As we head into the new year, both the Metro District Board and the Master Association Board look forward to the opportunity to continue to serve the community and identify ways to improve based on resident feedback.

Community involvement is one of the many things that makes Ken-Caryl such a wonderful place to live. We were thrilled with the 51% response rate for the Community Survey last summer. This level of response is unheard of in most communities, and gives us a great resource for better understanding the needs and perspectives of community members.

Thanks to feedback from the Community Survey, the Metro District and Master Association Boards have included the following projects in the 2022 budgets:

- · Shade structure or umbrella at all three pools
- · Increased special events
- Picnic areas/pavilions at Ranch House Park and Brannon Gearhart Park

Several other projects, already on the radar, were identified in the survey and are being addressed by the boards:

- Community Park Master Planning
- Playground updates at North Ranch Park, Brannon Gearhart Park and Territory Park in 2022
- Pickleball courts Bradford courts resurfaced as multi-use courts in 2022
- Increased security security cameras installed at Bradford Park and the Ranch House in 2021; will assess need for additional cameras in 2022 Other important topics of interest to either, or both boards, include:
- Addressing wildfire threats in light of the recent wildfires that highlight the
 importance of community-wide readiness. Specifically, we envision actionoriented wildfire mitigation, wildfire preparation, continued education of
 our residents on how to remove potential wildfire fuels from around their
 homes, educating residents to sign up for CodeRED wildfire alerts from first
 responders and evacuation plans.
- Possible task forces to study and make recommendations about infrastructure and other desired amenities like aging fences, possible dog park, and possible conservation and trails plans, to name a few.
- New development in Ken-Caryl Ranch. Scheduling additional community
 meetings for residents to ask the developer about the upcoming
 development. For updates, please visit: https://ken-carylranch.org/communitynews/new-housing-development-updates/.

We have heard your feedback and are exploring program changes, including updates to the fitness programs, concessions at the pool, increased hours at the Community Center, increased pickleball programming and improvements to the disc golf experience.

We were thrilled with the feedback from the Community Survey, but we don't want the discussion to end there. We now have Zoom options for all board meetings for easier participation. Firewise and Compliant

Covenant Clips

We've all been touched and humbled by the devastation from the recent Marshall Fire, and the recent West Ranch and Oak Fires got our hearts pumping and our minds racing. I can speak for myself, and as my family watched the Marshall Fire's destruction of homes, businesses and community, I couldn't help but feel the gut-wrenching desire to help those affected, but also reflect on my home and our community. Have I done



everything I can to mitigate fire hazards and fire fuels around my home? Are my trees trimmed and maintained? Are branches hanging over my roof? Do I have enough hardscaping surrounding the perimeter of my home? Have I maintained and trimmed a 10-foot swath behind my property into open space, as allowed? What else can I do?

Believe me, I know that maintaining your home and your property is a neverending chore – or should I say, opportunity? I know it's not easy and it's not always fun, but the reward is definitely worth the work.

When you put the work into exterior home maintenance, not only does your home look better, reflect on the community better, help to increase property values, and keep you covenant compliant, it also helps you do your part to protect your property, your family and our community.

Many conversations are happening within the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association and the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District, and many more are yet to come as it relates to fire safety, mitigation and preparedness. Being a Firewise community has always been a top priority for both organizations and will continue to be so. Part of that is education and action from our community

There is a wealth of information on being a Firewise community and preparing your home on our website, www.ken-carylranch.org.

Some relatively simple action items can better prepare you and your home from potential risks:

- Clear leaves and other debris from gutters, eaves, porches and decks. This prevents embers from igniting your home.
- Remove dead vegetation and other items from under your deck or porch, and within 10 feet of the house. Learn more about the basics of defensible space at www.firewise.org.
- Screen or box-in areas below patios and decks with wire mesh to prevent debris and combustible materials from accumulating.
- Remove flammable materials (firewood stacks, propane tanks) within 30 feet of your home's foundation and outbuildings, including garages and sheds. If it can catch fire, don't let it touch your house, deck or porch.
- Wildfire can spread to tree tops. Prune trees so the lowest branches are 6 to 10 feet from the ground.
- Keep your lawn hydrated and maintained. If it is brown, cut it down to reduce fire intensity. Dry grass and shrubs are fuel for wildfire.
- Don't let debris and lawn cuttings linger. Dispose of these items quickly to reduce fuel for fire.
- Inspect shingles or roof tiles. Replace or repair those that are loose or missing to prevent ember penetration.
- Cover exterior attic vents with metal wire mesh no larger than 1/8 inch to prevent sparks from entering the home.
- Enclose under-eave and soffit vents or screens with metal mesh to prevent

Creating an emergency plan

- Assemble an emergency supply kit and place it in a safe spot. Remember to include important documents, medications and personal identification.
- Develop an emergency evacuation plan and practice it with everyone in your
- Plan two ways out of your neighborhood and designate a meeting place.

