

Bi-Weekly Recycling Goes into Effect on May 1

Schedule Updates

Ken-Caryl Ranch officially transitions to bi-weekly recycling collection services on May 1. Residents with scheduled recycling pick-ups the week of April 29 through May 2 (collection services run Monday – Thursday for Ken-Caryl Ranch residents), will not be impacted and recycling will be picked up on these days.

Beginning the following week of May 6, recycling collection services for Ken-Caryl Ranch residents will officially adhere to the bi-weekly schedule; there will be no recycling collection services this week. Recycling collection services will then resume the week of May 13 and will continue to alternate.

Tote Delivery Update

Our service provider, Waste Connections, will be delivering any new totes to residents who placed online orders for them by or before the March 15 deadline, with estimated delivery dates of April 25-27. Once the new contract goes into effect on May 1, only recycling in approved Waste Connections totes will be collected. *However, residents who ordered new totes by the deadline from Waste Connections can still use their existing totes until their new totes are delivered. There will not be any disruptions to your pick-ups or service.* Small bins no longer accepted may be labeled as "trash" to be picked up by Waste



Connections. Residents may leave their old totes out to be swapped out by Waste Connections on April 25-27. Residents may also dispose of bins and large recycling totes free of charge at Ken-Caryl's Annual Recycling & Clean-Up Event on May 4 at the Ranch House from 8:30 a.m. – 2 p.m. Please note that this event ends promptly at 2 p.m. Those who arrive after 2 p.m. are not guaranteed access to the event, so please plan accordingly.

The Right Time to Let Them Shine!

Hello Ken-Caryl! Just a friendly reminder for residents regarding rules for permanent holiday lighting installations. It's crucial to adhere to these guidelines to maintain a harmonious environment in the community. Permanent lighting can be a beautiful addition to a home, but it's important that it doesn't disrupt the neighborhood or violate any regulations.

Ensuring that residents understand when they

can have their lights on and when they need to be turned off, helps maintain a sense of order and consideration for others. It's also great to clarify what types of lighting are permitted and what the process is for obtaining approval for permanent installations.

Clear communication about these rules can prevent misunderstandings and ensure that everyone can enjoy the holiday spirit without causing any inconvenience or disturbance to others.

Don't forget that the light clips must be removed from your gutters. I hope you all have a great rest of your month and remember to be kind, Darci

2.28 Holiday Lighting rules and regulations.

Architectural Committee approval is required for Permanent Holiday Lighting Installations.

- Permanent holiday lighting installations may be illuminated no earlier than one month in advance of the holiday and must be turned off within one week following the holiday.
- For traditional December holidays, permanent lighting shall not be illuminated before Nov. 1 and shall be turned off by Feb. 1. Submittal shall include:
 ✓ Site plan and photos showing proposed location for installation
 ✓ Manufacturer's spec sheet showing what the installation will look like
- Committee approval is not required for the display of temporary holiday decorations or lights if these are installed in accordance with the following (See also Lights and Lighting section 2.32):
- With the exception of traditional December holidays, temporary decorations and lighting may be put up no earlier than one month in advance of the holiday and must be taken down (not simply unplugged or turned off) within one week following the holiday.
- For traditional December holidays, decorations and lighting shall not be put up before Nov. 1 and shall be taken down by Feb. 1.
- Traditional December Holiday lights include, but are not limited to, colored bulbs (multi, single color, and changing color) and clear bulb string lights, colored spotlights, icicle lights, laser/projector lights, net lights and novelty string lights.



