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2025 Budget

Hello Ken-Caryl Ranch!

It's hard to think it's that time of year again... but here we are, encroaching on the beginning of budget planning for 2025.

I wanted to take this opportunity to review the components of the MA budget and timing for review and approval by the Master Association Board of Directors.

Our budget is comprised of the following designations:

General Operations – this includes Insurance, general operations salaries and benefits, MA legal, computer services, special events, covenant enforcement and more

Operations and Maintenance – this includes trash/recycling services, MA perimeter fences, signage, drainage, irrigation (repairs and replacement), median enhancement, facilities maintenance, fire mitigation and more.

Administrative – this includes administrative salaries and benefits, meeting expenses, election expenses, legal expenses (delinquencies) and more.

Open Space – this includes trail maintenance, hazardous tree removal, forest management, open space patrols, pond management, open space salaries and benefits, weed control and more.

Equestrian Center – this includes expenses related to running and offering boarding services at the Equestrian Center. These expenses should be covered in full by revenue generated from boarding dues from resident and non-resident boarders.

Equestrian Center Riding School – this includes expenses related to offering Riding School programming. These expenses should be covered by revenue generated by Riding School lessons and programming.

One-Time Projects – this includes anything the Board of Directors approves as an expense that isn't covered in the above categories, Master Association Reserves (Capital Improvement Projects), or Special Projects. These may include new shade structures, studies, or new construction to name a few.

To off-set these expenses the Master Association has income from the following sources:

- Member Dues residential, apartment and commercial.
- Advertising in the Life at Ken-Caryl.
- Equestrian boarder dues.
- · Riding School programming.
- Sponsorships for community special events.

The annual budget review and approval process begins in September with draft budgets and projected revenue being presented to the MA Board of Directors. There is a Budget Town Hall and Joint Study Session scheduled on Tuesday, Sept. 3 at 6 p.m. at the Ranch House. Feedback is received and a second draft is presented at the October MA Board meeting. The final 2025 budget will be presented at the November MA Board meeting as a motion for approval. In these meetings, the needs and desires of the community will be reviewed and balanced with the reality of expenses to operate the Master Association, maintain our facilities and continue to improve the aesthetics of the community and ultimately property values.

As we begin to craft our initial budget, I encourage you to email me at briany@kcranch.org with what you feel is important for our community in 2025.

I look forward to another year serving our community and ensuring that Ken-Caryl Ranch remains a coveted and special place to call home.





Community Recycling Survey Results

The Master
Association
Board voted
at its October
2023 meeting
to switch to

bi-weekly (every other week) recycling. Three out of the five board members voted to transition to a bi-weekly schedule for an approximate savings of \$89k/year. On May 1, 2024, Ken-Caryl Ranch officially adopted a bi-weekly recycling schedule.

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association conducted a community survey to gather feedback on the new schedule, how it's working for residents and other input on recycling services moving forward. The survey opened on June 25 at 9 a.m. and ran for approximately three weeks, closing on July 19 at 5 p.m.



Mill Levy Ballot Initiative to be Placed on November Ballot

At the July 23 Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board meeting, the Board passed a resolution to place a mill levy ballot initiative on the Nov. 5, 2024, ballot. The ballot initiative will ask voters whether or not they want to retain 2/3 of the expiring bond repayment mill levy for a period of 10 years. If the voters approve the mill levy, the money would be designated for future capital infrastructure and maintenance of capital infrastructure. 

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Impact and Influence of the Quarry Fire

As of the printing of this issue, the Quarry Fire is under containment in Jefferson County southwest of Ken-Caryl. The fire was discovered by a deputy at around 9 p.m. on Tuesday, July 30, along Deer Creek Canyon Road west of Grizzly Drive.

With a fire just miles from Ken-Caryl Ranch, there is no better time then now to take action to harden your home and have an evacuation plan in place. All residents are encouraged to take a proactive approach to fire mitigation efforts and to take full advantage of the many Firewise resources available for free on the dedicated Firewise page of our website at www.ken-carylranch.org.

"It is never too late to start prioritizing your home and family for emergencies," said Ken-Caryl Park Ranger and Wildfire Mitigation Specialist Keith McMillan. "Start with a family safety/evacuation plan before attempting to prepare your home for wildfire. If you already had a plan, now is the time to make refinements for the next incident."