As we roll into spring, I will personally be focusing on covenant violations that put our community at higher risk, such as dead/dying trees and landscaping, unsightly articles located on properties such as piles of construction debris, landscaping materials or wood next to the house, and

accumulation of pine needles and leaves in your landscaping, to name

Additionally, as you plan your exterior improvements for this year, keep in mind fire safety and alternative materials and designs to mitigate the threat to your property and home. If we work together as a community, we can - and will continue to make a positive impact on being a Firewise community and be better positioned to fend off, fight and prevent catastrophic damage to Ken-Caryl Ranch.

Stay safe, come up with a plan, and work to make your home and family as ready as possible for potential fire hazards.

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Being Prepared for Winter in the Open Space

A change in the weather during warmer months can be a minor inconvenience, while being caught off guard in the winter has the potential for severe consequences. Checking the forecast before going out can better prepare you for these conditions. Always let someone know where you will be going and vour estimated time of arrival back home. Hiking, biking, snowshoeing or skiing up steep foothill trails can be exhausting and cause you to work up a sweat even in frigid conditions. Dressing in layers can prevent overheating and allow you to better adapt to changing conditions.

The heat produced from exertion can be deceiving; if an extended stop is necessary due to an emergency, or from exhaustion, the body can quickly become chilled and can lead to medical emergencies like hypothermia. Avoid wearing cotton clothing. Cotton takes a long time to dry and could lead to continual cooling of your core temperature. Synthetic or wool base layers wick moisture away from your body, dry quickly and have the ability to thermo regulate, even when wet. An extra laver like a wind shell can trap extra heat while sedentary, block the wind and can be easily packed away while on the move. The fine balance of exertion and your body's attempt to maintain a certain core temperature can burn a lot of calories. Bring plenty of water and highenergy food on your winter outings. As we all know, the sun sets early in the winter months, so if you leave in the afternoon for your outing, give yourself plenty of time to return before dark.

Winter essentials:

- · Dress in layers. Wear lightweight thermo regulating base layers made of wool or synthetic fibers. Include a hat and gloves.
- · Pack a wind and water-resistant shell.



- · Be sure to bring plenty of highcalorie food and water.
- Pack a survival kit, with a space blanket, whistle, compass, first aid supplies and a source of light to navigate if you find yourself out in the dark.



· Don't count on a cell phone for help. You could be out of service, or your battery could run out.

Be aware of trail closures for muddy conditions

Lower Cougar, Colorow and the Bluebird trail may be closed periodically throughout the season due to muddy conditions. Information can be found on our website at https://ken-carylranch.org/openspace/trails/ or on our Facebook page at https://www.facebook.com/ kencarylranch.

Pets should be leashed and under the owner's control at all times

Even though it is hard to keep your pet leashed while using poles, or when you decide to go to the local sledding area, Open Space Use Rule #4 regarding leash regulations still applies. Coyotes and other predators may be more likely to approach pets that are loose and away from their owners when their normal food supplies are scarce. A dog off leash may be inclined to chase deer and other wildlife. Wildlife can use up scarce energy reserves trying to flee from a loose pet. Harassment of wildlife is also a fineable offence under Colorado state law and can lead to expensive citation. Other trail users will appreciate an under-control pet while they are navigating snowy terrain.



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

Take a Seat: Calling All 2022 MD Board Candidates!

It's election season in Ken-Caryl Ranch! Want to make a difference in our community? Then consider throwing your hat in to the ring for this year's upcoming Metropolitan District Board election.

This year, there will be four seats available on the MD Board, two for a one-year term and two for a three-year term. Each registered voter may vote for four candidates. As this is a government election, all registered voters that live in the District may vote, meaning that all registered voters living in your household will have the opportunity to cast their ballot.

If you are interested in running for one of the open board seats, the deadline for filing your Self-Nomination and Acceptance Form with the Designated Election Official (DEO) is Feb. 25, no later than 5 p.m. The deadline to file an affidavit of intent to be a write-in candidate with the DEO is Feb. 28, no later than 5 p.m. This year's MD Board election will take place on May 3, 2022. Please stay tuned to this publication for more information to come.