Noxious Weeds 2024

By Nick DeCarolis Park Ranger & Natural Resource Specialist The growing season has officially started here in Colorado. The return of green grasses, our favorite plants and flowers and returning migratory birds are well on their way. The arrival of the growing season also brings the growth of undesirable plants, such as invasives and noxious weeds. Invasive species and noxious weeds pose a serious threat to native wildlife and native plants. Noxious weeds can outcompete desirable species and change our ecological systems for the worse. Under the Colorado Noxious Weed


Act, and as land managers, we are obligated to control the spread of these undesirable weed species. The natural resource team has already begun early season management of noxious weeds across Ken-Caryl open space. Over the course of the year, integrated pest management strategies will be implemented to combat the spread of noxious weeds across our open space. With the help of in-house staff, contractors and volunteers, noxious weeds don't stand a chance.

In the state of Colorado alone, there are 80 species listed as noxious weeds by the Colorado Department of Agriculture. Fifty-one of which are found across the 4,000+ acres of open space here at Ken-Caryl Ranch.

This year, two local volunteer groups, the Trail Club and Weed Warriors, will be assisting in the fight against noxious weeds. To get connected to our volunteer programs and receive training on weed management in the Ken-Caryl Ranch open space, please reach out to me using my contact information at the end of this article.

In addition to the natural resource team, a contract herbicide applicator will also be conducting work in the open space starting at the beginning of May and continuing through to the fall. Please see the attached northern and southern management area maps for more information about where herbicide applications will be taking place in the open space. The contractor has already started spraying bare-ground areas like picnic pads, crusher-fine trails and kiosk pads. These areas are treated with a pre-emergent herbicide to prevent weeds from coming up throughout the growing season.

May is National Wildfire Awareness Month: Are you Prepared?

The month of May is dedicated to the prevention and preparedness of National Wildfire Awareness. While wildfires may not be prevalent in every state, the responsibility to be aware and alert belongs to us all. The causes of wildfires can occur in every state, and as mobile as our lifestyles have become, every one of us needs to be prepared.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), more than 80% of wildfires are caused by human-related activity, leaving less than 20% that occur in nature. Destruction caused by wildfires in the United States has significantly increased in the last two decades. On average, there are 70,000 wildfires that burn more than seven million acres each year. Preventable wildfires threaten lives, property and precious natural resources.

As the hotter, drier weather of summer approaches, the risk of wildfire increases. There are some steps that can be taken to aid in the prevention of wildfires from starting and spreading. From fire resisting building materials, to following the safety protocols for handling fire when camping, heating your home or storing fuel, we can all take part in reducing wildfires.

Wildfire season is year-round in Colorado. What can you do to help support our firefighters and protect your family from wildland fires? The NFPA recommends these tips to help prevent fires from starting in your home or community:

- Create and maintain five feet of non-combustible space around homes and • commercial buildings.
- Reduce the amount of flammable materials and brush that can burn around • your home by removing pine needles, dry leaves or other highly flammable materials.
- Protect your roof: trim branches that overhang your home and remove any ٠ leaves, needles and sticks from your roof and gutters.
- Move wood piles and small propane tanks away from your (and your neighbor's) home; 30 feet or more is best.
- To keep sparks and flames from getting underneath, screen under your porch and other open areas with wire mesh no larger than 1/8 inch.
- Know two ways out of your neighborhood. Ken-Caryl Ranch will be posting evacuation routes for both The Valley and The Plains on our website - so stay tuned!

Be prepared in case you need to evacuate:

- Keep important documents in a fireproof safe, on a USB drive, or store password protected documents online.
- Check your home insurance to make sure your policy protects your current home value and includes wildfires.

Property Taxes and Funding Future Capital Projects

Did you know that only 17% of your total property tax bill goes to the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District, your local park and recreation provider? The property taxes paid to the District are divided into two portions: general operating mill and bond repayment mill. The bond repayment mill, which only makes up 3% of your total property tax bill, began in 2014 and is set to expire at the end of this year.

The bond repayment mill was established when the District's voters approved incurring debt in the form of General Obligation Bonds. The bond money was used for Ranch House, Community Center, and Dakota Lodge renovations, new community entrance signs, playgrounds, and park improvements. In December 2024, the bond mill will expire, and the debt will be paid off. The District Board is

contemplating asking voters to approve converting a portion of the expiring bond mill levy into a general operating mill levy to fund long-term capital needs. This option would not incur debt nor increase the tax rate.

