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Don't Fence Me In

The Master Association Board of Directors approved the 2023 MA budget to include approximately \$180,000 to go toward community fencing improvements.

A Fence Task Force was created in 2022 to begin the daunting task of reviewing and understanding the condition of fencing throughout Ken-Caryl Ranch, meet with industry leaders and peers, and formulate a recommendation for the Board of



Directors as it relates to fencing throughout the community and what steps should be taken to improve the aesthetics, conditions, and quality of fencing in both the Plains and the Valley.

A big component of the larger fencing concern is Covenant Control through our wonderful Community Administrator, Darci Cross. By inspecting fencing throughout the community and issuing violation notices when necessary, residents can take the first step in ensuring a consistent quality of fences exists.

Working with the Master Association and the Architectural Committee, a single stain color has been approved for fencing throughout Ken-Caryl and will be applied to select sections of both privacy and split rail fences as a "test" to the aesthetic quality and ability to provide a consistent look and feel to fencing, regardless of its age.

The Fence Task Force will pay close attention to fences that are deemed "perimeter fences" – or fences that define Ken-Caryl, a neighborhood, or main thoroughfare in our community. These perimeter fences will be the first to receive MA attention as they are the "face" of the community.

Look for future updates from the Fence Task Force, Master Association Staff and the MA Board of Directors as it relates to fencing throughout our wonderful Ken-Caryl Ranch.



New Safety Protocols at **Ken-Caryl Pools**

2023 Summer preparation is in full swing here at the Ken-Caryl Ranch! We have a fully staffed aquatics team that is ready to serve our community and keep our pools safe. Ken-Caryl Ranch has made the transition over to a new aquatics risk management company, StarGuard Elite. SGE has created a new industry standard by

finding creative solutions to improve safety and mitigate risks at our pools. SGE's evidence-based protocols are the most revolutionary and up-to-date of any training agency in the world. Mid-April, all lifeguards will be participating in a 2-day blended (both online and in person, total 24 hours) training covering lifeguard risk management and life-saving skills.

Lifeguards are held to high standards, and training at the beginning of the summer is only a fraction of what is expected of them. Lifequarding staff

are required to attend two, two-hour trainings a month to remain vigilant and up-to-date on their skills. SGE does monthly audits throughout the summer. These audits entail a StarGuard Elite auditor to come out to our facilities and test our lifeguards' skills to ensure they are meeting the industry standard. Facilities must adhere to strict protocols including:

- Guards should be consistently scanning the pool and be able to recognize a patron in need of assistance in 10 seconds and be able to reach that person and render aid within 20 seconds.
- The number of guards we have on stand actively watching the water is dependent on bather load. At any point if a lifeguard feels like they would not be able to make it across their section of the pool in 20 seconds, another guard must go up on stand to help cover their zone (the area in a pool a lifeguard is responsible for).
- Every summer, we validate all of our pools to make sure that lifeguards can see every part of their zone and get to each part of their zone in 20 seconds. This process is done by in multiple areas throughout a lifeguard's zone to make sure all areas of the zone can be viewed and accessed by the lifeguard on stand.

see a mannequin dropped into the pool where the lifeguard on stand is required to recognize the mannequin in the pool in 10 seconds and retrieve the mannequin in 20. This required training is to help guards remain vigilant and attentive to the patrons in the water throughout the summer. Please don't be alarmed.

- All lifeguards should actively be enforcing the rules that are always posted at all three pools. Lifeguards may use their whistle to get the attention of a patron who is not adhering to the rules or simply talk to the patron and explain the rules.
- In case of emergencies, we are required to have at least one lifequard off stand to assist in emergency response should an incident occur. Lifeguards have been trained on how to follow our Emergency Action Protocol. In case of an emergency, we have a backboard, oxygen, AED and other basic life support equipment that is checked daily by our staff.

As many of you know, we have also had safety challenges with children that have no parental supervision at the pools. This year we will be mitigating these challenges by implementing new safety and behavior policies. Look for more information in the next month on our social outlets and in future issues of this publication. We are looking forward to our safest summer yet with SGE!

