Responsible Budgeting and Millage Discussion

As a member of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board, I thought you'd like a little background on how the Board is responsibly tackling budgeting discussions right now that will impact the District's ability to fund maintenance and improvements in the coming decade.

Ken-Caryl Ranch's unique and amazing infrastructure is managed by two organizations that work cooperatively to lead our community:

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association – which is funded mainly by our monthly HOA dues – and the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District – which is funded by a portion of your property tax bill and by activity fees for many different programs.

About 62 percent of the District's budget comes from those captured property tax dollars – which in the past had made financial forecasting challenging for a number of reasons.

But the District in the past four years has righted its financial ship and begun re-investing in deferred maintenance and capital projects – now organized into a 10-year capital plan. For the past two years we've been able to rebuild a responsible fund balance while also re-investing about \$1 million annually from the budget into maintenance and improvements in our parks and community assets.

Finding options to fund this work for the rest of the decade without raising taxes is a priority.

For most of the past year, one such option – giving the community the opportunity to vote to retain the existing four-mill levy from the 2014 bond (which expires in 2024) as an operations mill to fund capital projects – has been vetted by the Board as a way to accomplish this without any effective tax-mill increase. The 2021 Community Survey showed 68 percent of the community would be in favor of this concept.

The current Board consensus is that before we ask voters to consider any option, we want to have accurate projections to forecast District tax revenue – which is based on ever-changing formulas. And we're getting that done. If you've been following our meetings, you know that staff has been collecting that information.

Here's the curveball: This year's large increase in Jeffco property tax assessments, on top of state Proposition HH, which will appear on the ballot in November, has made forecasting for next year and the next decade even more difficult. There's enough confusion about that ballot initiative alone – let alone how it will impact Ken-Caryl tax revenue – that the Board did not feel comfortable asking Ken-Caryl voters to mull retention of the four mills on this November's ballot

We need to see how Proposition HH shakes out. And we will continue to study it. And after all that, if the Board feels it makes sense, we'll put a proposal together to place on the ballot for Ken-Caryl voters to decide in 2024.

Bottom line: We're still committed to finding a way to invest in our infrastructure and complete our deferred maintenance without asking Ken-Caryl Ranch residents for any effective tax-millage increase.

And I'm proud of the fact that the Metropolitan District is in a position today to accurately forecast our challenges and face issues before they happen, as opposed to being in a mode of triage with only hard decisions and no options. Credit for this goes to our amazing staff for being able to forecast and adapt, and to the Board's focus on major priorities. Crunching the Numbers: How Residents Can Monitor Crime Statistics in Ken-Caryl

Over the past year, many residents of Ken-Caryl have expressed common concerns on crime and monitoring safety across the Ranch. In the past, the Master Association and the Metropolitan District have published articles and posted signs on the best



practices for keeping residents' homes, cars and families safe. In the digital age, it's equally important to understand what resources are available to you online so that you can stay up to date on nearby incidents and informed on trends across the neighborhood. With that in mind, we've compiled a list of websites that can be used to monitor crime in Ken-Caryl. (Please be aware that these sites and vendors are not associated with or necessarily endorsed by Ken-Caryl Ranch, the Master Association, or the Metropolitan District).

CrimeGrade.org (https://crimegrade.org/)

A popular website that assigns a letter grade to neighborhoods across the United States, CrimeGrade.org allows users to sort by type of crime as well as location. Although a good resource for an initial investigation, residents should be aware that CrimeGrade often generalizes its mapped boundaries, often including residential and commercial areas in the same "neighborhood" and significantly altering its final "crime grade." The resource also projects its data based on an unspecified proprietary average of local crime over a period of several years, meaning that its internal statistics can be skewed by outlier events and years with higher or lower reported crime volumes than the average. Nonetheless, for a general idea of geographic safety, CrimeGrade provides residents with a solid starting point.

SpotCrime (https://spotcrime.com/map)

Instead of recording information on past years, SpotCrime works as a digital scanner to collect up-to-date information from police departments and verified news reports to package geocoded updates in the form of a news feed. SpotCrime is available through your web browser as well as an app and can provide alerts on nearby incidents as they unfold. Each incident reported on SpotCrime includes a verification link where users can see the police or news report that prompted the listing. For an accurate report on crime in your area, SpotCrime is an excellent resource; however, its rigorous verification process means that reported crimes are sometimes slow to appear on the service or are excluded entirely, and the lack of customizable data sorting options on the browser version makes it difficult to analyze broader trends.

Community Crime Map (https://communitycrimemap.com/map)

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office does not perform public crime mapping, but instead refers residents to Community Crime Map, a project by LexisNexis Communications that aims to provide user-friendly data aggregation on reported local crime. Community Crime Map pulls reports from public and police records to provide information that can be sorted by location, date and incident type. The website can also build graphics and charts based on data sets, which can be used to quickly and easily compare statistics and trends across months or years. Although the tools on the site have a relatively steep learning curve, the accuracy and flexibility of the system make it an empowering tool for the discerning citizen.