Ken-Caryl Ranch is taking action to reduce our wildfire risk and improve safety. Our community is one of 1,200 recognized Firewise communities across the nation taking action and ownership in preparing and protecting their homes against the threat of wildfire. Using a five-step process, communities develop an action plan that guides their residential risk reduction activities, while engaging and encouraging their neighbors to become active participants in building a safer place to live. If you are a resident and would like assistance with fire prevention on your property, residents may request a free, in-person assessment of potentially hazardous fuels on your property and mitigation consultation, conducted by Park Ranger and Wildfire Mitigation Specialist Keith McMillan.

In addition, there are many ways that residents can reduce the risk that their homes and property will become fuel for wildfire. Help protect your home and your family today, by implementing the following tips, courtesy of the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA):

- 1. Clear: Clear off pine needles, dead leaves and anything that can burn from your rooflines, gutters, decks, porches, patios and along fence lines. Falling embers will have nothing to burn.
- 2. Store Away: Store away furniture cushions, rattan mats, potted plants and other decorations from decks, porches and patios. These items catch embers and help ignite your home if you leave them outside.
- 3. Screen & Seal: Wind-borne embers can get into homes easily through vents and other openings and burn the home from the inside out. Walk around your house to see what openings you can screen or temporarily seal up.
- 4. Rake: Embers landing in mulch that touches your house, deck or fence is a big fire hazard. Rake out any landscaping mulch to at least five feet away.
- 5. Trim: Trim back any shrubs or tree branches that come closer than 5 feet to the house and attachments and any overhanging branches.
- 6. Remove: Walk around your house and remove anything within 30 feet that could burn, such as woodpiles, spare lumber, vehicles and boats anything that can act as a large fuel source.
- 7. Close: If ordered to evacuate, make sure all windows and doors are closed tightly and seal up any pet doors. Many homes are destroyed by embers entering these openings and burning the house from the inside out.

As a result of the 2024 Firewise survey, the Master Association, in partnership with the Firewise Committee has been working on developing evacuation route maps to help promote community education and awareness. Evacuation route maps for The Valley and The Plains are available on the Firewise and Community Announcements pages of our website. While these maps are meant to help educate residents, it is the responsibility of all community members to exercise good judgement in determining the best evacuation routes, depending on their location and the current location of an active fire.

Don't wait until you get the call for evacuation! Be prepared today! Residents are encouraged to have a plan in place and to have a 'go bag' prepared in case of a wildfire evacuation notice.

Your 'Go Bag' checklist

Ensure your wildfire 'Go Bag' includes:

- A 3-day supply of non-perishable food and 3 gallons of water per person
- A map with at least 2 evacuation routes
- Necessary prescriptions or medications
- A change of clothes and extra eyeglasses/ contact lenses
- Extra car keys, credit cards, cash, or traveler's checks
- A first aid kit and sanitation supplies
- A flashlight and battery-powered radio with extra batteries
- Copies of important documents (birth certificates, passports, etc.)
- Pet food and water
- Always have sturdy shoes and a flashlight near your bed, ready for sudden night evacuations.

Additional items if time allows

If time allows, consider adding:

- Valuables that are easy to carry
- Family photos and irreplaceable items
- Personal computer data on hard drives and disks





Totally Pawsome! Resident Spearheads Shelter Pet Care Item Donation Collection

Ken-Caryl Ranch Plains resident
Vanessa Wandersee is giving back to
shelter pets as part of her efforts to
support local shelters and rescues in
need of pet care items. Vanessa, who
was inspired by her own two rescues,
is organizing a pet supply drive to
paws-itively impact animals in her
community now through Sept. 1.
Residents may drop off donations at
the Ranch House and the Community
Center during normal business hours.

Vanessa's two late rescues, Kaya, a husky, and Oreo, a Border Collie mix, were such an integral part of her home and family, that she wanted to do something to help other dogs like them to find their fur-ever homes. According to Vanessa, the two dogs were found as strays and instantly became an integral part of the home she shares with her husband and their two children, now ages 3 and 6.

According to Vanessa, items in need include plastic kennels for transport, wire crates, play pens, leashes, collars, clean blankets, litter boxes, cardboard cat scratchers, towels, toys (especially balls), beds and puppy pads. In addition, pet store gift cards, unopened bags of pet food, food dishes, food containers, wet cat food, canned food and treats are also appreciated. Any open food needs to be in original packaging or marked as to what brand it is so we can avoid collision with allergens. In terms of bedding donations, please be sure to wash linens, bedding, sheets

and pillowcase donations to save the shelter money on having to have these items cleaned.

