



2024 Pool Changes

Several pool-related updates are happening this year! Hopefully you have seen some of the communications regarding these topics, but I thought I would take a moment to highlight a few changes.

Updated Pool Rules

Safety continues to be first-priority at all Ken-Caryl pools. To further improve a positive and safe environment for all users, the District is updating pool rules in 2024, specifically the following:

- Children under the age of 7 and all non-proficient swimmers regardless of age must be within arm's reach of a parent or chaperone (at least 16 years of age) at all times, including when in the water.
- Children under the age of 12 must be accompanied by a parent or chaperone (at least 16 years of age) at all times.

The District's aquatics risk management provider, Starguard Elite, and the U.S. Department of Health & Human Service's Model Aquatic Health Code provide guidance and direction regarding aquatic operations all across the state and nation. Both organizations cite 2023 figures showing an increase in the number of drowning incidents that involved an unsupervised minor swimming alone.

Safe Kids Worldwide and The American Academy of Pediatrics both have published Technical Reports calling for "touch supervision" to be the standard so that so that "the supervising adult is within arm's reach of the child so they can pull the child from the water if the child's head becomes submerged." Both groups point out that lifeguards are an important layer of protection at public pools, but they cannot replace adult supervision for young children.

As a parent myself, I support any rule that helps keep children safer in the pools. And parents, please remember that lifeguards are on duty to enforce rules and regulations and to respond to emergencies, but you are responsible for the safety of your children. Please be vigilant at the pools!

Ranch House Pool Climbing Wall

We're thrilled to add a climbing wall to the diving well at the Ranch House Pool! The climbing wall will be in the diving well, situated opposite the diving board. This exciting addition will be open for guest enjoyment all summer long!

Pool Pass Registration

FREE resident pool pass registration is now open for the 2024 season. As a reminder, all residents looking to access the pool for free MUST register online before visiting the pools. No need to get a new pool key fob if you have yours from last year; just register online and the old fob will work!

Cashless Payment Policy

Our pools will be adopting a cashless payment policy this summer. All nonresidents visiting the pools are encouraged to purchase their passes online before arriving at the pools. In-person payment methods accepted are credit or debit card, Apple Pay and Google Pay. Residents, if you would like to prepurchase guest passes, we have great news for you! You can pre-purchase a 5-pack of single-day passes that will be loaded onto your fob. When you go to the pool and check in, just tell the guest services staff that you want to use your resident pass for yourself and a single-day pass for your guest! Buy your passes online!



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

Be Aware of Ticks When Enjoying the Trails and Open Space

It is not uncommon to find ticks on your body after a hike in Colorado. Tick season usually starts in March and reaches its peak in May and June, making this the worst time for ticks in Colorado. The information below from the Colorado Cooperative Extension Service provides important information about ticks, including ways to avoid them when enjoying the outdoors this summer.

- In Colorado, the Rocky Mountain wood tick and American dog tick are the most common ticks associated with people.
- Colorado tick fever is by far the most common tick-transmitted disease of the region. Despite its name, Rocky Mountain spotted fever is quite rare here.
- No human cases of Lyme disease have originated in Colorado.
- DEET is the most effective tick repellent. Apply it to pants or other areas of the lower body.

 To remove a tick, grasp it with blunt tweezers, as close to the skin as possible. Ticks are blood-feeding parasites of animals found throughout Colorado. They are particularly common at higher elevations. Problems related to blood loss do occur among wildlife and livestock, but they are rare.

Ticks are most important because they can transmit diseases such as Colorado tick fever, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, tularemia and relapsing fever. Lyme disease is an important tick-borne disease in much of the eastern United States. Fortunately, ticks known to transmit it are not known to occur in Colorado, and no confirmed cases have originated in the state.

Avoid traveling through areas where ticks are abundant. Ticks are most active in spring and early summer and concentrate where their animal hosts most commonly travel. This includes brushy areas along the edges of fields and woodlands or commonly traveled paths through grassy areas and shrublands.

Use Tick Repellents

There are a few effective tick repellents. By far the most common is DEET (N,N-diethyl-metatoluamide), the active ingredient in most common insect repellents, such as Cutters and Offl. Apply DEET directly to the skin or to clothing. Repellents are most effective if applied to pants and other areas of the lower body likely to come into contact with ticks.

DEET can be an effective repellent for ticks as well as other biting arthropods, such as chiggers and mosquitoes. However, the following precautions are encouraged:

- 1. On children, do not use high concentration formulations (above 30 percent).
- 2. Apply the repellent to clothing, rather than to skin.
- 3. Do not apply DEET to hands or other areas that may come into contact with the mouth.
- 4. Do not apply to wounds or irritated skin.

