We are anticipating the longer days and more hours of daylight ahead along with vacations, warmer temperatures, hopefully less rain, the kids enjoying summer, days spent by the pool, events around the community, cookouts, BBQs with friends and even bonfires at night.

However, summer can mean another endless list of projects that come with the season. Things will happen, and some of these projects can be unanticipated or unplanned. With all the rain we've had comes having to mow more often and picking more weeds (now is an ideal time to get ahead of the weeds with the ground being so wet)! Please be a respectful neighbor and do your part to keep our property values up and show pride in our community!

#### 7 Tips to Handle Unexpected Expenses:

It is always inevitable that unexpected expenses will occur at some point, so the following are eight quality tips on how to handle those events and unexpected expenses when they do arise throughout the summer as well as how to possibly avoid more expenses you do not foresee coming in the future.

#### Inspect Your Sprinkler System

As watering season for plants as well as lawns comes about, either inspect the sprinkler system yourself or have professionals come and check to ensure they are in good shape for the upcoming season. Annual inspections can give you a clue as to how long your sprinklers can last and how often you will have to replace them and at what cost.

#### Evaluate the State of Your Landscaping

#### **Full and Part-Time Ranch Hands**



### Acquaintances and Guests of Residents in **Open Space**

Recently, KCRMA Volunteer Patrollers have noticed an increase in contacts with people recreating in the private open space that are friends or extended family members of members/residents. If the person is not accompanied by a KCR Member or does not

display a KCR ID Bracelet as a house guest, then they are considered TRESPASSING. Rangers have to issue a contact notice for

the private open space. Trespassers will be prosecuted..."

Jefferson County Sheriff is contacted, and a citation is issued. KCR Open Space and Parks Rule #1 states, "Private open space properties are for the use of members and their quests only. Members are encouraged, but not required, to display a current ID Bracelet. House Guests must have an ID Bracelet or be accompanied by a member. When guests are accompanied by a member, guests shall be within verbal or sight contact of the member. Sponsored Equestrian Center Boarders are issued an ID Bracelet for equestrian use only of

The rangers would like to remind members/residents that if they promote the open space trails to friends, relatives, etc., please remember the rules of open space, especially that guests or acquaintances (house guests are the exception) must be with a KCR member/resident while hiking, biking etc. in open space. 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### **Fawns Follow Moms**

Spring is upon us, and it's a time of renewal and rebirth. The next generation of deer are being born. The fawning season for mule deer ranges from May to July, with the peak sometime around mid-June.

After a 200-day gestational period, does move to a suitable fawning area where they feel safe to give birth. This can be a secluded piece of forest, a neighborhood park or even your backyard. Deer have adapted well to living in our communities, which may mean giving birth among us. It's important to remind everyone to please leave baby wildlife alone. You don't want to be the person who needlessly orphans a fawn or other newborn wild animal.

The newborn fawns will be somewhere around 5-10 pounds and will stand up within 12 hours of birth. They are clumsy and this makes them easy prey for predators like mountain lions, bears and coyotes. However, they are born scentless, so their predators can't find an easy meal.

During the first weeks of life, does will hide their fawns for hours, even a day or so, while they leave to feed. The fawns are naturally camouflaged, neutral in color and with spots that offer them protection. If you see a young fawn, do not assume it has been abandoned. Never pick up a fawn or other young wild animal. Your actions could be orphaning that animal and sentencing it to a summer locked in a rehab facility until it's old enough to be released back into the wild. Humans are no substitute for an animal's natural parents.

In rare cases, a young animal could be abandoned when its parent has been hit by a car or killed by a predator. If you observe the animal for 24 hours and its parent has still not returned, call a KCRMA Park Ranger or Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW). A wildlife officer can determine the appropriate next steps.

Last fawn season, our Ken-Caryl community lost three fawns (that I am aware of) to traffic collisions. To remind residents that we are entering fawn season, you will see approved Ken-Caryl signs posted in our community urging you to be on the lookout for "Fawns Following Moms" and to drive slowly, especially at dawn and dusk.

