## Positive Health Impacts of Parks and Recreation

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District provides park and recreation services, including recreation programs, park maintenance, swimming pools, athletic fields, community space, tennis courts and special events, among other recreational opportunities. Parks and recreation is essential to the community, and according to the National Park and Recreation Association, 90% of U.S. adults say that parks and recreation is an important local government service.

Parks and recreation plays an important role in an individual's health, both physical and mental. Check out these health impacts from the National Park and Recreation Association:

#### **Physical Health**

- Parks provide opportunities for physical activity and connecting with the outdoors. The resulting impacts are better mental health, improved physical health and increased physical activity.
- Walking, time outdoors and community gardening may promote nature contact, strengthen social structures, and improve longer term mental and physical health by activating intrapersonal, interpersonal and environmental processes.
- Access to indoor and/or outdoor recreation facilities and frequency of park visitation correlate with greater physical activity; people who use parks and open spaces are three times more likely to achieve recommended levels of physical activity than non-users.
- Children with access to parks and facilities have shown decreased prevalence of obesity compared to children without access.
- Green space exposure corresponds with improved physical health, including decreases in stress, blood pressure, heart rate and risk of chronic disease.

#### **Mental Health**

- Parks promote positive mental health by providing access to nature and encouraging recreational and sporting activity.
- Parks and recreation counters social isolation by connecting people with nature and each other.
- Time spent in nature positively impacts mental health by increasing cognitive performance and well-being and alleviating illnesses such as depression, attention deficit disorders and Alzheimer's.
- Mental health is significantly related to residential distance from parks. People living more than 1 kilometer away from a green space have nearly 50 percent higher odds of experiencing stress than those living fewer than 300 meters from a green space.

## SLASH Your Fire Risk at our SLASH Event in October

Mark your calendars for our next SLASH Event on Oct. 12 from 9 a.m. – 1 p.m. at the Equestrian Center. Members of the KCRMD Parks Department will be at the Equestrian Center, with the assistance of the KCRMA Rangers, to collect and chip SLASH, which are considered to be tree debris, loose pine needles, pinecones and tree bark that can easily ignite and fuel wildfires.

The KCRMA Ranger staff will be offering resident SLASH collection and \*curbside pick-up/chipping once again as a courtesy to residents on Oct. 9 and Oct. 10. Residents who wish to participate in curbside collection must sign up prior to the event \*\*online via SignUp Genius that will open on Sept. 30 at 9 a.m. For more information, including pick-up requirements and to register, please visit the Special Events page of our website at www.ken-carylranch.org.

\*Residents are required to comply with SLASH curbside pick-up requirements, which include size and weight restrictions as detailed in the SignUp Genius. By signing up, residents acknowledge that they will comply with pick-up guidelines. SLASH that exceeds these requirements may not be collected by the KCRMA Rangers at their discretion to ensure staff safety and timely pick-ups for all registered residents. It will be the responsibility of the homeowner to properly dispose of any uncollected SLASH that does not meet pick-up requirements. \*\*Subject to availability. Limit one sign-up per resident and/or household; residents with multiple properties are allotted a single sign-up to ensure fairness for fellow community members. Must be 18+ to register. Residency will be verified by MA staff and duplicate sign-ups will be deleted at the discretion of staff.

## Keep Your Eyes Peeled for Deer

At the height of summer, we had many educational signs posted on

deer crossing roadways. Please note that watching for deer while driving is something that takes place yearround, but now instead of fawns and moms crossing roads, you have bucks in the mating season and diminished daylight hours.

Mating season, typically occurring in the fall, marks a period of heightened activity for deer. Male deer, or bucks, become more mobile and are in pursuit of does (female deer) in estrus. This means that deer are often on the move, crossing roads and highways in their quest for a mate. As a result, the chances of encountering deer on the road are significantly higher during this season.

By adhering to a few guidelines, Ken-Caryl residents can avoid potentially dangerous situations and help keep both wildlife and drivers safe.

- Please slow down, and be aware of major deer crossing areas, like the intersection of Valley Parkway and Club Drive. The blind corners on Ken Caryl Avenue and Valley Parkway, and when passing through the Hogback or by the Equestrian Center.
- Please adhere to posted speed limits.
- Obey traffic signs and other posted crossings.
- Scan the road ahead from shoulder to shoulder. When you see wildlife beside the road, be mindful, as they may suddenly bolt onto the road.
- Watch for glowing eyes of animals as they reflect your headlights, and remember, if one animal crosses the road, others may follow.
- Brake firmly if an animal is standing on, or crossing, the road. Never assume the animal will move out of your way.