5. After use, wash or bathe treated areas, particularly on children. **Permethrin** (Permanone) is a new tick product. Apply it only to clothing, not to skin. It can kill ticks rapidly. Permanone also may have some repellent activity against ticks.

Wear Protective Clothing

Long pants, long-sleeved shirts and other clothing can help exclude ticks or keep them from attaching to the skin. Ticks are

usually acquired while brushing against low vegetation, so pulling socks over the bottom of the pants leg also is useful. Light-colored clothing can make it easier to find ticks that have been picked up.

Conduct Tick Checks

Ticks take several hours to settle and begin feeding. This gives you ample time to detect and remove them. The Rocky Mountain wood tick typically takes 12 to 24 hours to start feeding. Therefore, a thorough "tick check" can be an effective alternative to repellents. After walking through areas where ticks might be present, carefully look for and remove any ticks you may have picked up. Treatment of the dog is essential, using one of the many flea and tick powders, dips or collars. However, areas that the dog frequents, such as bedding and resting areas, also need to be treated to kill residual ticks. Vacuum cracks along baseboards where ticks may hide and spot treat these areas with insecticide. Discard the vacuum bag and contents after treatment.

If possible, wash bedding and all other materials. Because these ticks are sensitive to cold, storing infested items outdoors during very cold temperatures also can kill these ticks. It may take several weeks and multiple treatments to eliminate brown dog ticks.

Once a tick has become firmly attached to the skin, removal can be difficult and should be done with care. The mouth parts are barbed, so they may remain after removal and allow infection. Fortunately, the Rocky Mountain wood tick, the most common species found in Colorado, is relatively easy to remove because it has fairly short mouthparts. The recommended procedure for removal of ticks is:

1. Grasp the tick with blunt tweezers,

as close to the skin as possible. If tweezers are not available and you must use your fingers, cover them with tissue or thin plastic to avoid the possible transmission of any disease organisms, such as tularemia, that the tick may harbor.

- 2. Pull the tick slowly and steadily, straight away from the skin. Try not to crush the tick as you remove it.
- 3. After the tick is removed, treat the feeding site with a disinfectant. Wash your hands when done.

Many other methods have been popularized to remove ticks, such as covering them with petroleum jelly or touching them with a hot match. These methods are not effective.

A rare but potentially serious condition from tick feeding is tick paralysis. This occurs when certain ticks (in Colorado, particularly the Rocky Mountain wood tick) remain attached for a long period and produce an ascending paralysis. Early symptoms, such as difficulty walking, progress to more generalized symptoms, such as limb numbness and difficulty breathing. This condition is completely reversible when the tick is removed.

Controlling Brown Dog Ticks in a Home

Unlike the more common ticks (American dog tick, Rocky Mountain wood tick), the brown dog tick spends most of its life around the dog host. It is a subtropical species that cannot survive outdoors year-round in Colorado. Infestations most often develop in protected areas, such as kennels. After they have taken a blood meal, adult ticks may crawl up walls and lay eggs in cracks and corners of the room.

- a photo of the barcode on your receipt when you register for a pool pass If you don't have any

of these but did register, staff can check you in by searching your name. This is less ideal as it takes time when other patrons are waiting to check in.

We Need Your Help to Harden Your Home Against Wildfire this Summer!

Residents are encouraged to continue to mow 10-foot swaths around all homes that border open space

Mowing around your home can help harden it against wildfire by reducing ladder fuels that can cause fires to rapidly spread. During much of the year, grasses ignite easily and burn rapidly. Tall grass can quickly carry fire to your house. Mowing grasses low in the inner zones of the defensible space of your home can help protect it against wildfire.

In the past, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Rangers and contractors have conducted 10-foot swath mowing operations along the perimeter of open space behind residences that directly border Ken-Caryl's open space. However, this year, the rangers will be focusing their wildfire mitigation efforts on strategic fire break mowing in adjacent open space areas. This strategic approach is aimed at enhancing community safety by creating defensible space and reducing the risk of wildfires spreading throughout our community. This is part of the Master Association's commitment to helping keep our community as safe as possible by further enhancing and building upon the perimeter mowing that was completed over the past two years.

While the rangers are working to concentrate their efforts on firebreak mowing, we strongly recommend that residents take initiative by continuing to mow and maintain a 10-foot swath behind their homes a couple times this year. In fact, according to Ken-Caryl Ranch's Open Space Use and Parks Use Rules, residents "...are encouraged to mow/ trim up to a 10-foot swath in the open space parallel to your property boundary line to a height of no less than 4 inches. Mowing/ trimming beyond that point is prohibited. Removal of woody vegetation greater than 1 inch in diameter at the base is prohibited unless you get advance approval (contact Open Space Department)...". And after two years of staff and contractor area preparations that include clearing and mowing, resident upkeep and maintenance of these swaths should be easier than ever!

