Weeds, Weeds **Everywhere!**

Hello, Ken-Caryl! What a crazy few months of weather we have had! Nobody loves weeding, but oh my, do we have a huge number of weeds and overgrown grass in tree rings, rock beds, flower beds, in driveway cracks, ect., throughout our community!

In the several hours I was out doing inspections, in the span of one week, I saw more than 80 violations - just for weeds. Please check your yard

and put a plan in place to get your weeds pulled or sprayed. We understand that certain chemical-based commercial weed killer brands pose health risks to people and pets. If you prefer to pull the weeds yourself, great! However, if you prefer to spray them rather than pull them, here is a non-toxic solution I recommend:

Natural Weed Killer Recipe

- · One gallon of white vinegar
- ¼ cup of Dawn dish soap
- 2 cups of table salt
- · A bucket and spoon
- Gloves and spray bottle

Just a friendly reminder that you have 30 days to cure the violation to avoid any fines! Please be kind and keep your property looking great! To keep our property values up, we all need to participate!

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

Valley and Plains Residents are Reminded to be Bear Aware!

The KCRMA Rangers have received an influx of reports of bears walking through neighborhoods, knocking over trash cans, walking into open garages and pulling out trash bags. These sightings also include The Plains! Please help keep residents, homes and bears safe! If a bear is viewed on the ground walking, attempt to haze it with noise makers (rocks in a soda can also work) or a water hose. The same can be done if a bear is viewed eating from a trash bag in a yard. Haze the bear or call the rangers and they can respond to haze the bear, if on duty. Please call the rangers with any sightings or incidents at 303-979-1876, ext. 170. Helpful tips include:

- * Keep garage doors closed at all times
- * No bird feeders. All bird feeders and pet food should be removed until Thanksgiving.
- Keep garbage indoors. Only put out trash/recycling on the morning of your scheduled pick-up day.
- * Lock car doors and remove sweet smelling items from cars.
- * Clean grills and grease catch pans. Use ammonia-soaked rags if bears are frequenting an area.

Outside Vegetation Fires in Ken-Caryl

Since joining the Ken-Caryl Ranger team in April, our community has experienced two outside vegetation fires that were human-caused. One was accidentally ignited between two homes from outside plumbing work with a torch. West Metro Fire extinguished the fire rapidly, but not before damage was caused to both homes. The other was ignited by a homeowner burning weeds around their property. Fortunately, two young neighbors noticed a fire in the planted bed between two houses and grabbed a fire extinguisher to quickly extinguish the fire - nice work, kids! What many people don't understand is that there can be smoldering debris that can stay hot for hours, if not days. So even when observed flames from a fire are extinguished, materials around the heat continue to dry and pre-heat, and can ignite later as temperatures rise and fuels dry out, especially if wind is a factor.

Colorado has a climate that is very susceptible to fires. Do not let all the recent rains fool you: grasses are considered 1-hour fuels by firefighters, meaning that light flashy fuels (1/4" diameter or smaller) can either lose or gain the ability to burn in one hour of favorable weather.

So, what can we take away from these incidents moving forward? First, it is important to know that outdoor plumbing (with torches) and outdoor welding can quickly ignite fuel loads around homes. Firewise guidelines call for a 5' noncombustible perimeter around your homes. Rock ground cover with limited and thoughtful vegetation in this zone cleared of any mulch. This is especially important when homes are closely spaced, sometimes as little as 10' exists between our homes. This particular area should have minimal combustible material. Hometo-home spread is a real threat to our community, especially in The Valley and The Plains, where the lots are smaller.

Another thing to consider is Ken-Caryl's Master Association Master Declaration that states:

"No open fires shall be lighted or permitted on any property except in a contained barbecue unit while attended and in use for cooking purposes or within a safe and well-designed interior fireplace or except such campfires or picnic fires in the portions of Recreation and Open Space areas designated for such use by Grantor, or by the Master Association as to Association Property."

This rule exists for a reason. To keep our community safe. Please stay safe out there, Ken-Caryl. I look forward to seeing you all around the neighborhood. For any questions or concerns, please call the Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Rangers at 303-979-1876, ext. 170.

Fuel Load Mitigation Efforts on Golden Eagle a Success!

On July 15, Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Ranger and Fire Mitigation Specialist Keith McMillan and fellow rangers completed an MA-sponsored wildfire fuel mitigation project on Golden Eagle in The Valley. According to Keith, there were approximately 25 volunteers consisting mostly of Trail Club Members, combined with a few concerned residents that worked together for 4.5 hours to remove approximately 45 cubic yards of dead material from two identified fuels sites!

Other highlights included sculpting and removing lower dead fuels on an identified raptor perch all while prioritizing the bird's habitat at the request of neighboring homeowner, removing dead and downed trees from the culvert area to increase drainage capability in a 100-year-flood zone and improving the existing wildlife habitat to promote shade and screening. This work was completed all while avoiding sensitive areas like hops vine and delicate interface areas.

"It was a great day with an awesome display of community," said Keith. "Thank you for the support!"