"As far as donations go, shelters always need cleaning supplies, such as bleach, and anything pet-related," explains Vanessa. "I always ask the shelters before dropping off if they can use everything in the donation. If not, it goes to another shelter that can, so any questionable items will absolutely find somewhere to go. Nothing will go to waste."

Vanessa says a lot goes into running a rescue, and every donation helps, as they are often in need of not just money, but supplies and additional space to house animals for adoption. She plans on dropping off the donations she collects to several area shelters and rescues, including Foothills Animals Shelter and nonprofits that are mostly foster-based, such as Taysia Blue Husky Rescue, Jailbreak Husky, Up Pup and Away, Mamco and more.

"With so many animals in need and in need of good homes, rescues, shelters and non-profits are in desperate need of donations to provide a comfortable living environment for deserving pets as they patiently wait to find their purrfect, furr-ever homes," said Vanessa. "Each rescue is working tirelessly to help the dogs (and cats) of Colorado, and those transported here from several other states find a new chance at life. A lot of these non-profits are in desperate need of fosters and volunteers as they have a list of dogs being treated medically, a waiting list for space, and more being requested for transport every day."

Vanessa will be collecting pet supply donations now through Sept. 1. Residents are welcome to drop off donations at the collection boxes located at the Ranch House and the Community Center during normal business hours.

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Kiln' it: Restoring the Historical Kiln in the **Ken-Caryl Valley**

As of last week, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board voted to approve a new outand-back trail to allow community members

the opportunity to observe the restored historical kiln off of Hogback Trail. Construction will likely commence late summer or early fall, and is estimated to take 1-2 days of volunteer work. Be on the lookout for invitations to help!

History of the Kiln

The kiln functioned to convert limestone into lime. When limestone is subjected to extreme heat it emits carbon dioxide, leaving lime, which when combined with water becomes chemically-stable hydrated lime. This could then be used to make mortar for stonework, to produce plaster, or to spread on agricultural land to reduce soil acidity, improving the availability of plant nutrients. There are seams of limestone nearby and wood for fuel, making this an ideal location for a kiln.

Limestone was loaded from the hillside above. Wood or coal was inserted and ignited from below and maintained for several days until the limestone became glowing hot and transformed into lime. The lime was then unloaded and converted to hydrated lime by adding water.

The date of the kiln's construction is unknown, but it likely was built in the late 1800s or early 1900s, and possibly used for the construction of the house built by John and Bettie Shearn in about 1905 (later referred to as the Carroll Shaffer House) or the summer home of John C. and Virginia Shaffer (now called The Manor House), built in about 1915.


The earliest known photo of the kiln is from 1979. By that time, it appears that much of the upper portions of the kiln walls had collapsed.


More recent photos from the 2020s indicate increased deterioration of the kiln.

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Historical Society, with funding from its budget and additional funding from the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association, hired a company specializing in preserving historic structures to stabilize the kiln. That work was completed in 2023, restoring the kiln to its 1979 appearance.

Help Name the Original Kiln Trail!

The Master Association Board recently approved the naming of a new outand-back trail leading to the restored kiln in the north Hogback area as "Kiln Trail." As there is already a trail nearby with that same name, in order to avoid confusion, the Open Space Committee, in partnership with the Historical Society, is hosting a community vote to help rename the ORIGINAL "Kiln Trail,"

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Recycling 101

Recycling is an essential part of our efforts to reduce waste and protect the environment. However, misconceptions about what can and cannot be recycled often lead to contamination in recycling streams, which can hinder the effectiveness of recycling programs. Many of us are diligent about placing items in the recycling bin, believing we're doing the right thing for the planet. Unfortunately, some commonly recycled items are not recyclable, and including them can cause more harm than good. In this article, we'll explore the top five items that people mistakenly think can be recycled but cannot. By understanding these common recycling mistakes, we can all contribute to more efficient and effective recycling practices.

1. Plastic Bags and Wraps:

While many believe that plastic bags can be recycled in curbside bins, they typically cannot because they can get tangled in the machinery at recycling facilities. Instead, they should be taken to designated dropoff locations often found at grocery stores.

2. Greasy Pizza Boxes:

The clean parts of the box can be recycled, but any portion with grease



or food residue cannot. Grease contaminates the paper recycling

3. Ceramic Items:

Ceramics, including plates, mugs and cookware, are not recyclable in curbside bins because they can contaminate the recycling stream and damage recycling equipment.