Your cooperation in maintaining the perimeter behind your homes is greatly appreciated and will also help reduce costs and allow the



ranger staff to better focus their time and resources on community-wide fire mitigation efforts. By working together, we can ensure the safety and well-being of our community for years to come!



Earth Day, **Every Day**

Let's celebrate 54 years of Earth Day! Created by Senator Gaylord Nelson, Earth Day was first observed on April 22, 1970, as a day to honor our Mother, the earth, and as a mechanism to force the environmental issue onto the national agenda. Twenty million American grassroots activists demonstrated for legal environmental protections for what Aldo Leopold has labeled "the Land," which includes water, air, and the earth.

Before 1970, factories could spew toxic black smoke into the air, industries could dump toxic waste into our rivers and waterways, and oil rigs leaked gallons of oil into our oceans. All of this was legal! People began recognizing the value of a healthy environment and started demanding more restrictions on businesses and industries that were polluting the "land."

We must honor and thank Rachel Carson, the "mother of the environmental movement," who through her research refused "to keep silent" about man's power to alter and destroy nature. Carson's book, "Silent Spring", written in 1962, introduced the idea of conservation and preservation of the environment. Carson highlighted the need for laws to regulate levels of pollution caused by pesticides, herbicides and other chemicals. As a result, in 1970, the **Environmental Protection Agency** (EPA) was formed, followed by the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act, and the Endangered Species Act of 1973. In 2009, the United Nations declared Earth Day as International Mother Earth Day. Coordinated by the Earth Day Network, International Earth Day is now celebrated in 193 nations around the world.

Today, Earth Day's reach has expanded beyond its original focus to include protections for wildlife and wildlife habitat, both flora and fauna, and has come to be called the science of modern ecology. Eugen Odum, the "father of modern ecology," introduced the concept of the interconnectedness of all species in a well-balanced ecosystem of biodiversity that brings together the world as a whole and all the ecosystem sciences.

Proud to support the neighborhood

There is a new threat permeating our ecosystems. That new threat is plastic. Although progress has been made, with the increasing rate of climate change, overpopulation, water wars, pollution, and more, we must realize the strain that is put on the natural resources of Mother Earth, and the urgency that Every Day should be Earth Day.

The theme of Earth Day 2024 is "Planet vs Plastics." The goal is to work towards a 60% reduction in the production of all plastics by the year 2040. Plastics are everywhere: the oceans, our food, our water, and even our bodies. Plastics have been proven to be a danger to humanity and all living creatures, disrupting the delicate balance of life on earth. Microplastics are pervasive in the environment, killing ocean life and polluting the air we breathe, our drinking water, and fertile soil. In 2021, Colorado took a first step in reducing the use of plastics and polystyrene containers in our state by passing the Colorado's Plastic Pollution Reduction Act. Congress is trying to pass the Break Free From Plastic Pollution Act to hold companies that produce plastics more accountable.

This polymerized onslaught on nature is really a war against ourselves. Kathleen Rogers, President of Earth Day Network, called the fight against plastics campaign a "call to arms, a demand that we act now to end the scourge of plastics and safeguard the health of every living being upon our planet."



Earth Day is truly unique in that other holidays repose upon the past, but Earth Day proposes for the future. Let's join together, raise our collective environmental consciousness, and make Every Day Earth Day, creating a better future now and for generations to come.

Weed Warrior **Training Kick-off** on April 21

Who: Calling all Ken-Caryl community members to tackle noxious weeds in our open space! We'll be learning techniques from our own Ken-Caryl Ranger and Natural Resource Specialist Nick DeCarolis on how to target mullein, Canada thistle, musk thistle and others. Techniques vary during various times of the season. Just as important, we'll also learn how to distinguish and avoid native, needed plants like the prickly poppy and wavy leaf thistle.

What to Bring: A pointed shovel, hat, gloves, high boots, sunscreen and water.

When: Sunday, April 21 at 9:30 a.m. for the training kick-off, and from then on every Tuesday through September. Meetings will begin at 8 a.m. at new locations announced via email each week. No commitment necessary; just drop in whenever you can and stay for as long as you want. Contact Dawn at dawnjeanine62@ gmail.com to be put on the email list.

Where: Meet for the kick-off at the Bradford Pool parking lot. We'll walk to the fire pit then onto nearby noxious weed outbreaks.

Why: Invasive weeds displace native species that are vital to the health of the ecosystems. While herbicides have a place in an integrated pest management plan, they are not enough. Last year, volunteers worked 470 hours to dig, pull and bag invasives in Ken-Caryl's open space, but there's much more work to be done as increased trail traffic spreads seeds. Please join us in keeping our precious grasslands healthy and beautiful!