Fuel mitigation projects are currently resident-driven. The rangers are hoping to complete additional projects in the future to remove fuel loads in our open space, but to "fuel" this initiative, an organized group of residents committed to reducing fuel loads in their area is necessary.

Truly Pawsome: Resident Spearheads Pet Care Item Donation Collection for Pets in Need

Ken-Caryl Ranch Plains resident Vanessa Wandersee is giving back to shelter pets as part of her efforts to support local shelters and rescues in need of pet care items. Vanessa, who was inspired by her own two rescues, is organizing a pet supply drive to paws-itively impact animals in her community now through Labor Day weekend.

Vanessa's two late rescues, Kaya, a husky, and Oreo, a Border Collie mix, were such an integral part of her home and family, that she wanted to do something to help other dogs like them to find their fur-ever homes. According to Vanessa, the two dogs were found as strays and instantly became an integral part of the home she shares with her husband and their two children, now ages 2 and 5.

"Straight off the streets, [Kaya and Oreo] found us and became the absolute best team," said Vanessa. "They were members of our family, so it broke us when we lost them 10 days apart in May after having them almost eleven years. Seeing two abused, underweight, flea-infested dogs who were completely betrayed by humans transform into such amazing, trusting and loving companions with us and our kids was truly rewarding."

Vanessa was inspired by the profound effect that a loving and caring

home has on a pet in need and wanted to support other deserving animals adjust to their new homes, first using profits from the sale of her homemade jam to create pet care packages, she affectionally called "Pup Packs." She is now expanding her efforts by collecting donations for local animal shelters and rescues in need of care items.

"I make and sell jam in the community and had a sale to honor Kaya and Oreo's memory," said Vanessa. "I sat at the park selling jars of homemade jam and used all of the money made to purchase supplies such as treats, bowls, brushes, toys, food toppers and a frame for the new owner," said Vanessa. "My boys loved helping me pick these things out and fill each bag I personalized with a homemade vinyl decal 'Who Rescued Who?' I was able to make an initial 26 packs and dropped these off along with other supplies purchased. As I dropped these "Pup Packs" off at rescues around us to be sent home with each adopted pet, I got an overwhelming look into the world of rescue and what these places and volunteers do for these pets. I found a need that I could potentially help fill, so I reached out to the community for help."

According to Vanessa, items in need include plastic kennels for transport, wire crates, play pens, leashes, collars, clean blankets, litter boxes, cardboard cat scratchers, towels and puppy pads. In addition, pet store gift cards, unopened bags of pet food, wet cat food, canned food and treats are also appreciated as well as cleaning supplies, such as bleach.

According to Vanessa, a lot goes into running a rescue, and every donation helps, as they are often in need of not just money, but supplies and additional

space to house animals for adoption. She plans on dropping off the donations she collects to several area shelters and rescues, including Foothills Animals Shelter and non-profits that are mostly foster-based, such as Taysia Blue Husky Rescue, Jailbreak Husky, Up Pup and Away, Mamco and more.

"With so many animals in need and in need of good homes, rescues, shelters and non-profits are in desperate need of donations to provide a comfortable living environment for deserving pets as they patiently wait to find their purr-fect, fur-ever homes," said Vanessa. "Each rescue is working tirelessly to help the dogs (and cats) of Colorado, and those transported here from several other states find a new chance at life. A lot of these non-profits are in desperate need of fosters and volunteers as they have a list of dogs being treated medically, a waiting list for space, and more being requested for transport every day."

Vanessa will be collecting pet supply donations now through Labor Day. Residents are welcome to drop off donations at the collection box at the Ranch House, located by the reception desk in the main entrance.

Back Pain and the Culprit... the Quadratus Lumborum Muscle

Have you ever reached for an object underneath the car seat and felt your back lock up? How about when you helped move a piece of furniture and back spasms stopped you in your tracks? You may also have gotten out of bed the wrong way and succumbed to extremely debilitating back discomfort keeping you laid up on the couch for days.

What causes this? Why does it keep happening? The answer might be the deep strappy muscles on both sides of your spine called the Quadratus Lumborum muscles, or QL for short. The Quadratus Lumborum is the most overlooked muscle when it comes to low back pain. These muscles tend to go into spasm when there is a muscle imbalance between the "stabilizer" and "mover" muscles in your low back. We have been told many times that back pain comes from a herniated disc. This can be true, but low back pain more likely comes from muscle strains, ligament sprains and arthritis. These structures are responsible for about 85 percent of back pain episodes.

Help Keep Bears Wild

Many careers require a lot of sitting at a desk and using a computer. When this posture is assumed for many hours each day, the core muscles responsible for stabilization aren't utilized and the bigger "mover" muscles are asked to work non-stop. When you go to stand up while helping carry a heavy couch, the already overworked QL is asked to do even more work and is likely to go into spasm.