Following these simple recommendations will ensure that we continue to have thriving populations of wildlife well into the future. Always leave the young animal where it was found and please keep your distance. The parent may be


reluctant to return in your presence. Like any parent, wildlife will protect their young if they feel that you are a threat. These simple actions will assure their safety and yours:

- · Drive slowly and carefully
- · Keep your viewing brief
- Snap photos from afar
- Use binoculars
- · Pets on leash · Leave the area
- promptly If you see a newborn wild animal, consider yourself lucky and enjoy viewing briefly and from afar – this miracle of another generation of wildlife coming onto the landscape.

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## Preparing your Pets for Evacuation in Wildfire

When a wildfire moves into our foothill communities, the likelihood that you and your pets will remain safe can depend on the emergency planning that you do today. Owning pets adds responsibility for the safety of these animals. In the event of a wildfire, foothills residents may have to leave the home with their pets. Plan now for a safe evacuation with your pets. Pet owners have lost their lives when they refuse to evacuate their homes in a wildfire.

The first step in organizing an emergency preparedness plan is to find a safe place to take the family and pets. There are several other emergency shelter options for pets, such as staying in a hotel, boarding facility, or the home of friends or family – be sure shelter choice is outside the immediate living area. If hotels are preferred, keep a current list of hotels and motels that allow pets. Make a note of each hotel's policy such as how many pets are allowed, size and type of pets. Keep a list of safe place(s) (hotels, boarding facilities or friends) along with phone numbers and pet policies in an emergency preparedness kit.

Local animal shelters may be able to shelter pets in the case of an emergency. Make a back-up emergency plan in case you can't care for your animals yourself. Develop a buddy system with neighbors, friends and relatives to make sure someone is available to care for or evacuate your pets if you are unable to do so. Establish a person to serve as an emergency contact that lives close to the home and is out of the immediate living area. The emergency contacts should be familiar with and have a list of pets and where they are located. Be prepared to improvise and use what you have on hand to make it on your own for at least three days. Make sure identification tags are up to date. Pets should wear collars with identification tags (to include owner's name and phone) at all times. Identification by a microchip implanted by a veterinarian is also recommended. If possible, attach the address and/or phone number of your evacuation site. If your pet is lost, the tag is a ticket home.

#### Pet Emergency Kit

Just as you do with your family's emergency supply kit, think first about the basics for survival, particularly food and water.

- Food: Keep at least three days of food in an airtight, waterproof container.
- Water: Store at least three days of water specifically for your pets, in addition to water you need for yourself and your family.
- Medicines and Medical Records: Keep an extra supply of medicines your pet requires on a regular basis in a waterproof container.
- First Aid Kit: Talk to your veterinarian about what is most appropriate for your pet's emergency medical needs. Most kits should include cotton bandage rolls, bandage tape, scissors, antibiotic ointment, flea and tick prevention, latex gloves, isopropyl alcohol, and saline solution. Include a pet first-aid reference book.

- Collar with ID tag, Harness or Leash: Your pet should always wear a collar with its identification. Include a backup leash, collar and ID tag in your pet's emergency supply kit.
- Important documents: Place copies of your pet's registration information, adoption papers, vaccination documents and medical records in a clean plastic bag or waterproof container.
- Crate or Other Pet Carrier: If you need to evacuate in an emergency situation, take your pets and animals with you, provided that it is practical to do so.
- Sanitation: Include pet litter and litter box if appropriate, newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags and household chlorine bleach to provide for your pet's sanitation needs.
- A Picture of You and Your
   Pet Together: If you become
   separated from your pet during an
   emergency, a picture of you and
   your pet together will help you
   document ownership and allow
   others to assist you in identifying
   your pet. Include detailed
   information about species, breed,
   age, sex, color and distinguishing
   characteristics.
- Familiar Items: Put favorite toys, treats or bedding in your kit.
   Familiar items can help reduce stress for your pet.
   Plan in advance for pet care in the

event of wildfire.

Evacuation can be a hazardous and scary time for your pets. Plan how you will assemble your pets and anticipate where you will go. Plan with neighbors, friends, or relatives to make sure that someone is available to care for or evacuate your pets if you are unable to do so.