Maintaining high-quality standards for community amenities is crucial for fostering a vibrant and thriving community like Ken-Caryl Ranch. The diligent efforts of the District in maintaining and replacing these amenities play a significant role in ensuring the residents' satisfaction, enhancing their overall quality of life, and preserving property values.


The District has a Capital Plan that includes capital projects for all District owned or leased property and equipment. This Capital Plan includes:


- Critical maintenance items such as: HVAC, flooring, lighting, tennis court resurfacing, roofing, irrigation, parking lot maintenance, pool boiler, painting, etc.
- New and replacement projects such as: playgrounds (Community Center, Community Park, North Ranch Park), Community Center pool features, shade structures, splash pad renovations, fitness equipment, field renovations, vehicles, trailers, etc.

Financial forecasting of the Capital Reserve Fund has revealed that current revenues may not be enough to continue with the full maintenance of the District's capital infrastructure in the long term. In analyzing the financial forecasting, the District will likely be able to maintain daily operational functions funded through the General Fund, including recreation programs, events, facility rentals, park maintenance, etc., through 2034. However, without additional funding sources, the Capital Reserve Fund experiences a revenue shortfall in 2028, resulting in the inability to complete critical infrastructure and capital improvement and maintenance projects like those listed above. What do you think about continuing a portion of the bond mill? The District wants to hear from you! Please join us for a community meeting on Tuesday, May 7 at 5 p.m. via Zoom for a brief presentation about the Capital Plan and possible continuation of a portion of the bond mill levy. Its trunk is split from top to bottom, but somehow each spring it produces a bouquet of fragrant white blossoms, which evolve into sour red plums in August.


The Brannon Gearhart Park Task Force recommended two years ago that the trail be widened to accommodate skittish horses, but the members also asked the trail builders to spare the old native plum. The little fruit tree is reminiscent of a celebrity cherry tree called "Old Stumpy," which persistently blooms in the Tidal Basin preserve of Washington, D.C. Stumpy has suffered similar split and sheared limbs over the years, and this year, the National Park Service will finally remove the tree because of rising water levels along the Potomac River.

The old plum tree in Brannon Gearhart Park also faced a natural challenge this winter, when snow and winds sheared its main surviving limb. The limb hangs dead on the south side of the tree, away from the trail, but the volunteer trailbuilders wonder if the tree is dead and should be removed.

A recent inspection of the tree shows that, despite the dead and severed limb, the very top of the tree has a spray of bright green buds.

New life.

Perhaps the little plum tree should be given the chance to bloom and bear fruit again.

Empathy, Education and Empowerment: Reflecting on National Infertility Awareness Week and the Journey to Fertility Consulting

Every year, National Infertility Awareness Week (NIAW) serves as a reminder of the challenges faced by millions of individuals and couples on their journey to parenthood. From April 21-27, communities come together to shed light on infertility, break the silence surrounding the topic, and offer support to those navigating this often emotional and challenging experience.

Most people have heard the statistic that 1 in 6 couples have difficulty conceiving. It's a hard number to wrap your head around. Chances are a close friend, family member, or coworker is having difficulty and you are likely completely unaware. I remember the first time when 1 in 6 became my reality. It was about 9 years ago; I had only been practicing as an infertility PA for a few years and I got a call from my best friend saying that they had just found out that they would not be able to conceive on their own without the help of IVF. Despite having a career focused on helping individuals and couples conceive, I was not prepared for this news. My friend is a well-



educated woman who took every precaution to optimize her health and chances for pregnancy, and yet her diagnosis was completely out of her control. That was the moment that truly put things into perspective for me. It was the moment that changed the way I approached patient care in infertility. It was the moment that I became my patient's ally on their fertility journey, instead of just their healthcare provider.