So how do you fix this problem? You must quiet down your QL and work to strengthen your core muscles the right way by activating your stabilizer muscles (the multifidi) in your spine. Stretching the QL with mobility ball manipulation, a lateral line stretch, or a 90/90 QL stretch are all ways to quiet down the QL. The plank pull-through, side plank with resisted rotation, or a farmer's carry using a kettlebell are all ways to initiate your core muscles to normalize the imbalance in your lower back.

Keep Bears Out

- Many bears that enter homes do so through an unlocked or open window or door. Close and lock all bear-accessible windows and doors when you leave the house, and at night before you go to bed
- If you must leave downstairs windows open, install sturdy grates or bars. Screens don't keep out bears.
- Keep garage doors and windows closed and locked at night and when you're not home. Don't leave your garage door standing open when you're not outside. Install extra-sturdy doors if you have a freezer, refrigerator, pet food, bird seed, or other attractants in your garage.
- Keep car doors and windows closed and locked if you park outside. Make sure there's nothing with an odor in your vehicle, including candy, gum, air fresheners, trash, lotions and lip balms.
- Bears are great climbers remove any tree limbs that might provide access to upper level decks and windows.
- Replace exterior lever-style door handles with good quality round door knobs that bears can't pull or push open.
- Put on talk radio (not music) when you leave home; the human voice startles most bears.

Get Rid of Attractants

- Bears follow their super-sensitive noses to anything that smells like food, and can follow scents from up to five miles away.
- Don't leave trash out overnight unless it's in a bear-proof enclosure or container. Obey all local regulations.
- We recommend feeding birds only when bears are hibernating. If you want to feed birds when bears are active, please review the Attracting Birds, Not Bears fact sheet on our website.

- Don't store food of any kind in an unlocked garage, flimsy shed or on or under your deck.
- Don't leave anything with an odor outside, near open windows or in your vehicle, even if you're home. That includes scented candles, air fresheners, soaps and lotions.

Teach Bears They're Not Welcome

- If a bear comes into your yard or close to your home, do yourself and the bear a big favor, and scare it away. A confident attitude plus loud noises like a firm yell, clapping your hands, banging on pots and pans or blowing an air horn sends most bears running.
- If a bear enters your home, open doors and windows and make sure it can leave the same way it got in. Don't approach the bear or block escape routes.
- Never approach a bear. If a bear won't leave, call your local CPW office. If a bear presents an immediate threat to human safety, call 911.

7 Ways Residents Can Reduce the Risk that their Homes & Property Will Become Fuel for a Wildfire

£1 Cl

Clear off pine needles, dead leaves & anything that can burn from your rooflines, gutters, decks, porches, patios & along fence lines. Falling embers will have nothing to burn.

#3 Screen & S

Wind-borne embers can get into homes easily through vents & other openings and burn the home from the inside out. Walk around your house to see what openings you can screen or temporarily seal up.

#5 Trii

Trim back any shrubs or tree branches that come closer than 5 feet to the house and attachments, and any overhanging branches.

Close

If ordered to evacuate, make sure all windows & doors are closed tightly, and seal up any pet doors.

Many homes are destroyed by embers entering these openings and burning the house from the inside out.



Store Away

Store away furniture cushions, rattan mats, potted plants 8 other decorations from decks, porches 8 patios. These items catch embers and help ignite your home if you leave them outside.

#4

Rake

Embers landing in mulch that touches your house, deck or fence is a big fire hazard. Rake out any landscaping mulch to at least five feet away.



Remove

Walk around your house and remove anything within 30 feet that could burn, such as woodpiles, spare lumber, vehicles and boats – anything that can act as a large fuel source.







What Time is it?

What time is it? School is starting, the perennials are fading, the vegetables are ready for harvest, the temperatures are cooling, the sunflowers are smiling and the lesser goldfinches have arrived in Colorado on their way south. It is time for the mighty fall bird migration that starts in August and goes to the end of September.

Over the next two months, millions of birds will fly over Colorado through the migratory "central flyway" heading south for the winter. Most of this eternal ritual will take place while you are sleeping. More than 80 percent of the millions of migratory birds travel at night, navigating with the night sky. Artificial lights and sky glow cause the birds to become disoriented, throwing them off their migration path. The migrating birds rely on "stellar orientation" for their GPS. "Stars are a visual stimulus that conveys directional information." The light pollution throws the birds off their path, and most of the bird deaths are attributed to the stress and energy expended by the birds flying around and calling out in confusion. They're depleting their energy reserves to the point of exhaustion and disorientation, causing them to collide into widows or buildings.

Because night lights are a deadly allure, Colorado has initiated a program called "Lights Out Colorado" in conjunction with Denver Audubon and Dark Sky with the main goal of educating people as to what they can do to save the lives of migrating birds. The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association is a member of the International Dark-Sky Association and supports their recommendations that include:

- Turn off all outdoor lights, starting at the "sunset cue" in August and September
- Close your indoor blinds and/or drapes, use window decals close together
- Become an advocate, speak up for the birds and educate others What time is it? It is time to help save millions of migrating birds. It is time to go "lights out."

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