## From the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office Animal Control Unit:

The Sheriff's Office Animal Control Unit is responsible for coordinating animal evacuations and animal sheltering during an emergency. Call 303-271-5070 if you need information or assistance transporting your animals. Facilities only accept animals from areas that have received an emergency notification for an evacuation. The Jefferson Animal Control Rescue Team (J-CART) aids in the evacuation and sheltering of animals impacted by an emergency or disaster. J-CART works in conjunction with law enforcement, fire, emergency



management and the Jefferson County Incident Management Team to safely and efficiently evacuate and shelter animals. When you evacuate, take your pets and livestock with you. If your neighborhood receives a pre-evacuation notice, consider leaving as soon as possible since animals, especially livestock, take a considerable amount of time to load up and transport.

If you are taking your animals to either the Jefferson County Fairgrounds or the Foothills Animal Shelter for temporary sheltering, please see the Jeffco Fairgrounds Animal Evacuation Instructions on the website below. Temporary emergency sheltering services are provided at no cost to animal owners. Due to limited space, sheltering services are only available for those households within pre-evacuation or evacuation areas. "It's our pleasure to provide this service to our wonderful community", said Brian and Greg, who are excited to offer our community this service again next year!





## NADG – EARTH MOVING ROUTE



North American Development Group to begin contracted earthwork construction for the new housing development in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Plains

## Digging in the Dirt

North American Development Group (NADG) purchased land for a new home development in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Plains in 2020. A total of approximately 700 units (single-family, townhomes and multi-family) are planned for development over three parcels of land, including Parcels A and C, located east of C-470 and north of Ken Caryl Ave., and Parcel B, located at the southwest corner of Ken Caryl Ave. and Chatfield Ave. NADG hired earthworks contractor Bemas Construction to begin soil work in Parcels A and B in the coming weeks. All work will be done outside of Jefferson County's quiet hours. Work will typically take place between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5:30 p.m., and Bemas has begun moving soil from Parcel B to Parcel A.

To provide an idea of the project's scope, more than half a million yards of dirt will be moved from the Parcel B development across from King Soopers to the Parcel A and C developments between the RTD bus station and Foothills Golf Course in preparation of the new housing development. A total of 2.5 million yards of dirt will be moved upon completion of this project. The reason behind the massive dirt removal is to bring Parcel B down to grade (street level) and to fill in the "bowl" on Parcel A for accessibility, drainage and streetscaping. Bemas will be using Ken Caryl Avenue as a primary means to transport the dirt and will is working with traffic engineers to establish a movement pattern that accommodates residents during this 8-10-month process. Closures along Ken Caryl are not anticipated, but residents should be aware that outgoing traffic from Safeway along the Alkire intersection

ONLY will not be permitted during this

The trail to the north of Sunset Ridge that connects the Plains to the Safeway complex will not be disturbed in the initial phases of construction. Any changes or reroutes that may occur in later phases will be communicated to residents in advance to ensure public safety, and it is Bemas' intention to minimize the duration of any possible closures.

Part of the earthworks project will involve using water to cure and temper soil, which will also aid in dust suppression during construction.

Tracking pads, rock retainers and recycled asphalt will be placed around the job site to minimize dirt and mud on streets. Bemas is also contracted to perform periodic street sweeping to help keep our community clean of dust and dirt, and work will be suspended in windy or unsafe conditions.

During construction, Bemas will be properly maintaining safety barriers throughout the project's duration. We ask that residents respect the borders of designated construction areas during this time to ensure public safety.

The Master Association and the Metropolitan District are in continued communication with Bemas, and any updates or pertinent information will be communicated across Ken-Caryl's established communications channels, as it becomes available.


Historical Society Chair Valerie Walling braves the rain to help create a wonderful experience for guests at this year's Bradford-Perley Open House.



Many friends that live in the vicinity have discussed the benefits of a security gate installed at both entrances to the Valley. Understandably HOA dues must increase, but so would our privacy, safety and exposure to solicitors. Codes could be utilized to separate commercial traffic vs. residential.

The noise level from hotrodders and motorcycles also would be diminished.

Further, video cameras showing license plates would add an additional layer of protection as a preventative measure against theft or trespassing.

I believe that a poll of Valley residents would be the next step to see if this is a viable option for the future of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Valley Community.