My Journey to Becoming a Fertility Consultant Started in 2012

My path into reproductive medicine and infertility wasn't initially clear. Despite my interest in women's health, infertility was a topic rarely addressed in my education, let alone discussed amongst my family or friends. However, in 2012, after completing my Master of Physician Assistant degree, I found my calling in supporting individuals and couples navigating infertility. Working alongside a leader in the field, I learned the importance of prioritizing the patient experience and well-being.

Yet, after relocating, I realized that personalized care and support were not always the norm with infertility care. It was approximately one year ago when I had another pivotal moment. In just one month, three remarkable women reached out to me, each call opening the door to a new chapter in my life. Despite having access to top-notch fertility centers, they all felt something was missing. They were looking for understanding, empathy and holistic support.

That's where I came in, not just as a professional, but as an ally and mentor. These incredible women were facing more than just the clinical side of fertility treatments; they were dealing with the emotional ups and downs, the physical challenges and the mental health struggles that often go without additional support.

Being there for them, seeing them grow and overcome these hurdles, was nothing short of inspiring. This experience wasn't just a turning point for them; it was a wake-up call for me too. It highlighted what I felt was lacking in my own practice: the opportunity to really dive deep, to educate, support, and focus on the overall wellness of those individuals and couples struggling to conceive.

I Knew That There Was a Better Way

Suddenly, my path shifted. It became clear that my calling was about more than just consultations. It was about creating a supportive community where knowledge meets empathy, and where optimizing fertility

wellness becomes a shared goal. To create space that not only offers solutions but hope, understanding, empowerment and practical strategies for enhancing fertility wellness. This is what inspired me to start Fortitude Fertility Consulting, a haven where individuals and couples could find not just answers, but also understanding, compassion and a community.

As National Infertility Awareness Week approaches, I've been reflecting on my journey and why I feel so compelled to share my story. Throughout my years of supporting countless women on their unique paths through infertility, two truths have consistently resonated with me: first, no path to parenthood is the same; and second, it takes courage to walk this path - a path that should never be walked alone. Unfortunately, the stigma surrounding infertility often leads many to feel isolated. But it doesn't have to be this way! To shed light on this issue and foster a supportive community, I feel it is important to share some tips with our community on how we can offer meaningful support to those facing the challenges of infertility.

Tips For Supporting Someone with Infertility

1. Avoid Asking the Dreaded Question

Couples often get asked, "When are you planning to have kids?" For many people, this question seems innocent. However, for those who are struggling with infertility, it is a reminder of what they were unable to accomplish despite how hard they have been trying. Instead, focus on more neutral topics such as career achievements, travel, or hobbies. If they feel comfortable sharing their family planning goals or struggles, they will bring it up.

2. Unsolicited Advice Can do More Harm Than Good


Almost everyone who is struggling to conceive has been told "If you relax it will happen." Although this is well-meaning, it can be very hurtful to someone who has been working extremely hard to grow their family. Instead, you should feel honored that they shared their struggle with you and simply listen. Often, knowing that someone is willing to listen without judgment can be the best thing you can gift them.

3. Educate Yourself and Others

There are quite a few misconceptions surrounding infertility. Taking the time to grasp the fundamentals can help you be more empathetic and supportive. Remember, infertility can arise from a variety of factors and it's not just a women's issue. It's important to see it as a collective journey. Taking the initiative to educate yourself about infertility conveys to your loved one that you genuinely care and are willing to learn more to better understand and support them on their journey.

4. Show Them That You Care

When someone is struggling to conceive, often what they need the most is to know that they are not alone. A small act of kindness or simply offering to be a shoulder to lean on can make the journey feel less overwhelming and isolating. National Infertility Awareness Week is a time to come together as a community, break the silence surrounding infertility, and offer support and compassion to those facing this journey. It's a reminder that no one should have to walk the path of infertility alone. Through my work, I've seen firsthand the power of informed support and empathy. I hope that sharing my journey raises awareness and highlights the importance of educating ourselves and others. Together, we can create a community of empathy and understanding, where everyone's unique path to parenthood is met with unwavering support and compassion.