Utilizing these resources can help us stay informed and play an active role in making our community safer for everyone. Remember that while crime statistics are vital for awareness, it's up to us to continue working together to keep Ken-Caryl a beautiful and safe place to call home.



• RANGER FIELD NOTES

Protecting Pets and Wildlife

We are in the mid-summer season and Rangers would like to remind owners of a great article written by Colorado Parks and Wildlife on pets.

Wandering pets can spell trouble. Dogs are a two-fold problem for wildlife. When left to roam, they form packs and harass or kill wildlife. This is especially true in mountain and foothill subdivisions like Ken-Caryl. A pack of dogs—well fed or not—often kill deer and domestic livestock. Also, dogs and cats left unattended, even in a fenced yard, serve as potential food for coyotes and mountain lions.

Be aware of the potential predators in your area. Keeping a dog inside a fenced yard won't necessarily prevent an attack. It's best to keep your dog in a covered kennel or inside your home. In more urban areas, keeping your dog in a fenced yard will usually prevent problems. Respect other people's spaces and don't let your dog jump fences into neighbor's property. Remember too, in Colorado, law enforcement officers are authorized to destroy dogs seen chasing wildlife and can fine the pet owners.

Cats can also become part of the food chain when allowed to roam. They are easy prey for mountain lions, coyotes and foxes. The presence of free-roaming cats can cause predators to remain in areas where they may not be welcome. Also, cats prey on small, ground-dwelling wildlife and birds. Keep cats under control, especially during the spring bird-nesting season.


Other helpful tips include:

- Keep dogs on a leash.
- On walks, with or without your dog, stay as far away from deer as possible.
- Don't allow dogs to roam free.
- Check your yard before letting your dog outside.
- Never let your dog chase deer or other wildlife.
- Tell children not to approach deer or any other wildlife.

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



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Mill Levy Election Update

Earlier this year, the Metropolitan District began exploration of a potential mill levy election. The Metropolitan District Board discussed this issue over the course of the last six months and determined that it will not pursue any mill levy election on the November 2023 ballot. The District is funded by property tax revenues and has been studying the recently signed Senate Bill 23-303, which proposes to reduce property taxes for a 10-year period. The property tax reductions will be voted on by Colorado's voters pursuant to Proposition HH, which is expected to be on the ballot in November, but is currently being challenged before the Colorado Supreme Court. The uncertainty around Proposition HH and the full impacts of whether it passes or fails are not known and cannot be confidently estimated; therefore, the Board felt it was more prudent to delay any further conversations. The Board thanks the community for their feedback and participation in the thoughtful approach to this decision and looks forward to continuing the pursuit of excellence in parks and recreation facilities and programs. Paving Paradise: Ranch House Park Lot Replacement

The Master Association Board approved the much-needed full replacement of the Ranch House parking lot at its July 18 meeting. Work on this project is tentatively scheduled to begin on or around Sept. 5 and should take approximately three weeks to complete, depending on weather conditions.

The project work will include the full removal and replacement of the existing lot as well as the addition of some new curbing and partial sidewalk replacement. Painted curbs will be sandblasted and repainted when the lot is restriped.

To limit disruption and to allow for resident, guest, staff and visitor access during construction, the project is expected to be completed in two phases. The first phase is tentatively planned to begin on the north (administrative) portion of the parking lot and center islands, leaving the main drive and parking along the tennis court parking open and accessible. Immediately following the completion of Phase 1, Phase 2 will begin, and will include the replacement of the main drive and the south side of the parking lot. This will require a full closure of

the parking lot for up to a week. Stay tuned! More information, including alternate parking information, will be communicated as more information becomes available.

Shabbat in the Park on Aug. 25



How Plyometrics Can Improve Performance and Keep Your Body Injury-Free

Plyometrics are a series of explosive exercises that train an athlete to have improved quickness, agility and power for their sport/activity. Plyometrics can also prevent individuals from sustaining injuries.

Plyometrics is a combination of the Greek words pilo (more) and metric (measure). As the name implies, individuals can jump higher, leap further and increase the size of muscle fibers after plyometric training. With this type of training protocol, your muscle fibers fire more effectively, allowing you to perform sport-specific movements more efficiently.

Being a physical therapist, I subscribe more keenly to the injury-free benefit of plyometrics. Connective tissues in our body are challenged to adapt to more acute loads with plyometrics. The body lays down more collagen (the building block of connective tissue) preparing our body to handle the fast and volatile stressors that sports and other activities demand.

Injuries happen because the soft tissues in our body were not exposed to sufficient loads to handle the rigors of sports. Here are 4 plyometric exercises to keep you off the sidelines this summer.

- 1) Lateral Hops
- Jump side to side landing on the ball of your foot. Hold a few seconds on each leg. Repeat back

and forth for 1 minute.