Sprinkler Systems

As summer approaches and the lawn clean-up begins, it's time to start thinking about turning on the sprinkler system. Here in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District's Parks Department, it is a process that takes a couple of months to prepare our system for the start of May.

Our team of irrigation professionals (Paul Akin and Greg Moinet) start by testing the backflow preventors to ensure the safety of the potable water

system. We fill our lines and run through each zone to ensure there are no broken pipes or heads. We also make sure all sprinkler heads are adjusted properly, which is an important step to prevent excessive water waste.

Once the system has been checked, it's time to turn our attention to the sprinkler controller. The controller is the brains of the operation. We start by making sure the time and date are correct, each zone is set for a proper run time, set the days we wish the sprinklers to run and then we're ready to go. While the Parks Department has irrigation professionals on staff for the community areas, I strongly encourage residents to contact an irrigation professional to get your home sprinklers up and running.

For helpful information on sprinkler watering times, please consider visiting the Denver Water website at www.denverwater.org. Here at Ken-Caryl, we do our best to follow Denver Water's suggested watering run times. Remember, we have a window of time from 6 p.m. to 10 a.m. to run our sprinkler systems, and we all need to follow these watering times to conserve this precious resource. For a residential sprinkler system, watering during this timeframe shouldn't be a problem as most residential systems have 4-12 zones.


Ken-Caryl's parks and greenbelts have from 10-120 zones that we must run in that time window, which is a serious challenge. You may notice our system will be using the entire water window to complete our watering cycles. I encourage our residents to keep an eye on our irrigation system and reach out to us if you ever see something that is broken or doesn't look right.

As an ongoing effort to remove bluegrass from non-usable spaces in our parks, greenbelts, and street islands, we encourage our residents to think about replacing a portion of your bluegrass with drought-tolerant plants and shrubs that consume far less water. Reach out to your local nursery for drought-tolerant planting ideas. 



Fish On, Community Strong! Welcoming Ascent Fly Fishing to Ken-Caryl Ranch

Many say that fly fishing is an art. The art of casting an intricately tied fly that gracefully dances on the sunlit water, just waiting for a hungry rainbow trout, much to a fisherman's delight. For Ascent Fly Fishing Founder Peter Stitcher, fly fishing is just as much about science. With his background as an Aquatic Biologist and Restoration Ecologist, he can answer every angler's burning question, "what are the fish biting on?"

Stitcher recently relocated his home-based fly fishing outfit to his new brick and mortar store at the Ken-Caryl Marketplace, located across Shaffer Elementary School in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Plains. He and his family are delighted to be a part of the community to help share their love, knowledge and passion for their respective crafts with Ken-Caryl residents.

"For the last 9 1/2 years, Ascent Fly Fishing has functioned out of my home at Ken Carvl and Wadsworth as a grassroots, community-focused, science-driven fly shop... where you would find anglers enjoying a free beer and taking advantage of the largest fly selection in the Rockies," said Stitcher. "Over the years, we've seen our business grow to serve an amazing, diverse community, and our vision for how we desire to equip and serve that community has evolved and grown as well. We wanted space to gather, hold classes and share the things that are meaningful to us with our community."

According to Stitcher, in December of 2022, he started looking at retail spaces, and when he found the shop at 10143 W Chatfield Ave, he just knew he had found his new home away from home.

"The [new] space is bright and open, and both my wife Sarah Margaret and I are artists, so we've incorporated a gallery space to feature and sell the works of different artists and to maintain our community-over-commerce focus; we've built the shop around comfortable seating, maps to help guide our community to their next adventure and a fridge stocked with free beer!"

Peter is most passionate about outfitting the angler with knowledge from his background as an aquatic biologist, where he has spent his career studying, restoring and managing trophy trout waters across the Western U.S. His unique insider knowledge into entomology, fish feeding behavior and habitat use, and stream dynamics allows him to break down this knowledge for the fly fisher to easily understand and to apply these tools and principles to their fishing.