Prepare for the Birds and the Bears

April brings a lot more action than April showers! Prepare for two timeless, cyclical rituals of nature. The massive spring migration of birds begins and the long winter's hibernation for bears comes to an end.

While you are sleeping, approximately 3.5 billion birds in North American will take to the skies, and at peak migration, 300 million will traverse the "central flyway." The central flyway extends 5,000 miles from South and Central America to the polar regions of North America. These little globetrotters are traveling north in search of tasty bugs, warmer weather and habitat conducive to raising their young. Over 100 different species will settle in Colorado.

Birds face many obstacles on this arduous journey. The sheer distance, adverse weather conditions, barometric pressure, wind speed and direction, predators, and loss of habitat along the flyway all pose challenges. There is a new threat because over 80% of the birds travel at night, triggered by the "sunset cue" and navigating by the stars. Biologist James J. Foster of Lund University stated, "At sundown and moonset, birds are left with only the stars for stellar orientation... stars are a visual stimulus that conveys directional information."

This new threat in town is light pollution, produced by artificial lights and skyglow, causing the birds to lose their way, crashing into buildings and windows. Bird deaths follow as a result of the stress and energy expended by the birds flying around in confusion. Three billion migratory birds have been lost in the last fifty years.

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association is a current member and supporter of DarkSky International, formerly known as the International Dark-Sky Association, to reduce light pollution in our community. The solution to light pollution can be simple: reduce the amount of light that reaches the night sky. Ask yourself, do my outdoor lights even need to be on?

- Turn lights off, especially during spring and fall migration months (April, May, September, October)
- Use timers and motion sensors.Install shields over your lighting
- fixtures to funnel light downwards.Choose lamps/bulbs with the lowest lumen ratings.
- Use warm-colored lights that have fewer negative effects on wildlife (not LED blue).
- Close indoor drapers and shades Governor Polis has proclaimed the month of April as, "Lights Out for Bird Migration." Let's all do our part for the birds that bring us so much beauty and joy of song. Lights Out Colorado!

Colorado thunderstorms usually manifest in April and according to some Native American traditions, that is an omen for bears to emerge from their long winters nap and a time to celebrate their return. They have been hibernating for about 6 months. Their heart rate and metabolism have dropped 50-60%. They have lost 20-27% of their body weight. They have not had water or food for 200 days. They are ravenous and will begin searching for natural foods, such as berries, insects, and nuts to nourish themselves and their cubs.

Colorado Parks and Wildlife District Manager Jerrie McKee reminds us that Colorado is bear country. "We live in bear habitat. The bears belong here, and we want them here." The best way to ensure that the bears are not victim to the "two-strikes and you are dead" rule is to avoid intentionally or unintentionally feeding bears, which is against state law. Bears live by their nose. The number one way to keep bears alive is to remove all attractants. That is why the slogan "A Fed Bear is a Dead Bear" is a reminder to not habituate bears. The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association and the rangers have partnered with Colorado Parks and Wildlife to provide resident education and initiatives to help keep residents and wildlife safe.

Below are a few ways to keep bears safe and enjoy a peaceful coexistence with wildlife in our community:

- Remove all attractants April through
 November
- Never put your garbage out until the morning of pick-up.
- Lock all vehicles and remove all edibles.
- Remove bird feeders, especially at night.
- Keep your outdoor grill clean of residue.
- Do not feed pets outdoors.
- Secure and freeze compost.
- Keep lower-level windows and doors locked.

In 2022, CPW was contacted by a homeowner because a mother bear entered the home from unlocked lower windows. Even though the bear showed no aggression towards the people, CPW euthanized the mother bear and four of her cubs. This was preventable.

If you are vigilant and follow these simple guidelines for coexistence, you will not need to call CPW to report a nuisance bear, and bears will not have to be euthanized due to human negligence. If you do interact with a bear close to your home, your first line of action is to make the bear feel extremely uncomfortable using hazing methods, such as loud noises with an airhorn, shrill whistles, bear spray, clanging pots and pans, clapping hands, hosing, or yelling.


It is not always necessary to call CPW. You've got this!

We must keep bears wild, safe and alive. Bears are considered an "umbrella species." They complete ecosystems and offer protection for lesser animals and plants. We can expect more needless human-bear interactions due to the increase in human population. There have been 800,000 new residents in the last decade, mostly on the Front Range, which is bear habitat. Per CPW, 30,000 acres of land per year is lost to development. We are gaining people and losing habitat. This puts pressure on bears and demands that people and bears find a way to share space equitably. Educating ourselves to the habits and language of bears will lead to respect and peaceful coexistence. Be Bear Aware!

This April, celebrate and enjoy these two timeless rituals that do not belong to just us, but to an eternity of generations to come.