How to Submit a Self-Nomination Form

All nomination forms must be acquired from and returned to the District's Designated Election Official (DEO) listed below.

Self-nomination forms are thoroughly reviewed by the DEO to confirm eligibility and are then filed with the Secretary of State. Once this is complete, an official candidate list will be published.

Term Information

- Every position on the 2022 ballot is open to anyone who would like (or is eligible) to run, including existing appointed Board members.
- The Self Nomination and Acceptance Form will contain two checkboxes, which will require nomination for either the one-year term commencing in May 2022 and ending in May 2023, or the three-year term commencing in May 2022 and ending in May 2025.
- Any person can select either option; for example, there will be two



appointees' current seats that will be open for a one-year term. Neither of the appointees are obligated to run for that seat. They could choose to run for one of the three-year seats instead.

- The District will have a contested election if it receives more than two nominations for either or both seats. If the District does not receive at least two nominations for either seat, then after the election, there will be a vacancy in the seats that did not get enough nominations, and the Board can appoint to fill the position(s).
- Filling partial terms of office does not count toward term limits, regardless of whether the person was appointed or elected to fill the partial term. If an appointed Board member chooses to run for the oneyear term (filling of a partial term), that will not "count" toward his/ her term limits. Accordingly, he/she would be eligible to run in 2023-2027 and again in 2027-2031. However, if the appointee chooses to run for the three-year term from 2022-2025, then that would count as his/her first full term, and he/she would only be eligible to run again from 2025-2029. Bradford North Students Continue Evaluation of Brannon Gearhart Park

Expanding on the work Bradford North students completed in 2020, this year's students collected seeds, evaluated trails and identified water sampling locations.

In 2020, Bradford North students identified various species of trees and shrubs that could be planted in Brannon Gearhart Park. The new trees will be planted near the six existing ash trees that are in the park. As the ash trees become infected with the emerald ash borer and die off, the goal is to have mature trees nearby to provide shade. This planting approach is known as shadow planting. During the second semester, the students will identify planting locations, and most importantly, develop a plan that describes how the trees and shrubs should be watered and protected from deer during the two years immediately following planting.

On Dec. 20, sixth grade students of Mrs. Atkins and Mrs. Prentiss explored numerous areas of the park. They identified possible water sampling areas, collected seeds, identified planting locations and evaluated a single-track trail. Upon arrival, the students were divided into groups and went to three study areas. Each study area had a volunteer that was familiar with the issues identified in the BGP Task Force Report.

Mr. J.J. Hamilton, President of the KCR Trails Club, identified an area on the northern turnpike trail, which has a blind spot that creates problems for equestrians. This trail, which runs parallel to Willowleaf Drive, provides access through the park to Massey Draw. It is used by families, runners, hikers, mountain bikers and equestrians. Unfortunately, when there is east/west traffic at the blind spot, horses can get spooked. To make matters more complex, there is a narrow turnpike (going through a marshland) just west of the blind spot that makes moving off to the side of the trail extremely difficult.

Mr. Hamilton discussed the issue and asked the students to come up with ideas on how to modify the trail. He also explained that any trail modifications need to be reviewed and approved by the Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Committee and the

Master Association Board. He discussed the process used by the KCR Open Space staff to identify plant species that could be impacted by the modification, and how all environmental issues need to be addressed and a mitigation approach documented in a formal plan. Finally, he discussed the processes the Open **Space Committee** and MA Board use to approve or

reject any trail modification.

Mr. John Fosholt, a long-time Ken-Caryl resident and a member of the Brannon Gearhart Park Task Force, was at the second station. The students gathered near the memorial bench to discuss how the groundwater and surface water flow within the park has changed over the years. These changes have had both a positive and negative impact on the park's flora and fauna. Mr. Fosholt pointed out how the cattails have flourished over the years and now provide a sanctuary for birds and other small animals. He also pointed out a drought-tolerant tree that was planted about 25 years ago that died because its root system had become saturated. Interestingly, the tree was knocked over recently by high winds and the students could see the decay at the base of the tree.

Mr. John Rodell was at the third study area near the pond. He described the history of the pond, and how over time, its depth has been reduced due to decomposing leaves and sediment deposited as a result of the 2004 flood, * and other debris (i.e., tree branches and other objects thrown into the pond). He described how reduced water depth causes the water temperature to raise, resulting in increased algae growth. He also noted that the pond is one of only a few open water sources between KCR and Morrison, and the health of this body of water, even though it is small, is important to migratory birds and other animals. The students then evaluated possible sampling locations, which will be constructed as part of the proposed dredging operation. The goal is to sample the water in Massey Draw Creek and the pond on an annual basis.