- 2) Box jumps
- While standing, jump onto a box 8-16 inches high. Step back down and repeat 10 times.
- 3) Squat Jumps
- While standing, go down into a full squat (thighs parallel to the floor).
 Swing arms forward and upward and leap as high as you can. Repeat for 30 seconds.
- 4) Lunge Jumps
- Stand with your feet shoulder-width apart. Take a long step forward with your right foot. As you get to the bottom of the lunge position, swing your arms forward and upward and leap in the air.
 Switch legs midair, so you land with your left foot forward and right foot back. Repeat this activity for 30 seconds.

It should be noted that it is always best to seek guidance from a professional to make sure you are doing these exercises correctly. Performing them incorrectly could lead to injury. Open Space Committee to Host Open House for Proposed Memorials on Aug. 8

In April, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board, in conjunction with the Open Space Committee, collected resident feedback on memorials in Ken-Caryl's Open Space to honor loved ones via an online community survey. The survey was conducted to find a community-supported alternative to replace the memorial bench program for the next 15 to 20 years. The current memorial bench program will be ending in order to prevent over-benching in the Open Space. On average, the Open Space Committee receives 1-2 memorial requests per year. The proposed vision presented to the community via the survey was to create a natural setting with flat stones embedded in the ground that can be engraved with the names of loved ones located near the kiosk on Manor House.

Several themes, resident feedback and suggested memorial alternatives emerged as a result of the survey and will be presented at the Open Space Memorial Exploration Open House, hosted by members of the Open Space Committee, which will be held prior to the committee's August meeting. Resident feedback ran the gamut, with some respondents against memorials of any kind in the open space, other respondents supporting the proposed alternative to overbenching, and others proposing the planting of trees to honor loved ones as an alternative.

The Open Space Committee cordially invites all residents to attend this open house on Aug. 8 at 5 p.m. at the Dakota Lodge to engage directly with proposals and provide any additional feedback on the suggestions that emerged from the survey.

To make your home safer, you need to prepare it to withstand embers and keep flames or surface fire from touching the home or any attachments. You can do this by limiting the amount of flammable vegetation, choosing ignitionresistant building materials and construction techniques, and conducting periodic outdoor maintenance within the three home ignition zones (HIZ). Learn more about the HIZ at Firewise.org





This makes the conditions of neighboring homes and vegetation a part of the wildfire threat. It's extremely important that neighbors work collaboratively with each otherand talk with each other—to reduce their shared risk.

Firewise USA® is a voluntary program that provides a framework to help neighbors get organized, find direction, and take action to increase the ignition resistance of their homes and community.


HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

Organize it: Create a board or committee of volunteers to represent your community. They will work with partners such as local forestry agencies or the fire department to complete a wildfire risk assessment and present it to the community.

Plan it: The wildfire risk assessment should highlight recommendations for action. From this risk assessment, the board will identify and prioritize action items for reducing ignition risk to homes. This action plan may span several years.

Do it: Host an outreach event and work with neighbors on addressing items in the action plan.

Tell us about it: New and renewal applications can be completed at portal.firewise.org. Tell us about the actions and efforts in your community to engage residents and complete mitigation work at the home level.

Highlights from Community Survey Recommendations







Homeowners Association Task Force Created as a Result of HB23-1105

One of the bills affecting community associations that came out of this year's legislative session was HB23-1105. In summary, this bill creates a task force under the Department of Regulatory Agencies (DORA) to examine issues affecting HOA homeowners' rights and to prepare a report by April 15, 2024, on the task force's findings and conclusions regarding the matters it examines. The task force was created to study homeowners' rights and experiences living in homeowners' associations. DORA will then review and publish the initial findings and conclusions of the task force, including the legislative recommendations, and submit to parties which include the state house of representatives and senate committees and the governor.

The task force will consist of a variety of individuals, including two HOA homeowners residing in Colorado (at least of of whom resides in a disproportionately impacted common interest community and one of whom serves on the executive board of an HOA); a community manager, a representative from an HOA homeowner advocacy organization, an attorney who primarily represents homeowners in legal proceedings against common interest communities, and an attorney who specializes in common interest community law. Designations and appointments to the task force will occur before Aug. 1, 2023.

The task force will be responsible for reviewing matters such as, but not limited to, an association's fining authority and practices, foreclosure practices, communications with homeowners regarding processes and homeowners' rights and responsibilities, the way in which the association makes its governing documents, policies, rules and regulations available to the homeowners and the executive board actions regarding collection and legal activity against a homeowner. The task force will also look at homeowner complaints (as reported to the HOA Information and Resource Center and Homeowners' Advocacy Groups in Colorado), CCIOA as well as other state and federal laws.

If a homeowners association's board receives a request from the task force for information, it is required to cooperate with the request, including turning over governing documents or other records in the association's possession that have been requested.

The task force will hold its first meeting after its members have been designated and appointed.



Cyclists to Participate in 2023 Tour de Cure in September via Ken-Caryl


