then lets it pollute for 400 years! It takes 400 years for a tennis ball to decompose in nature. This kind of waste is not acceptable or sustainable.

In 2016, Derrick Senior, a tennis player and entrepreneur, realized that the sport of tennis was incredibly wasteful. He could not find a place to recycle tennis balls, so he, along with his son, decided to found RecycleBalls, a non-profit organization, that makes it easy for tennis clubs and fitness centers around the country to recycle balls. The program has been so successful that sponsors such as Wilson, Tennis Express and most recently, Laykold have joined the effort.

As it turns out, there are many creative uses for recycled tennis balls. The tennis balls are placed in green cardboard bins and shipped to their new processing facility in Belington, West Virginia where 99% of the yellow felt is mechanically removed through an ecofriendly process and the interior

rubber components are converted into crumb rubber. The yellow fuzz is deemed "green gold" and is used in horse stables, barns and dressage courses. The sustainable "green gold" keeps dust down and provides a softer surface for horses, helping them to prevent injuries. The rubber crumb is used to manufacture a variety of products, including a new-age tennis court foundation, playground surfaces, shoes, etc. Engineers are using whole used tennis balls as shock absorbers in building the foundation for structures in earthquake zones. Teachers are using pre-cut tennis balls on chairs in the classroom and of course, dog owners are using old balls to play fetch with their best friend or donate balls to the local animal shelter.

RecycleBalls has initiated a Student Ambassador program to empower young players to educate others and to be role models for recycling tennis balls. There is a student ambassador among us. His name is Austin Streepey. My husband and I were filling green bins for shipping and Austin came into the tennis building to recycle his tennis balls. He saw what we were doing and immediately began to help. I would like to shine a light on Austin and thank him for his help and encourage him to inspire other young tennis players to recycle their used tennis balls.

The Ken-Caryl community continues its move to the "green" side. The Ken-Caryl Tennis Facility has hosted tennis ball collection boxes over the past few years to support the ball recycling program. The community is entering its fifth year of recycling those fuzzy yellow tennis balls. At the end of 2023, we had reached a milestone of recycling 15,000 tennis balls. That's 15,000 fewer tennis balls in the landfills. Thank you to all who have participated in this worthy program that benefits the planet, our community and our sport. Let's continue working together on our follow-through to reach our next goal of 25,000 tennis balls recycled.

Make recycling a habit. Game, set, match, recycle! The ball is in your court now. What will you do?

- 4. It would constitute only one-third of Foothills Open Space. There would be no trail closures.
- 5. There is a highly successful model: It is a 1964 law governing Federal Lands that permits access by pedestrians and equestrians, but no mechanical means of transportation. If you think the increased mountain biking activity since the turn of this century, the seven years of mountain bike racing, and the additional 20+ miles of mountain biker preferred Stacked Loop Trail System wasn't the cause of divisive controversy, then you need to get involved. It is your money, the Stacked Loop Trail System is not common, is more expensive, and the open space is your special place too, because you live here. Prediction: The non-bikers in all families who visit the Foothills will come to love and prefer the "Conservation Area."