2024 Ken-Caryl Pool Updates

Pool Pass Registration Now Open

Metropolitan District resident pool pass registration is now open for the 2024 season. As a reminder, all District residents looking to access the pool for free MUST register online before visiting the pools. No need to get a new pool key fob if you have yours from last year; just register online and the old fob will work! Please stop by the Ranch House or Community Center during business hours if you would like a fob. Pool staff can't issue fobs.

For entry into the pool you may use the following:

- an activated fob (if you had a fob for your pool pass in 2023, when you register this year it will automatically update)
- a photo of your activated fob barcode
- a photo of the barcode on your receipt when you register for a pool pass

If you don't have any of these but did register, staff can check you in by searching your name. This is less ideal as it takes time when other patrons are waiting to check in.

Our pools will be adopting a cashless payment policy this summer. All non-residents visiting the pools are encouraged to purchase their passes online before arriving at the pools. In-person payment methods accepted are credit or debit card, Apple Pay and Google Pay.

District residents may register for their pool passes via our website at www.ken-carylranch.org and click on the teal Register icon located at the top of your screen.

- Children under the age of 7 and all non-proficient swimmers regardless of age must be within arm's reach of a parent or chaperone (at least 16 years of age) at all times, including when in the water.
- Children under the age of 12 must be accompanied by a parent or chaperone (at least 16 years of age) at all times.



Choosing the Right Contractor for Your Parking Lot

An asphalt parking lot can be a durable one, if it is installed correctly and it is regularly maintained. The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association (KCRMA) recently had to repave their Ranch House administration building parking lot and had several challenges to overcome. Our Jo Taylor, who happens to be a local resident, talked to Master Association General Manager Brian Yowell about his experience using CAPA members; Quality Pavement Consultants and CASI for their project.

"This was the original parking lot from when the Ken-Caryl Ranch House was built in 1979, and even though we had had some sealcoat and patching done over the years, we knew it was time to have it repaved."

One of the major issues in the parking lot Brian told me was drainage, "We have several low spots that cause water to sit, which would result in pooling and ice buildup in the winter months. Another was curbing. Curbs that were designed in 1974 now caused bottle necks and were no longer serving us to maneuver vehicles in and out effectively. We wanted a contractor to be able to address these problems and provide us with a solution."

Jarrett Welch of Quality Pavement Solutions was hired as a Consultant/ Project Manager to the KCRMA to assess their situation and come up with recommendations and a budget to present to the Master Association Board. The scope of work was then put out to bid to three companies. The criteria being that Jarrett had personally worked with the companies before and



could therefore vouch for their work and that they were members of Colorado Asphalt Pavement Association.

Brian said, "Jarrett was well versed with our issues. He knew that we had to keep the facilities open to the public throughout the duration of the project, giving residents access to our sports amenities. He understood how to correct the drainage problem by removing the existing concrete curbs and raising them to the correct elevation. At the same time in doing so, making the lot ADA compliant by introducing ramps at the 2% grade that is now legally required. This gave us the confidence that he was the right person for the job."

A full depth reclamation overlay like this one required the testing of aggregates at every level. These tests were performed by Advance Testing Services. The asphalt was supplied by CASI directly from their plant.

A parking lot is designed to last for 20 or so years with the continued maintenance. A care plan is put in place for the owner to follow as and when they see cracks appearing. Jarrett anticipates a seal coat will be needed in 3-5 years and a slurry seal in 10 years depending on aging. However, he does emphasize the need for owners to transfer the management of assets when new staff take over. This leads to consistency of maintenance, which in turn leads to a perpetual pavement at minimum costs.

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