- Do not swerve to avoid hitting a wild animal, this may result in a more serious collision.
- Dusk and dawn are the times of day when most wildlife collisions occur. Stay alert during these times and slow down.

Even while following all these tips, we can't anticipate the unpredictable, and accidents are bound to occur. This is just a friendly reminder that most deervehicle collisions happen October through December. With the added factor of less daylight going forward, please be on the lookout for those proverbial deer in headlights.

# Political Signage 2024

With the election season approaching, please note there are regulations in place for signage. Please also keep in mind these rules also apply to any political signage throughout the year.

In the past, residents have posted signs on their property in support of their candidates and issues, this practice is permitted with regulation. Should a violation be observed or reported, a notice goes to the property owner. Homeowner Associations need to follow the Colorado statutory conditions allowing homeowners to express their political expression during this election season, and homeowners need to adhere to those statutory prohibitions and any regulations put in place by their association pursuant to the law. A handout of the current signage rules is available on our website at www. ken-carylranch.org under the Resident Resources tab.

Colorado law regarding political signs are part of Section 106.5 of CCIOA (Colorado Common Interest Ownership Act), which defines a political sign as "a sign that carries a message intended to influence the outcome of an election, including supporting or opposing the election of a candidate, the recall of a public official, or the passage of a ballot issue." Rules include the following:

- Political signs on any owner's property are limited to two signs.
- Political signs may not be attached to utility boxes, light poles, traffic signals, fences or trees.
- Professionally made signs will be allowed on private property only with approval of the private property owner, at least 5' from property boundary.
- Neither attended nor unattended signage is allowed on property owned or maintained by the Master Association without the approval of the Master Association Board of Directors. The term "attended signage" is meant to include handheld signs or signs in close proximity to a person promoting a candidate or issue.
   "Unattended signage" is meant to be signage, which is not attended and includes, for example, signage placed on or in vehicles, fixtures, or equipment.
- Signs may be placed in a window if the window is large enough to display the full sign.
- Signs shall not exceed 18" x 24" There are general signage prohibitions, which also apply for
- unattended signage which include: • Banners
- Lighted or self-illuminating signs
  Signs shall not be placed in greenbelts, open space areas or Master Association property.
  Non-compliant signs may be removed without notice on any of the above locations.



## **Factual Summary**

Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Proposed Property Tax Retention November 5, 2024 Coordinated Mail Ballot Election

This Factual Summary is being provided in accordance with the authority granted by C.R.S. § 1-45-117(b)(I).

#### Ballot Issue

During its meeting on July 23, 2024, the District's Board of Directors adopted a Resolution calling for an election on November 5, 2024 to seek voter approval for a temporary retention of a property tax. The ballot issue is as follows:

WITHOUT RAISING ITS CURRENT TOTAL PROPERTY TAX RATE, SHALL KEN-CARYL RANCH METROPOLITAN DISTRICT BE AUTHORIZED TO TEMPORARILY RETAIN 2.229 MILLS OUT OF THE TOTAL 3.343 MILLS IN PROPERTY TAXES IT CURRENTLY ASSESSES TO PAY OFF ITS BOND DEBT, WHICH DEBT IS SCHEDULED TO BE PAID OFF IN 2024, THROUGH THE ASSESSMENT OF A CAPITAL EXPENDITURES MILL LEVY, BEGINNING IN ASSESSMENT YEAR 2024 (FOR COLLECTION IN 2025) AND SUNSETTING AT THE END OF ASSESSMENT YEAR 2034 (FOR COLLECTION IN 2035), TO BE USED FOR FUTURE CAPITAL INFRASTRUCTURE AND THE MAINTENANCE OF CAPITAL INFRASTRUCTURE, AND SHALL ALL REVENUE AND ANY EARNINGS ON THIS TEMPORARILY RETAINED TAX CONSTITUTE A VOTER-APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE WITHIN THE MEANING OF ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION AND AN EXCEPTION TO THE LIMITATIONS SET FORTH IN SECTIONS 29-1-301 AND 29-1-1702 OF THE COLORADO REVISED STATUTES, AND ANY OTHER LAW?