Near the conclusion of the study session, students harvested milkweed seeds that are an important habitat for the Monarch Butterfly. The seeds will be planted in two hydroponic towers, which can germinate 48 plants at a time. The towers have lights set on timers and pumps to keep water flowing throughout the day. Students are responsible for ensuring that the correct amount of nutrients is added to the water every week. Once the plants are large enough, they will be planted throughout the park. This work will be coordinated with the KCR Metropolitan District, which received a grant last year to promote the establishment of milkweed plants.

Oak Fire Forces Evacuation Orders for Ken-Caryl

What is the Firewise Program?

The national Firewise USA® recognition program provides a collaborative framework to help neighbors in a geographic area get organized, find direction, and take action to increase the ignition resistance of their homes and community and to reduce wildfire risks at the local level.

The Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee was formed in 2015 with recognition of the wildfire risks faced in our neighborhoods. The committee is comprised of individuals with a significant interest in reducing the hazards to our homes and families. Members of the committee also have significant experience in wildfire suppression and management. The Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee focuses on personal preparation, community education and mitigation, and planning for wildfire and evacuation.

Oak Fire

The Oak Fire near C-470 and Kipling Street forced officials to order the evacuation of residents in Ken-Caryl Valley, and forced crews to shut down the highway in both directions between Kipling Street and West Bowles Avenue, on Monday, Dec. 27. Firefighters from West Metro Fire Rescue and South Metro Fire Rescue initially responded to the wind-driven fire, supported by firefighters from several additional departments. Smoke from the Oak Fire blanketed the Plains and the Valley, as wind shifts pushed the fire along the Hogback.

Evacuations in Ken-Caryl

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office issued an evacuation order for residents of Ken-Caryl Valley at 3:47 p.m. that day. Evacuated residents were told to go to Chatfield High School. The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office asked evacuated residents to check-in at the high school location, even if they did not intend to stay there. Checking in with Jefferson County at the evacuation center is critical in accounting for all area residents.

A few minutes later, the orders were rolled back and the area was put back under a pre-evacuation notice. Two buildings at the Westerly Apartments, located on Oak Street west of Kipling Street, were evacuated, but those orders were also lifted a short time later. Just before 4 p.m., West Metro Fire Rescue said the Oak Fire had slowed somewhat, but was still being driven by strong winds. Firefighters were able to keep the fire from jumping C-470 to the east and the highway reopened at around 6:30 p.m.

West Metro officials said the Oak Fire continued to push north and west, as residents were allowed to return home. By 4:45 p.m., amid improving wind conditions and with crews from multiple agencies dedicated to the fire, all evacuation orders were rescinded. The state of Colorado sent a Single Engine Air Tanker from Fort Collins to fight the fire, working with West Metro firefighters, who remained on the scene throughout the evening of Dec. 27. The cause of the fire was determined by West Metro investigators to be human-related and the investigation continues.

Wildfires in Ken-Caryl and Across Colorado

Wildfires are a natural part of Colorado's forests. All of Ken-Caryl lies within the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI), where our homes are mixed with wildland vegetation and we are at risk of being impacted by wildfire. Planning ahead and taking action now can increase the likelihood your home survives when a wildfire occurs.

Firefighters always do their best to reduce fire damage, but it is our responsibility to prepare our families and property for wildfire. Taking practical steps to prepare your home does not guarantee it will survive a wildfire, but it does improve the odds. Any work completed may also allow firefighters to safely engage the fire and attempt to protect your property. If fire conditions are unsafe, firefighters cannot remain in our neighborhoods.

Be Ready and Informed with CodeRED

One critical step is making sure your cell phone is registered to receive emergency notifications. With CodeRED, the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office can deliver targeted, time-sensitive information to those who have registered to receive alerts. Notifications can be sent via email, SMS, voice, mobile app push

notifications, and more, depending on the severity of the situation. Sign up for the Jefferson County CodeRED at: https://www.jeffco.us/473/Emergency-Notifications.

Prepare for evacuation with the Five Ps:

Gather your five Ps now and have them available for immediate evacuation.

- 1. **People**, which includes your pets and animals.
- 2. **Prescriptions**, along with any medication you may need.
- 3. **Papers**, important documents like passports and birth certificates.
- 4. **Personal** need items such as

clothes, personal computer, food and water along with a cell phone and charger.

5. **Priceless** items including photos and mementos.