4. Styrofoam:

Styrofoam (polystyrene) is not typically accepted in curbside recycling programs. It takes a long

time to break down and can be difficult to process. Some special recycling programs accept it, but it varies by location.

5. Paper Towels and Tissues:

These items are often soiled and contaminated, making them unsuitable for recycling. Even if they are clean, the fibers are usually too short to be recycled effectively. Recycling is a powerful tool in the fight against waste, but it only works when we recycle correctly. By being

aware of items that don't belong in the recycling bin—like plastic bags, greasy pizza boxes and Styrofoam—we can prevent contamination and ensure that recyclable materials are processed properly. Every small action contributes to a larger impact, and by making informed choices, we can help our recycling programs run smoothly and efficiently. Let's all do our part to keep our recycling efforts on the right track, ensuring a cleaner, greener future for our community and beyond.

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Achieve Zen at the Ken-Caryl Zen Meditation Club

What is Zen?

Zen teachings emphasize simplicity, acceptance and the importance of nature. It embraces a state of calm attentiveness in which one's actions are guided by intuition rather than by conscious effort. The word "Zen" is the Japanese pronunciation of the Chinese word "Ch'an," which also means "meditation."

Zen originated in India but was formalized in China around the eighth century and is now practiced worldwide. A Zen approach to life emphasizes meditation as a way to achieve enlightenment and awaken one's inner nature. We think it's kinda' chill!

Who we Are

The Ken-Caryl Zen Meditation Club is a group of like-minded people that come together to learn the practice of Zen meditation and the principles of Zen. It is not a religious group and there is no agenda other than building community, enjoying each other, and learning the beneficial practice of meditation based on principles of Zen. This club is not affiliated with any other organization.

We generally meditate once or twice during our sessions, have one person share a reading related to Zen philosophy and then discuss what that reading may mean to the participants. The meetings are usually about an hour and a half in duration.

This club is open to Ken-Caryl residents and/or anyone with an interest in learning more about Zen Meditation. We are a loosely run and casual club with weekly meetings that include meditation practice, a discussion of the principles of Zen and general fellowship.

The meetings are in person and there are no recordings or Zoom calls of the meeting allowed. Everything said and shared in our meetings is assumed to be kept confidential. No selling or marketing is allowed.

We don't avoid controversial topics, but we do focus on the positive aspects of Zen as it relates to our lives. We have occasional social and other events that you are welcome to participate in if desired.

OUR PRACTICE

We practice Sitting Meditation (Zazen) and while there is an option to use your own cushion, participants typically find it more comfortable to sit in a chair. When we do chair meditation, our upper body form is similar to traditional Zazen.



From one member of the Ken-Caryl community, here's my thoughts on the KCRMD board's two-year discussion and ultimate decision in July to give Ken-Caryl voters the opportunity in November's election to retain 2/3 of the community's current 3.34-mill bond repayment mill as a 10-year capital and maintenance mill

Fully 78% of the community said they supported retaining some or all of the bond-mill to fund future capital projects in the 2021 Ken-Caryl Community Survey, which is why I supported making it a community priority for the past two years to fully vet and discuss this possibility.

Why do I support November?

- 1. November's election is a presidential election and will have the highest community turnout. That's why I supported budgeting for the possibility of an election in KCRMD's 2024 budget approved in January.
- 2. The community survey clearly asked if the community wanted to "retain" some portion of the 3.34-mill bond mill for capital projects moving forward. The bond-mill will expire in December. This is the last election where the community can vote to retain it.
- 3. The Board could have placed this on the ballot for consideration a year ago, but in light of Proposition HH on the ballot last year and other factors, the board waited, which I supported.

This is the community's decision. I'm proud of the work the Board and staff did to place it in your hands.

There is no set plan other than awareness of evacuation route options. An evacuation plan will be determined by the sheriff's office in the moment as a result of analyzing all relevant data and determining the best option. This information was presented at a Firewise Meeting in 2023. Residents are welcome to attend these meetings that are open to the public. Meeting information is available on our website. In addition, as a result of

the 2024 Firewise Community Survey, the Master Association has been working on not only increasing resident education and awareness of Firewise recommendations, best practices and increased communications, but has also been working on evacuation route maps for The Plains and The Valley, taking new construction into consideration, in partnership with the Firewise Committee. Routes were determined with direct input from Wildfire Mitigation Specialist Keith McMillan and have been posted to the dedicated Firewise page of our website at www.ken-carylranch.org.