#### **Metropolitan District**

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District ("District") is a political subdivision of the State of Colorado, organized pursuant to the Colorado Special Districts Act, C.R.S. § 32-1-101, et seq. ("Act"), to provide passive and active park and recreation services and amenities to the community. The District provides park and recreation services including park maintenance, swimming pools, athletic fields, community space, tennis courts, recreation programs, and special events, among other recreational opportunities.



#### Summary of the Issue

For several years, the District Board has been discussing the ongoing funding of long-term capital and maintenance needs. While District daily operations are currently sustainable, financial forecasting has revealed that revenues may not be enough to provide long-term funding for the capital and maintenance projects identified in the District's Capital Plan.

In 2014, the District's voters authorized the District to issue General Obligation Bonds, and approved the assessment of a debt repayment property tax to repay the bonds. Currently, taxpayers pay 15.209 mills in operating property tax and 3.343 mills in debt repayment property tax. The bonds are scheduled to be paid off, and the debt repayment property tax to end, in December 2024.

The District Board decided to place a property tax ballot issue on the November 5, 2024 ballot, which seeks voter authorization to temporarily retain an amount of 2.229 mills currently contained within the total 3.343 mills in debt repayment property tax that it currently assesses, instead of ending the full amount of the debt repayment property tax when the bonds are paid off. The temporary property tax retention would be used to fund ongoing capital infrastructure and maintenance of capital infrastructure and would not incur new debt. The temporary property tax retention would end after 10 years.



#### • If successful, the temporary property tax retention would generate revenue for the District to fund the capital and maintenance projects and needs in the District's Capital Plan. These include infrastructure projects throughout the community, which may include:

- Community Center improvements
- The current bond repayment property tax is scheduled to end in December 2024, when the bonds are paid off. This means that, in the absence of this proposal, property owners would see a 3.343 mill reduction in the total District property tax

- Non-compliant signs on private property will receive a covenant violation notice.

- Community Park improvements
- Tennis facility improvements
- Pickleball courts
- District-owned playground replacements
- Conservation-focused irrigation enhancements
- Fitness equipment
- Parking lot maintenance
- Field renovations
- Facility heating and cooling systems
- Flooring, lighting, roofing, and equipment.
- The District's current revenue forecasting indicates that, without the additional tax revenue, the District Board will need to begin deferring capital and maintenance projects, as adequate revenue to fund them will not be available beyond 2027.
- While total tax revenue for the District has increased since 2018 primarily due to property valuation increases, the District has also incurred increased expenses due to inflation and the impacts of prior deferred maintenance.
- Retaining 2/3 of the current bond repayment property tax (2.229 mills) will still result in a 1.114 decrease in the District's total property tax, and will provide the District with revenue to implement Capital Plan projects and needs. The property tax retention is temporary, and will expire after 10 years.

- beginning in 2025.
- However, if the proposal is successful, then property owners will only see a reduction of 1.114 mills, because the remaining property tax will be retained for 10 years.
- for 10 years.
  Accordingly, voters who support further reduced taxes and small government may oppose the District's retention of the 2.229 mills that would otherwise end.
- Additionally, all voters may not support all of the capital and maintenance projects funded by the property tax retention.
- Finally, the District's current financial forecasting shows that existing revenue may be sufficient to fund the District's capital and maintenance projects through 2027.
- District voters may prefer that the District seek a property tax increase in a future year, once existing revenues are no longer sufficient to fund the capital and maintenance projects and needs identified in the District's Capital Plan.

"The Junior Financial Counselor Program fosters personal growth and empowers girls to become effective leaders."







## South County Library Project

Jefferson County Public Library (JCPL) is embarking on an ambitious plan to open a new library destination in the southern region of Jefferson County to provide greater access to resources, information and opportunities for every generation.

#### **Project Updates**

In August 2024, the JCPL Board of Trustees authorized a Purchase and Sale agreement for an existing property to be used for the new South County Library. The property is located at 11100 Bradford Road in Littleton.

JCPL is now in the due diligence process, during which time we'll complete steps such as an appraisal, entitlements, inspections, investigation of governmental requirements, environmental reports and initial community engagement efforts.