"Working as a biologist and restoration ecologist has helped me decrease the learning curve for our clients and community," said Stitcher. "Do you want to know what the fish are biting on? Tell me the water and season and I'll look at my database of invertebrates and I'll show you EXACTLY what the fish are eating on that water. Like any science, the sciences of the world of trout are all measurable and predictable. Are you

wondering how all of the spring snow might affect your next trip to the river? Let us flex our brains and we'll tell you the exact flies, setup and some of our favorite fishing spots to ensure your next trip to the river is your best trip!"

In addition to his background in biology, Stitcher feels that his knowledge of water is also what sets his shop apart from his competitors. According to Stitcher, he sees the river and the sport of fly fishing as a place of abundance where all are welcome. Regardless of if you are using your grandpa's spinning rod, you've been fly fishing for 1 day or 20 years, if you want a fishing spot next to a hot spring, or want to backpack into a secluded lake, he and his team are available to help anglers of all ages and experience levels to engage the water and the outdoors in the ways that make them feel most alive.

"There is no pressure to purchase gear in our shop, and we are happy to drop pins all over Google Maps, help you fill in your fly box with a handful of flies, and send you on the way for your next adventure! Our Mission is threefold: Share the Water, Share Knowledge, & Share Life," adds Stitcher.

However, if you do wish to make a purchase, anglers should consider his Biologist Packed Fly Selection, where Stitcher creates a customized fly fishing box based on desired fishing location, interest and budget.

"Simply put, whether you need a fly selection to fish a specific water anywhere in the U.S., you can hop on our website, answer a few questions regarding your budget, waters, season, and a few specifics about how you like to fish, and we will match—down to the specific insect hatches and their life stages—those that you will see on that water. All you have to do is keep the flies on the water and out of the trees and you will catch more fish!"

Stitcher and his team also offer introductory fly fishing classes at Behind the Scenes Tap House each month to teach fishermen to read the water and choose the best fly patterns. He plans to host regular casting clinics at the shop's new location. Stitcher adds that his classes are open to all regardless of age, sex, or experience level – he even has experienced signers, or sign language interpreters, join them on the water for those anglers who are hearing impaired.

"As a culture, and even more so as a community sitting up against the foothills of the Rockies, we have a lot of places where we can spend our resources, the greatest of which is our time and presence," adds Stitcher. "Similar to when we would invite the community into our actual home over the last 9 1/2 years, we want this new shop to be a space where people feel known, valued and appreciated. We consider it an honor that our neighbors in Ken-Caryl would choose to spend some of their time here and would trust me and the Ascent team to equip them for the water. We want the shop to be a gathering space for those who are looking to learn and meet other anglers, a watering hole in between soccer games at the park, and a jumping off point for adventure!"

Ascent Fly Fishing will be celebrating their grand opening on Friday May 5 and Saturday May 6 from 9 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. and welcomes all Ken-Caryl Ranch residents to come by and enjoy the family-friendly event with deals on flies and gear, casting, fly tying, and rod building clinics, food


trucks and more! Whether you have fly fished for years or would like to try casting a rod for the first time, this is a welcome space for all!

"Living just 2 miles from the new shop, I feel like Ken-Caryl and the people who live here have been our friends and community since the inception of Ascent Fly Fishing," said Stitcher. "For years, we have taught our fly fishing classes at the base of Waterton Canyon and at Behind the

Branching Out On Arbor Day

What do trees mean to you? The first trees appeared on earth 400 million years ago. Over time in various cultures, they have come to symbolize many ideals. Standing tall, they have come to represent life, new beginnings, strength, wisdom, fortitude, courage, balance. reverence, longevity, wonder and

Honoring trees has a long tradition. The first known Arbor Day was in a Spanish village in 1594 where an arbor plantation festival was held, and horse-chestnut trees were planted. The next recorded Arbor Day was in 1805 in a Spanish village and led by a local priest. This man of God believed that trees provided health, hygiene, decoration and natural beauty.