Go Now

If there is immediate and imminent danger, you should evacuate immediately. Do not delay leaving to gather any belongings, or make efforts to protect your home. Leave immediately and as quickly as possible. If you feel threatened, do not wait for an evacuation notice – leave now. Drive carefully, turn on your headlights and follow any directions from emergency services personnel.

MA and MD Board Elections: What you Need to Note Before you Vote

It's election season for Ken-Caryl Ranch! Our vibrant community is governed by two distinct entities, and we will therefore have two elections this spring, one for the Master Association Board and one for the Metropolitan District Board. These two entities work together to support amenities, services and programs for the community.

The chart below summarizes the upcoming elections, and more information is available at www.ken-carylranch.org under the About Us tab on the Board of Directors page.

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



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

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Ken-Caryl Resident Chris Sullivan to Climb Mt. Kilimanjaro in Support of Living Kidney Donation

Chris Sullivan, a 21-year resident of Ken-Caryl, is taking living kidney donation awareness to new heights - literally. Chris donated a kidney to a stranger in September of 2020, and is now preparing to climb the world's tallest freestanding mountain, and one of the seven summits, as part of The One Kidney Climb to bring awareness to the need for living kidney donors. Chris was selected to be one of 22 kidney donors training to climb Mt. Kilimanjaro to represent Kidney Donor Athletes (KDA) on World Kidney Day, March 10. He is a shining example of how living kidney donors can live healthy, active lives and thrive with one kidney.

"Since I was a teenager, I always felt I wanted to do something truly selfless and worthwhile, on a big scale," said Chris. "It took forty years, but in February of 2019, I finally discovered what that purpose was. Standing in my kitchen, a news clip on the TV caught my attention. As I watched a woman talk about how she donated a kidney to save a stranger's life I was frozen in my tracks. I was overcome like I had never been, and probably never will be again. Looking back, I think that was God tapping me on the shoulder and whispering in my ear, 'this is your calling'."

Chris answered that call on Sept. 30, 2020, when he donated his left kidney to "Ron", a 33-year-old in Wisconsin. The two have exchanged emails since, but have yet to meet.

"When I began this journey, one thing that was important to me was the ability to positively impact as many people as possible, which happened in the fall of 2020," said Chris. "Each donation is as unique as the individual giving the gift. My journey was not without roadblocks and sets backs, but in the end, the actual donation went about as smooth as I could have hoped and looking back, was much easier than I had imagined."

According to the United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS) more than 97,000 people in the U.S. are on the waiting list for kidney transplants. Over 3,000 new patients are added to this list every month. With fewer

donors than there are those in need, 13 people die every day waiting for a kidney. KDA is using the Mt. Kilimanjaro climb to bring awareness to living donation to demonstrate what is possible post donation, and to launch initiatives which inspire, support and educate people about the experience of living donation. Chris, who is an active member of the Ken-Caryl community, loves sharing his story to inspire others in support of this cause.

"Everyone who donates a living organ has 'their story' - the narrative of how they came to know this was their calling and the journey they experienced," said Chris. "If you come across these people, ask questions, as they want to share their story on how they joined the elite fraternity of those who believe that giving is more important than receiving."

Chris and his family have been an integral part of the Ken-Caryl community for many years. He served on the Metropolitan District Board from 2005-2007 and all three of his children were members of the Ken-Caryl Lightning Swim team. Chris' wife, Vicki, also served as the swim club president for several seasons. Chris also works as a fitness coach for Crossfit Ken Caryl, and enjoys spending time hiking and biking on our community's numerous trails, which have also helped him train for his Mt. Kilimaniaro summit.

KDA climbers, like Chris, are from 16 metro areas across the United States and Canada. For more information about KDA and this climb, please visit www.kidneydonorathlete.org/one-kidney-kili-climb/. Chris and the rest of the climbers will leave the week of Feb. 28 for Tanzania for their expedition.



The open space fires in Boulder County caused 1,084 homes to be destroyed and 149 homes suffered damage. Approximately 6,000 acres of open space burned, aided by 100-mile hour winds.

I believe the MA/MD and Open Space Committee should consider a policy for extreme dry periods on management of KCR open space grasslands. During very dry periods, we should mow fire lanes between homes that face tall dry grass. A control burn by the West Metro Fire Department could help in areas where homes are close to open space dry grass.

The first time we ever received a reverse 911 call was to prepare to evacuate our home because of the open space fire between C-470 and the East Hog Back. We received the call because we pay for a land line and it requires no registration. If you are using only cell phones, I urge you to register your phone with Jefferson County to receive reverse 911 calls.