The purchase price agreed to in the Purchase and Sale Agreement is \$11 million. This project is fully funded thanks to the fiscal stewardship of the Board of Trustees and the taxpayers of Jefferson County.

## Glass Recycling -A Clear Choice for the Environment

When it comes to sustainability, glass is a shining example of how recycling can reduce waste and conserve resources. Here in Ken-Caryl Ranch, we're committed to doing our part to protect the planet, and glass recycling is an easy way for all of us to contribute. In this edition of "Green Scene," we'll explore the benefits of glass recycling, how it works and what you can do to ensure your glass is recycled properly.

#### Why Recycle Glass?

Glass recycling is one of the most effective ways to conserve natural resources. Unlike many materials, glass can be recycled endlessly without losing its quality or purity. By recycling just one glass bottle, we can save enough energy to power a 100-watt light bulb for four hours! This is because making new glass from raw materials requires significantly more energy than recycling used glass.

Recycling glass also helps to:

- Reduce the need for raw materials, such as sand, soda ash and limestone.
- Cut down on landfill waste. Glass takes thousands of years to decompose, so keeping it out of landfills is crucial.
- Lower carbon emissions. The energy saved by recycling glass means fewer greenhouse gases are released during the production process.

#### **How Does Glass Recycling Work?**

The process of recycling glass is fairly simple, but requires community effort to make it work. Here's how it happens:

1. Collection: Glass is collected through curbside recycling programs or dropped off at designated recycling

#### centers

- 2. Sorting: Once collected, glass is sorted by color-clear, brown and green-to ensure the highest quality of recycled material.
- 3. Cleaning: The glass is cleaned of impurities such as labels, caps and leftover food residue.
- 4. Crushing: Clean glass is crushed into small pieces called "cullet."
- 5. Melting and Remaking: The cullet is melted down and reshaped into new glass bottles, jars and containers, ready to start their next life cycle.

#### Tips for Proper Glass Recycling

For glass recycling to work effectively, it's important to follow these simple tips:

• Rinse Out Containers: Be sure

to empty and rinse your glass containers before recycling them. Leftover food or liquid can contaminate the batch, reducing the quality of recycled glass.

- Remove Lids and Caps: Glass jars and bottles often come with metal or plastic lids. Be sure to remove these before recycling, as they can interfere with the recycling process.
- Don't Break Glass: Broken glass is harder to sort and can pose a safety risk to workers, so try to recycle your glass containers intact.

#### What Glass Can You Recycle?

Accepted: Bottles and jars used for food and beverages (such as wine bottles, jam jars and beer bottles).

• Not Accepted: Light bulbs, mirrors, ceramics and tempered glass (such as Pyrex or cookware) cannot be recycled and should be disposed of through other means.

Doing Our Part in Ken-Caryl By recycling glass, we help reduce waste, save energy and minimize our environmental impact. As a community, let's make sure we're recycling right and doing our part to protect the planet. Next time you finish a bottle or jar, think twice before tossing it in the trash—recycling it is a clear choice for a greener future!



## **Dear Editor**

Ken-Caryl residents should feel good about voting yes on Ballot Issue 6F in November – it is effectively a tax cut that also ensures the Ken-Caryl Metropolitan District has dedicated funding for maintenance and capital improvement projects for the next 10 years.

Consider:

- 1. 6F, in essence, cuts your property tax rates from current levels - it asks us to retain 2/3 of the 3.34 mills we currently pay to service the 10-year maintenance bond the community passed in 2014 to fund projects community-wide. You will pay less and get more in the future by voting yes.
- 2. 6F proceeds will be dedicated solely to maintenance and capital projects in Ken-Caryl - raising an estimated \$600,000 annually to ensure that our parks, greenbelts and District facilities continue to live up to our community's standards.
- 3. In the 2021 Ken-Caryl Community Survey, 78 percent of the community said they supported retaining some or all of the bondmill to fund future capital projects.
- 4. 6F is not a bond it is a 10year commitment to an annual dedicated maintenance and capital project budget for the Ken-Caryl Metro District. The proceeds cannot fund operations. No bond means the community pays no interest or service fees for this ongoing

funding.

- 5. 6F is a 10-year commitment it is not permanent millage. In 10 years, the community will be able to reevaluate its needs.
- 6. Without this ongoing commitment, one of two things appears likely in the future: either maintenance and capital projects go unfunded, resulting in deteriorating