Fast forward to January 7, 1872. Julius Morton and his wife Caroline purchased 160 acres of land in Nebraska and planted a wide variety of trees. Morton spread his knowledge and love of trees, educating his community about their importance. As a member of the Nebraska Board of Agriculture. Morton proposed a day that would encourage all Nebraskans to plant trees in their community. Morton convinced everyone that "tree" day should reflect the appreciation of all trees, and "Arbor Day" was born.

The tradition quickly spread with schools across the country participating. In 1885, Arbor Day became an official state holiday in

Nebraska and on April 15, 1907, President Theodore Roosevelt, a supporter of the Conservation Movement, issued an "Arbor Day Proclamation" telling U.S. school children that "Arbor Day is a holiday that celebrates the planting, upkeep, and preservation of trees." Teachers were encouraged to talk to school children about the benefit of trees and the destruction of American forests. It wasn't until 1970 that Arbor Day was recognized nationwide as a national holiday, celebrated on the last Friday in April.

Arbor Day 2023 is Friday, April 28, a special day to remember trees and the many benefits that an urban forest provides. Trees reduce energy needs, absorb carbon dioxide from the air, supply oxygen that we breathe, improve water quality resulting in less erosion, provide habitat for many species, combat climate change, increase property values, provide shade and beauty, and enhance the overall quality of life. To quote John Rosenow, past President of the National Arbor Day Foundation, "Trees in our cities and towns bring nature into our daily lives." Katie Loos, the recent new President of the National Arbor Day Foundation, pledged to continue the legacy to "plant, nurture and celebrate trees."

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New Jeffcom911 App Places Non-Emergency Services in Jeffco at Your Fingertips

Jefferson County Communications Center Authority (Jeffcom911) has launched a free phone app that provides residents and visitors in Jefferson County access to nonemergency public safety resources through an on-line reporting tool, as well as additional features and safety information.

"We want to provide citizens the best and most efficient response to requests we receive at Jeffcom 911," said Jeff Streeter, Jeffcom 911 Executive Director. "This app, as well as our website at Jeffcom911.org, create a new way to gain access to non-emergency public safety services without having to call a traditional phone line and wait to speak to a communications professional, while continuing to receive the same level of service."

The app is now available through the Apple App and Google Play stores. Use the QR code printed with this article to download from either the Apple App Store or Android App on Google Play.

On-line Reporting via the app

The primary purpose for the Jeffcom911 app is for citizens to request assistance in nonemergent situations, such as reporting code violations, inquiring about welfare and vacation check requests, or to



alert emergency services to a legal campfire or activity associated with a burn permit.

The app form was developed to be as simple as possible to attain key information. Google Maps location services is used to provide the location of the incident, requiring the reporting party simply input their name and contact information, date and time of the incident, and a brief description of the reason for the request to complete the form.

Once this information is submitted, the citizen will receive a text message confirming the request was received and will be reviewed. Once the information is reviewed, usually within a few minutes of the citizen submitting the request, the appropriate public safety resources will be assigned and the citizen will

receive a second text message with an incident reference number.

Other notable app features

- Immediate updates through push notifications. As the app is updated with additional resources, the citizen will receive instant access to any changes, such as a 'Fireworks' button once we get closer to Independence Day and the need to report illegal fireworks becomes greater.
- Sign up for LookoutAlert, the Jefferson County emergency notification system. Citizens, once signed up, may create a personal

LookoutAlert profile and choose their preferred communication methods to receive emergency alerts, to include phone calls, text messages, and email.

- Submit records requests to Jeffcom911.
- Find contact information for Jeffcom911's partner agencies in law enforcement, fire, rescue, and FMS.
- Find Jeffcom911 periodic reports that display agency performance and highlights in monthly, quarterly, and annual reports.



To order totes, send an email to kencarylco@ wasteconnections.com, say that you want to sign up for totes, and provide your name, address, email address, and phone number. You can request both trash and recycling totes, just a trash tote, or just a recycling tote.
